1. The Spartans are so brave that they always fight well
so brave as to always
2. Socrates was so wise that many (people) listened to him.
3. The danger ~~was~~^{is} so great that we must flee
[it is necessary for us . . .]
4. The river is so dangerous that no-one crosses it.
5. Xerxes was not so foolish as to stay in Greece.
6. Themistocles was so clever that he defeated the Persians.
[not strange]
7. The barbarians were too cowardly to fight.
8. The snow was so great that the soldiers were despondent.
←accusative 'subject'
9. The three hundred fought so bravely that they were always
honoured by the Greeks.
10. The wall is so high that no one is able to climb over it.
11. Polycrates was so lucky that Amasis broke off his
friendship with him.

12. The Persians were so ~~great~~ many that the Athenians no longer stayed in the city.

13. The slave was too weak to work.

14. Few people / men are so rich that they don't want to be richer.

15. Alcestis loved her husband so much that she was willing to die on his behalf.

16. Demosthenes spoke so well that the Athenians trusted him.

- Notes:
1. when the verb is in the $\omega\tau\epsilon$ clause, a new subject is in the ACCUSATIVE case
 2. $\epsilon\theta\epsilon\lambda\omega$ - be willing
 $\beta\alpha\iota\lambda\upsilon\pi\omega$ - want

Sentence 15 shows the difference.

Alcestis didn't necessarily want to die, but she was willing!
