Bordeaux itself

The city of Bordeaux is hands-down the most beautiful city I have ever visited. It is often described as 'le petit Paris' (little Paris) because it seems to be built in the same gorgeous Parisian style. All of the buildings look like something from a painting, from the extraordinary cathedrals and important structures, to even the simple buildings like my corner shop down the road! On my first trip into the city centre, I remember being shocked that even the McDonald's here looked impressive!





It's not just old buildings

Although I was constantly amazed by Bordeaux's architecture, and kept pinching myself thinking 'I live here!' every time I walked past yet another incredible landmark, there's much more to this city than just old buildings.

The city is teeming with life; from funfairs to nightclubs, from street art to boat rides, there's so much to do and see!



This funfair often pops up for a few weeks at a time in the Quinconces square. Featuring a giant Ferris wheel to provide breath-taking views of the city, dizzying rollercoasters and rides, and plenty of games and challenges to try your luck (or skill!) to win prizes, this makes for a great day out!

Another must-see part of Bordeaux is Darwin l'écosystème des casernes. These former military barracks have been transformed from abandoned buildings to Bordeaux's hub for the alternative scene. It now reeks hipster vibes, boasting incredible street art, a skate park, a fantastic café/restaurant, an organic grocery, a thrift shop, and even a mini farm with chickens, to name just a few attractions! This unique place prides itself on its sustainability, and is therefore the place to be for anyone who cares about the environment.


Shopping

Bordeaux is also a great place to hit the shops every once in a while and put that Erasmus grant to good use (please spend responsibly). 1.2km long, Rue Sainte Catherine is the longest commercial street in Europe and is a great place to pad out your wardrobe with some French style à la mode, ready to impress all your friends back home!



Trams

A simple pleasure, Bordeaux's tram system is another reason why I enjoyed the city so much. Trams are environmentally-friendly and much more fun than taking a bus or a train! It's delicious

Not only is Bordeaux celebrated for it's architecture and attractions, but its culinary scene is fantastic too! It's packed with great restaurants where you can taste some of the famous French cuisine — and tucking into a steak-frites or a quiche lorraine is so much better when you're peoplewatching along the *quai* or in a hidden corner of one of Bordeaux's many quaint squares.



For me, the bakeries will always be the best part! You could try one of Bordeaux's famous canelés, but there's nothing like a freshly-baked pain-au-chocolat (but be careful to call it a chocolatine in this region) and coffee to put a spring in your step in the morning.





The countryside

The appeal of this region isn't limited to the city itself; the countryside of the Gironde department is arguably even better than Bordeaux's urban charm. If you dare to venture outside of the city, you'll be blown away by views of green vineyards as far as the eye can see, and the picturesque tiny villages dotted along the Gironde estuary will almost make you think you've travelled back in time. When making the commute to the village Blaye where I worked, getting the 6.25am bus was almost enjoyable when I got to watch the sunrise across the vineyards.



Sebastián!
