## **B. Geographical contexts**

- 1. Draw up a picture of France as it is presented in the early part of the text. Think particularly about:
  - i. Narrative perspective (whose views of France are these?)
  - ii. Veracity of picture presented (attention to social / historical detail, etc)
- 2. Draw up a similar picture of Guadeloupe. Think particularly about:
  - i. Narrative perspective
  - ii. Differences in tone in the presentation of these two countries.
  - iii. The relevance of binary oppositions in this part of the text.

## C. Colonialism / post-colonialism

- 3. Analyse what this part of the text reveals about the effects of French colonialism on life in the Caribbean? Give as many concrete examples as you can.
- 4. Compare your understanding with your previous knowledge of French colonialism. Think about the following:
  - i. Do you need a working knowledge of France's colonial past to appreciate this text?
  - ii. Is Condé interested in educating us about colonialism and its consequences? If so, how does she go about this?

## D. Telling the truth? Writing and autobiography

- 5. Prepare pp. 41 43 and pp. 84-85 in detail. Think particularly about the following:
  - i. What links these two episodes?
  - ii. What do we learn through the 'child's eye view' that Condé gives us? Analyse how that 'child's eye view' is created.
  - iii. What do the episodes tell us about the way in which the sense of a text can be transformed, or even misconceived, by its readers (ie: the way in which a writer's apparent intentions are betrayed by the reader).
  - iv. Do these episodes suggest to us anything about our own reading habits? About the interplay of truth and fiction in a wider sense?
  - v. Are there other binary pairs like this in the text?
