Report Online to the University:

Reporting Sexual Violence to the University through our online reporting tool does not automatically trigger a formal complaints procedure. Once a report is submitted, an advisor will be in contact with support and options available.

Anonymous reports of sexual violence can also be submitted, however no personal response or action will be taken on behalf of an anonymous report.

Report to the Police:

There's no time limit on when someone can report.

The University's ISVA can support anyone through the reporting process, including attending police meetings with you.

If you or someone you know is not ready for any of these options, that's okay.

What Is Sexual violence?

- Any behaviour that is of a sexual nature and takes place without consent, understanding, or with coercion
- Sexual violence can be perpetrated by someone you know and trust, or a complete stranger
- Sexual violence can be physical, verbal, visual or virtual.
- No matter what you were wearing, or what you were doing, it wasn't your fault
- If you didn't tell anyone at the time, it's not too late to tell someone now
- If you froze it does not mean that you allowed it.
