

Hi Jaanashee. Great question! In our Liberal Arts classes you will usually study in a group of about 13-15 students. However, we run some modules with fewer students (the smallest class I've taught has been 5) and some with more (around 24 is the maximum). But if you take modules in other departments you might have lectures with many more students (e.g. in English Literature or Economics). Seminar classes in most departments is between 10-20.

And if anyone's not familiar with the terminology: A lecture is a large class, where students usually sit and write notes while a lecturer teaches (or "lectures") for the duration of the session. A seminar is a smaller class, usually focused on student discussion, guided by a lecturer. Liberal arts classes are all smaller classes: we tend to run 2 hour interactive workshops, which combine minilectures from staff with lots of discussion! (Mainly group and pairs work, which then feeds into a bigger whole class discussion)

Hi Anna. No...unfortunately not. Most modules from across the whole university only run if they have a minimum number of students. Our minimum for most Liberal Arts modules is 5, but this may be different if you take modules in other departments. Most other universities also work like this...

Hi Laurel. We have the option to take two kinds of pathways: 1) A disciplinary pathway where you focus on your specialist interest in another subject. A list of the disciplinary pathways we offer can be found here:

However, beyond the core Liberal Arts modules that you need to study during each year of the degree, the modules that you study for the rest of the time will very much depend on your individual interests (we will help to guide you with your module choices to ensure that they suit your interests and ambitions)

The second option is to take a specialist interest pathway. This means that you choose a research area to focus on then take modules from different departments that speak to that area. So, for example, if you were interested in Culture and Identity (a research area that some students have been interested in exploring in the past), you may choose to take some modules from Theatre and Performance Studies, some from English, some from Film, etc.

We welcome students with Arts backgrounds, Science backgrounds, and those who have studied a range of A levels (or equivalent). How is it living off campus?

Hello David! Living off campus is very nice. Usually 2nd, 3rd and 4th years live off-campus as first years can be in the university's accommodations. There are different places you can live in including Coventry, Leamington Spa and Canley (which is very near the university). To access Coventry and Leamington Spa you would have to take the bus, although some students have their own cars. You can choose to live with flatmates or on your own and the university can also help out with off-campus accommodations:)



what are CATS?

Ha ha, yes you're totally right it gets a bit confusing. Basically it's a way of awarding credit. Every university requires its students each year to take a certain amount of credit, so each module has a credit weighting. Usually at Warwick, modules are either worth 15 credits (or CATs) and last for 1 term, or are worth 30 credits/CATs and last for the full academic year. There are a few exceptions of modules worth other amounts of credit

Hi Maddalena. This is another good question. If you focus purely on a disciplinary pathway where you become an expert in that particular subject then you would choose one (e.g. Life Sciences), but you can take a specialist interest pathway that chooses to focus on two subjects - and it wouldn't matter whether these were in sciences, social sciences or the arts. For example, Elvire takes Life Sciences and Global Sustainable Development (which are in different Faculties in the University)

Hi Anna. It's 120 per year and 360 over your degree overall.



Hi, I'm Caitlin from West Yorkshire. I was wondering if there are any preferred subjects for a level? And if there is an option for a year abroad during the course?

In response to your question about studying abroad, it's not compulsory to study abroad as part of the Liberal Arts degree, however, we certainly encourage our students to consider studying abroad and our students who have studied abroad have found it really beneficial! There are two options for studying abroad: firstly you can study at one of our Liberal Arts partner institutions, allowing you to spend a year abroad on a Liberal Arts programme that shares our passion for interdisciplinarity and critical thinking. On the other hand, you can choose to spend a year at one of Warwick's universitywide partnerships. These destinations are subject to annual confirmation and availability. Both options involve extending your degree by one year (to four years in total), and you'll go abroad in your third year, coming back to Warwick for your final year. Both options are also non-credit bearing, meaning that the year abroad doesn't count towards your overall degree. Hello Alysha! That's a great question! One thing that I particularly enjoy in Liberal Arts is the breadth of things we can study and the variety of skills we acquire in different modules through various assignments and weekly seminars. I really enjoy Life Sciences and Humanities/Social Sciences and Liberal Arts enables me to have the best of both worlds:) The modules of Liberal Arts are also very unique. For example, this year I had Consumption as a core module and was able to think and reflect about concepts that I had never thought or studied before. We also get to learn about theorists and philosophers which I find to be very interesting!



Do you get choice of all the modules in theatre if i took it as a specialist interest pathway? so i would be able to choose any of the first year modules as my optional in my first year?

Not quite, but it gets more flexible as you progress through the degree. I should also mention that it depends a little bit on what year you join us. I'll explain how the course is structured for entry academic year 2022-23, but it may be changing slightly in academic year 2023-24. 1/

Hello Maddalena! As Kirsten just mentioned I actually take my modules from GSD and Life Sciences as I enjoy studying about biology but also about the environment and climate change! I am really enjoying it and I often find that these two subjects actually overlap quite a bit. I took some time to decide my pathway, so do not worry if you are not certain about it the moment you start university! You have a lot of opportunities to explore different modules and you do not need to make up your mind right right from the beginning!



The course gets more flexible as you progress through the years. This is deliberate: you spend most of your first year doing Liberal Arts modules, which gives you the training you need to move out with confidence into the departments around the University. You then do only half of your modules with us in second year, and only the dissertation with us in third year. The rest of your modules would be in the department of your choice. 2/

Do you get choice of all the modules in theatre if i took it as a specialist interest pathway? so i would be able to choose any of the first year modules as my optional in my first year?

If you were to take the Theatre Studies pathway you would do most of your modules with us in Y1, then you would HAVE to do TH114: Theatre and Performance in Context (30 credits). You could then take a 15 credit module of your choice, either in or out of Theatre Studies 3/



But then in Y2 and final year you would have your choice from any of the Theatre and Performance Studies modules on offer. 4/

So there may be some that you're not able to take (though that would be the same if you were a theatre and performance studies undergraduate too). Most students get most of their choices though



what is the work load like?

But Liberal Arts modules set students approx. 3-4 hours preparation for class a week (and you should be doing at least this for any other modules outside Liberal Arts). So if you take four modules per term, you will do about 12-16 hours prep, plus the time in class. Then assessments are additional - so some points of the term (when there are more assessments due in) will involve more work than others (the beginning of term is usually quieter than the end)

Hi I'm Madeleine from Durham. Is there a limit on the amount of subjects you can study outside of the liberal arts modules?

Well, the limit is how much space you have in your timetable. In Y1 you do about 3/4 of your modules in Liberal Arts so there is only space to take a few modules in other departments; but in Y2 you only take half of your modules with us, and in final year just your dissertation. The rest of the space you can fill with other modules and you could take these in as many different departments as you like - with the caveat that we help you to choose modules that speak to your specialist research interest (you don't have to know what this is before you start! we help you to develop this as you progress through the course). So to give an example. After you have done your core modules in Y2, you have 60 credits to fill with optional modules. This could be two big modules, or four shorter modules. These modules could all be from different departments.

In Liberal Arts we deliberately design our assessments so that doing the assessments helps you to develop a wide range of skills (i.e. rather than just getting good at writing essays)



what is the work load like?

Hello Anna! I would say that the work load is quite manageable. From my personal experience, working on my assignments is what takes the most time for Liberal Arts modules. However, certain weeks might have more difficult readings for the module preparation and I would have to spend more time on those. For the optional modules, the work load changes from subject to subject. In life sciences we have a few lectures each week that are about an hour long each (this can vary). We also have some workshops that we have to prepare for and that we attend. For the GSD modules I studied, I spent time attending lectures, seminars along with the assignments. However, overall students still find the time to join societies and do things outside of their studies:)

We also think it's important that all students get the opportunity to present their work in a way they feel most confident at least some of the time. Some students are really good at written work, others are better at oral work. Sometimes we insist you complete written work, sometimes we insist you complete oral work; sometimes we give you the choice.

You don't have the option to produce creative work for every single assessment, but many of our modules have that option for at least some of the assessments. For example, the core Y2 module on Consumption that I teach asks students to complete a research project for their final assessment. Students could choose to present their work as an essay, a presentation, a podcast, a videocast, a digital project, a creative project (e.g. a photoessay, creative writing, art, etc.)....there are lots of other options too. We've had students do creative dissertations (e.g. a dance project) too......





But all students have the opportunity to do research outside of the classroom. For example, the Undergraduate Research Support Scheme provides academic and financila support allowing students to complete research projects over the summer vacation. https://warwick.ac.uk/services/skills/urss/. We also have a departmental budget to support student research. Finally, we encourage our students to apply to deliver presentations at undergraduate conferences such as the International Conference of Undergraduate Research (e.g. here's a write up from a few years ago of one of our students' experience at IVUR:

A question for Elvire - was there anything you struggled with during your first year, and what sort of help systems were accessible to you if you needed them (like essay writingsupport for example)?

Hello Maddalena! I would say that my biggest struggle in first year was to understand how Liberal Arts assignments worked and how to do them well. I think that it helped that we were such a small cohort. Everyone was in the same boat and it was reassuring to see that I was not alone. Also, the module tutors always say that they are here to help and provide feedback, so I really used that and asked to meet them whenever I could during their office hours to ask about essay plans, feedback and how to do them better. But I would say that a lot of the 'struggling' in first year is part of the process. You have to be patient and trust that you will get there eventually. When I was in second year I felt more confident about balancing my life and writing assignments than the beginning of first year! I think that there are a few essay writing support available through the Library and also through the Arts Department; but I am not completely sure. But I would say that reaching out to different people is quite easy and everyone is always eager to help out!

Are you able to experiment a bit with your interests? I.e. take completely different subjects in year 2 to the ones you took in year 1?

Yes and no. If you want to do a disciplinary interest pathway then no. There are core modules that you need to do in that subject in Y1 and if you haven't done them then you won't be able to be on that pathway. However, if you're more interested in taking a specialist interest pathway then yes, very much so. A lot of our students only really firm up their idea of the title of their specialist pathway as they come to the end of Y2 - because they've taken modules in Y1 and Y2 which have led them to developing an interest in a particular area.

how often do people get in if they don't quite meet the requirement grades? is it quite strict or does it completely depend on how many apply?

I can't answer this exactly because, as you say, it depends on quite a few factors. 1) It depends on how many places have been offered and how full the programme is. 2) It depends on how many places have been offered to students on other courses (the University commits to providing things like accommodation on campus in Y1 and if other subjects are very full they sometimes don't let us drop grades. But what I would say is this: if you miss the offer by a grade it is definitely worth calling us up to let us know, and often there will still be a place.

I had to pay a few yearly fees to have sports club membership to enable to join any sports club I wanted. In my first and second year the fees for each sports club was about 6 pounds per year.
