His Majesty's Ship Torbay has taken and sent to Spithead, a French Frigate of 32 Guns.

It is confidently asserted, that our Expedition Fleet is in Quiberon Bay.

By a Letter from Portsmouth, the Men work double Hours on the second Expedition Fleet, and by their great Diligence, it is imagined that it will be ready to sail in about three Weeks. It is said, that this Fleet will consist of twenty Sail of the Line besides Frigates and Fire-ships, and will be commanded by Sir Edward Hawke. The Transports that are to go on this Expedition have Orders to be in the Downs as soon as possible.

Yesterday died in Piccadilly the Wife of Edward Green, Esq.

We are now informed, that the Expedition is against Reliclie.

Yesterday the Anniversary Meeting of the Society Around the Rose, was held at Scots-Hall, Blackfriars, at which were present Sir Robert Anderson, Sir Richard Glynn, Mr. Alderman Beckford, and the Hon. Thomas Harley, Esq. Many loyal Toasts were drank; and the evening was concluded with becoming Mirth.

The Troops that are going abroad, were all put on board the Transports at Graveland and Tilbury on Monday last; the last Corps that embarked, were Cholmondeley's Dragoons, and the Royal Inniskilleners.

Colonel Robinson, Brother of Sir Thomas Robinson, is appointed to succeed Sir Henry Bellenden as Gentleman Officer of the Black Rod to the House of Peers.

A few Days since died at her House near Waltham Abby Mrs. Morgan, by whose Death Thomas Wood, Esq. of Littleton, comes into an additional Estate of 10000 l. per Annum.

Yesterday a Clerk to a Merchant was committed to the Poultry Compter by the Right Hon. the Lord Mayor, being charged with forging a Receipt for 25 l. which he was intrusted to pay.

Yesterday Ohara stood in the Pillory at the West End of St. Paul's Church, pursuant to his Sentence the last Session, for keeping a disorderly House.

**IV.**  
*The Benefits resulting to Individuals from the Conduct of their great MONARCHS.*

THE general Representation of three Reigns in a former Paper, may very well serve to show that our wisest and greatest Monarchs were the best Friends to Liberty and the Constitution: But to give the Reader a more clear Notion of this, it may not be improper to descend a little into Particulars, and to prove by a few special Instances what the Prudence and Goodness of these Princes induced them to do for the Ease, Safety, and Welfare of their Subjects; and, on the other hand, what the Loyalty of the People enabled them to do in return for the Service of these Monarchs. It is a just Remark of Mr. Locke's, that the best Way of reading English History is, to consider the Laws made by our Kings in Conjunction with the martial and political Events in their respective Reigns, which is the surest Way of coming at their true Characters, and at the State of the Nation under their respective Administrations.

The Norman Conquest, and the Consequences of it had taken at least, if not subverted the very Foundation of the State, inasmuch that those who had Strength and Power called every Thing, and such as had not Force to preserve it could call nothing, their own. A precarious Possession is next to no Possession. Henry the First by his royal Edict, which was the Foundation of all our Charters of Liberty, so much the more valuable as it came spontaneously, settled this Point; he fixed the Terms of Knight Service, regulated the Succession of Lands by Descent, declared what Relief should be paid upon a Demise, and reduced the DANEGELT, which was the Land-Tax of those Days, and which he levied only in Time of War. Our first Edward finding Things run afield into Confusion, reformed them by those wise Statutes called the 1st and 2d Westminster, and by another Act declaring the Method of levying and the Effects of Fines; but our THIRD were thoroughly and effectually adjusted by Edward the Third, in whose Time, as Sir Matthew Hale observes, the Law of England drew very near to its Meridian Height.

When Lands are settled and improved, they produce Profits; and in the Enjoyment of these likewise, Men must be secured. Henry the First gave the Royal Sanction to Wills, regulated the Distribution of the Effects of Intestates, and appointed Fairs and Markets not only for the Convenience of purchasing, but to prevent by open Sales the Practice of disposing of Cattle, and other Things taken by Fraud or Force. Edward the First by his famous Statute de Tallagio non concedendo, relinquished that Power which the Crown had exercised, of levying Taxes at Will, under Colour of Necessity, which Edward the Third confirmed, and desired the most proper Methods for preventing and punishing any Attempts of that Kind.

In Reference to the Persons of Men in every Degree, the Laws of Henry the First rescued them in a great Measure from Oppression, by restoring the Saxon Mode of maintaining the public Tranquillity, by Pledges. He farther enacted, that no Man should be punished for a Crime, till the Fact imputed to him was certified by a Jury, from whence our Grand Jurors arose. In the Beginning of his Reign, he punished even smaller Crimes with great Severity; by taxing off Mens Limbs and Members; but when this had brought its Effect, he introduced Punishments by Fines only. After various Trials to extinguish it in a sudden Way, he fixed the Judgment of Death for Robbery. Edward the First mitigated Punishments, but caused the Law to be executed with Strictness. In the Time of Edward the Third many new Writs were devised, for the Subjects Relief; and where-ever these were found deficient, the Judges were directed to frame suitable Writs.

Thus the Reader sees, what private Persons of every Degree, owed to the Goodness and Wisdom of these Kings, assisted by the Attention and Authority of their Parliaments, and the Fidelity of our first Judges, Esq. and Safety, is derived from their Care, and Circumspection. In another Paper we will examine what was done in respect to public Concerns, and how the People of this Country being released from Fear and Oppression, were left, assisted and protected, in exerting their Industry, for the improving

their own Concerns and in making Provision for their Posterity.

**To the WORLD'S ADVISER.**

RESPECTED SIR,

*Hermitage, Llantridair.*

By the merest chance I got a sight of the *WORLD*, by which I learnt your address. A friend of my father's sent him the *Paper about Partridge-Shooting*—at which he laughed till he cried—says you are a droll, humane dog.

Now, Sir, don't be disheartened about *advising*; but he shoots on still his own way, which is not yours. I shall treat you better if you will answer this. What I want to know is, if there is any cheerfulness or real amusement in London? I always sought there was; till I passed one fortnight there last spring; and then 'twas all hurry and business, instead of ease and pleasure, as I had expected. We spent our mornings in visiting various shops, by way, I suppose, of examining; as we very often did not make any purchases, yet the people treated us civilly. Then we left our names at different houses before we returned home, as wherever we called the ladies were out; and when I considered how crowded the streets were, it could not be otherwise. In the evenings, we went to card playing, which I perceive to be a very flourishing trade, and which shows the great attention and assiduity of those employed in the business.

You must know, I have been bred up in a remote part of the kingdom, where we have few acquaintance, but with those few we are very jolly when we meet—and though we never use cards ourselves, yet I had heard of them, but had been, I find, misinformed, as to their being used only to amuse.

Last March, the death of a friend called my father into Kent; he asked me if I would go with him to London, and pass one fortnight there, with his sister, Lady PLAYWELL, who was a widow, with a good jointure, and had frequently invited me. Delighted was I, you may be sure; and I lost no time in preparing to accompany him. My mother fitted me out with some of her fine lace, and her best flowered silk; and I sent to the tailor to alter my habit, to make it proper to travel in.

We arrived at my aunt's, the 22d of March, about seven o'clock in the evening, and found her, as we imagined, at supper; but, behold, it was dinner!—My father ran eagerly up, on his entrance, and kissed her in his hearty way, which seemed not much to please.—She shook me kindly by the hand, (a way she has with every body), and then cast her eyes over me significantly; I did the same by her, being surprised to see a woman, turned of fifty, look so well—her cheeks were as rosy as a country girl's, a plain proof London is not prejudicial to health; and she was dressed in a muslin frock, and red sash, with a little high crowned hat on one side, and her hair in ringlets.—When the servants had quitted the room, she enquired after my mother, brothers, and sisters, and concluded with saying, to-morrow I will get my niece dressed fit to appear, and I hope her time will pass to her satisfaction, as I am very deeply engaged. (Here my heart beat, and I began to think about getting a sweetheart, and never more living at the *Hermitage*, only paying occasional visits there to see those I love.) To night, continued she, I suppose you will like to retire early to rest; therefore, I have contrived it so, as not to go to my party, till you go to bed. My father answered, he should set up till ten; but begged not to prevent her engagements.—Oh! says she, that is earlier than I want to go out—and ordered her chair at eleven.

(Strange, thought I.) The next morning my father set off for Kent—and as soon as we had breakfasted, which was about one, I went to be equipped at milliners, &c.

My aunt, who is very generous, spared me the trouble and expence; but if I might speak the truth, she spent her money oddly; as she bought sad poor trumpery things, that cost much, and would not last.—How much better, it occurred to me, my mother understands these things; but being strictly enjoined by her not to contradict my aunt, I approved whatever was ordered—even obeyed her in never wearing my mother's lace, or flowered silk, during my stay—though I saw nothing so rich and handsome wherever I went. We were detained so long in shopping, that we could not dress till after dinner, and then I went through a sad operation, called *Hair-dressing*. I was two hours under the artist's hands, in extreme torture all the time; for he twisted my hair, then pinched it with hot irons, mixing grease and powder with it, half blinding and choking me, as he puffed away the brown and white dust; then put on what they called a *Cap*, and concluded with saying how well I looked. Never before had a man put on my cap;—however, I confess, my glass approved the performance, but my patience did not; though, in some degree, I was obliged to submit to it daily. It was near ten before we set out—we thus went to three card parties, all well lighted, and so crowded, could scarce move; and, of course, very hot—but that, I suppose, was necessary. Nothing but cards were talked about—and as I did not understand the conversation, I was silent.—In all parts of every room were separate parties, flinging about these little bits of painted paper, which produced something valuable, as there was much money stirring.—Some persons I saw frown, as if it gave pain; and others I heard grumbling with fortune, and scolding those near them—which fully convinced me, 'twas necessity, not diversion, that caused this trade to go on with so much spirit. My aunt seemed pleased; and, I believe, had what

veral; but none regarded me; at which I was a little displeased.

Well, Sir, to shorten my story, I passed every day the same, except two; and then the trade worked at my aunt's, which was very fatiguing; indeed; poor woman! she was tired to death before it broke up—which was, as usual, very late.

I left the metropolis without regret, but fully convinced what an industrious place it must be, when *Ladies of Fashion* toil so hard.—But I must observe, girls have very little chance there of getting husbands, as there are so many pretty women in it, that if one happens to wound a heart, 'tis cured by another sweet face the next day; and what is worse, they may not be the wounded object again for an age.

My aunt talked of dining early some day, to take me to the play—but could not get a box the first week, and the second there was no public shews allowed, being a sacred week. However the card-table trade never stopped.—Sundays and all alike; so I wondered if they learnt the *Fourth Commandment*, but could not ask my aunt, for she never took me to church—though she was so kind to go every Sunday to the park procession: 'twas a very fine sight, and proved the inhabitants of London very rich.

My father stayed a few days with us, at his return, and took me to the Tower, St. Paul's, the Monument, and Westminster-Abbey.—So I think I have seen London; and, to tell you the truth, don't admire it—but if you advise me to try again, or recommend my learning the card-table business, which, if profitable, I would very willingly, then I will accept my aunt's invitation for next winter, which my father and mother will consent to, if 'tis wished.
