10. INDIA LEAGUE (Previous reference - see Home Office Monthly Bulletin No. 40)

The South Africa Committee of the League held a meeting on the subject of racial oppression in South Africa, at Friends House, Euston Road, N.W.1. on 25th March, attended by 2,000 people; a further 2,000 people were unable to gain admittance.

The speakers were: Julius SIIVERMAN, M.P. (Chairman) J.S. MAMIK, Rev. Michael 300TT, Marjorie NICHOISON, Dr. Jsuf DADOO (South Africa) and Paul ROBESON. A resolution was passed expressing horror at the brutal race suppression exercised by the present Government in South Africa on nine million African, Indian and coloured peoples, and calling on the people of Great Britain to protest against such fascist principles.

The popularity of the meeting was due to a large extent to the attraction of CORSON who sang a number of revolutionary songs. In an impromptu speech had immounced that he and his son were communists, and had dedicated their lives to the mancination of the coloured peoples of the world.

The F.B.I. have been informed that Paul PORESON intended to leave the United States via the "Queen Mary" for Southampton on February 11th, 1949, and that he will appear before the British Battalion of the International Brigade in London on an unspecified date. Thereafter his itinerary includes visits to Paris and probably Bucharest. He is due to return to the United States about the end of March.

The purpose of ROBESON's visit to Europe is not known, but in the past he is known to have engaged in political activities during his tours and he is, of course, known to have been active in Communist circles for many years. In view of his intended appearance before the International Brigade which fought in Spain, it seems more than likely that this tour will follow the usual pattern.

We should be grateful if you would let us have any information on ROBESON's activities while he is in England.

The attached letter from the Council on African Affairs has recently been sent to subscribers to the Council's news bulletin, "New Africa". Accounts of the struggle between Or. Max YERGAM and Paul ROBESON have appeared from time to time in the press, but you may care to have the following summary:

The Council on African Affairs has recently been split wide open by a feud between its pro-Communist and anti-Communist leaders. The fatter supported YERGAN, the Tormer ROBESON. The YERGAN faction decided to split from the Communists because they refused to allow YERGAN to dismiss Doxey WILKERSON, a member of the Mational Committee f the Communist Party of the U.S.A., who had been employed by YERGAN on the New York Negro newspaper, "People's Voice" (which, like its owner, is now in financial straits). After his break with his Communist colleagues, YERGAN tried to retain control of the Council and on at least one occasion his attempt to do so led to the use of physical violence against the Communists. This in turn resulted in the latter bringing a law suit against YEHGAN.

On October 6th, 1948, YERGAN addressed a letter to his supporters on the Council in which he stated that the suit had been settled and that he no longer had any connection with the Council. In referring to his opponents he frequently - and quite correctly - used the terms "Communistled element" and "Communist element". He maintained that it was the Communist aim either to control the Council or to wreck it regardless of the interests of Africa for which it had been established.

COUNCIL URGES JUST AND PROMPT DECISION ON ITALIAN COLONIES

New York-- The Council on African Affairs today circulated to leaders and organisations throughout the country, requesting endorsement, copies of a petition urging that "the United States Delegation to the United Nations, in dealing with the question of the former Italian colonies, remember that Africa belongs to the Africans, and that the paramount considerations should be the needs and aspirations of the peoples of Libya, Eritrea, and Somaliland".

The petition called for prompt action on this question at the current U.N. General Assembly Meeting in Paris; U.S. support for the plan of "a truly international administration directly responsible to the United Mations" as originally proposed in 1945 by then Secretary of State Byrnes and now endorsed, with minor modifications, byt the Soviet Union; and the return of all Eritrea, if not also Italian Somaliland, to Ethiopia - but to an Ethiopia free of British, American, or other foreign domination.

The Council's statement criticised the backing now given by the U.S. government to British proposals which would, if adopted, enlarge that country's, and incidentally America's, sphere of control in North and East Africa. It is also urged the immediate withdrawal of British military forces in these areas.

The decision to seek public support of this petition was made at the semi-annual membership meeting of the Council on African Affairs held in New York on September 17, with the Chairman, Paul HOBESON, presiding.

At that meeting it was also agreed to send a letter to the N.A.A.C.P. National Board requesting reconsideration of "its ill-advised action in severing the tenure of Dr. W.E.B. DuBois, and a communication to the State Department demanding a 'frank and unevasive apology' for the insult to the Minister of Ethiopia, Ras H.S. Imru, at Constitution Hall in Washington, D.C., when he and his party were asked to move from their assigned box seats to another section 'reserved for his race'."

The Council to date has received no reply or acknowledgment of its letter to the State Department. A copy sent the Minister of Ethiopia, however, brought his prompt response that he was "very much appreciative" of the Council's expression on this matter.

As soon as possible, we plan to resume publication of the monthly news bulletin, NEW AFRICA, the last issue of which appeared January, 1948. If you are a subscriber to that publication, your subscription will be extended to cover the number of issues, as published, still due you. Meanwhile, you will receive releases and other material issued by the Council.

Africa looms large today in Anglo-American military strategy, in the economic programs of the Western-European powers, and in the eyes of American Business looking for new worlds to conquer.

The scope of the Council's work, the number of people it can reach with its information and program of action for African freedom, depends upon the extent to which you and other friends of the organization rally to its support NOW, for we are faced with heavy financial burdens resulting from the litigation and other obligations unfortunately incurred in saving the Council and keeping its objectives uncompromised. It is necessary to clear up these debts quickly and equip the Council so that it can expand its functions. With your help we can do this and push shead without delay to the big tasks awaiting the Council.

The cry of the people for freedom in Africa, Asia and elsewhere, including in our own Southern United States, cannot be smothered or stilled. It becomes ever more insistent. It must be answered. It must be answered by the progressive forces here in America.

The visit was sponsored by a local self-styled impresario named Gilman Thomas who enjoys the reputation of a "smart" business man. Robeson gave two sub-relytion concerts in a Port-of-Spain cinema. His share of the proceeds was smart be \$4,000. The seats ranged from \$4 to \$10 each. I attended the first com \$10 a seat!). The proceedings started half-an-hour late for which Mr. Thum apologized to me. A number of the most expensive seats was empty.

- 5. The coloured population went mad about Robeson not unnaturally, for be is undoubtedly a great artist and a commanding personality. I did not meet him in person: I intended, if he had signed my visitors' book, to ask him to lunch, h he omitted that trifling formality. He was feted everywhere, dired and wined, civic receptions by the Municipalities of Port-of-Spain and San Fernando, and so He made several imprompts speeches much on the lines recorded above. On the Setup night he gave an open-air recital (free) in Woodford Square Port-of-Spain. This is said to have been arranged by the Hon. Victor Beyon M.L.C. 10,000 people were: estimated to be present and Robeson was mobbed with enthusiasm. He had difficu with police assistance, to get to and from the rostrum. No political speeches made.
- Robeson departed vowing eternal admiration of and friendship for Trinil He said he would return again and again and bring his family with him.
- This visit was harmless enough, politically speaking. Robeson's condu and behaviour seem to have been quite correct. He restricted himself to his artis activities. What would happen if on any future occasion he elected to sponsor a lead in Trinidad's political crusade in the communist interest I should not like say! He would only have to lead off by singing a few hymns and negro spirituals. "Ole Man River", etc., and the rest would be mobody's business.

Further to my W.930 of November 22nd 1948, we have now been informed by the F.B.I. that Representative Adam Clayton POWELL and his wife Hazel SCOTT are believed either to be in Trinidad or to intend to go their soon, and that while there they will contact Paul ROBESON. reason for POWELL's trip is not known.

POWELL is Representative in the House for Harlem, and both he and his wife are Negroes. She is a well-known coloured singer. While he could not be classed as a Communist, he is undoubtedly a left-wing progressive and is more likely to vote for Marcantonio than against. I am not informing the Governor of Trinidad of his visit because he will almost certainly be aware of this as soon as it transpires and also because POWELL is a well-known member of Congress who should not necessarily be treated as a security case.

You will by now have seen the telegram from this Embassy to the Governors of Trinidad and Jamaica, repeated to Colonial Office, Brief No.9 Saving, informing them of ROBESON's visit to the West Indies and of his general background.

We have now heard that he is friendly with several Communist leaders in Cuba, including a Communist member (name unknown) of the Cuban Senate; and it is therefore possible that he will approach these friends if he visits Havana. The F.B.I. also think it probable that he will contact the leaders of the People's National Party and of the Trade Union Movement in Jamaica, including Kenneth HILL and Richard HART, both of whom are well known to you.

PAUL ROBESON'S STAND

Mundt Bill Opposed

WASHINGTON, MAY 31.

Mr. Paul Robeson, the Negro singer, to-day appeared before the Senate Judiciary Committee along with several other witnesses to oppose the anti-Communist Mundt-Nixon Bill. He was asked by Senator Homer Ferguson (Republican) whether he was a member of the American Communist party. "Nineteen leading Americans are going to gaol for refusal to answer that question and if necessary I will join them," Mr. Robeson replied. At this there was an outburst of applause and some hissing from the spectators. He said that he would not say whether he was an American Communist because the question was an invasion of my right to secret ballot."

There was some applause from the audience when he said the bill was "a Fascist act" which he would not obey. Mr. Robeson said his son went to school in Russia and found complete freedom from racial prejudices. In Russia he himself "walked the earth for the first time with complete dignity." When Senator Ferguson asked if United States Communists gave their allegiance to Russia he replied, "They do not have as much allegiance to Russia as some Americans to Fascist Greece." His father was a slave in South Carolina, and he told Senator E. H. Moore (Republican) that people had "infinitely more" opportunity in Russia than he would have in Mississippi. There had not been as many people "liquidated in Russia as in American slavery,"

Senator Ferguson told reporters afterwards that the committee would decide later whether to start action for contempt against Mr. Robeson. The chairman, Senator Wiley (Republican) thought it doubtful that the committee would, but Senator Moore said, "Robeson seems to want to be made a martyr. Maybe we ought to make him

You may be interested to know that AMMAN left the Colony on 26th November for Switzerland where he proposes to stay for six months at least.

Prior to his departure AMMAN stated his interest in the possibility of importing goods into E.Africa from the British Zone of Germany which he proposes to visit. You may therefore feel it worth while to pass a note on his history to Intelligence Division.





On the 23rd ultimo, at the Canadian Legion Memorial Hall, Montreal, P.Q., the above-noted person addressed a gathering of some two hundred and fifty people under the auspices of "The Canadian West-Indian Progressive Student Centre". This organization was founded a little over one year ago for the purpose of maintaining liaison between visiting students and the local community and of stimulating interest in West Indian, African and Afro-American culture. It is exclusively a Negro Student organization.

- 2. Mrs. ROBESON is the wife of Paul ROBESON, noted singer and American Communist. At the aforementioned meeting the subject of Mrs. ROBESON's address was "The Future of Africa". Introductory remarks described this lady as a scientist, author and lecturer. Specializing in anthropology she has studied at Columbia University, U.S.A., Cambridge, Malvern and London Universities, London and more recently studied at Hartford Seminary Foundation, Connecticut, U.S.A., receiving her Ph.D. in 1945.
- 3. On August 17, 1921, she married Paul ROBESON. It was stated she has travelled extensively in South Africa, Kenya, Uganda and the Congo. In 1936 she visited Africa to observe the peoples and countries which had been labelled "primitive" and "backward", but through difficulty encountered by Negroes to obtain visas to Africa, had cited her studies and desire for practical authropological research as her reason to enter Africa. Her speech was one of so-called European exploitation of Africa and she clearly displayed an anti-Colonial attitude. While she did not directly condemn British policy it was apparent that most of her derogatory remarks were directed at British control of colonies in Africa. During the entire speech she read prepared notes but did not speak from her personal knowledge or observations.
- She stated that Africa is now in the revolutionary stages and acquainted her listeners with the different divisions of the "dark continent". "European ruling is responsible for the territorial separations so that the ruling European countries could administer their regimes to their own profit and pleasure," she added. She pointed out that Russia, China and the Phillipines have spoken for the independence of the people of Africa. She cited the restricting laws which are inflicted upon the African people, specifically naming the "Land Laws, the Clerk Law and the Industrial Relations (COPY)"

- Mrs. ROBESON attacked the policy of Colonization, declaring European exploitation has reduced the population there. "Freedom has never been won without a struggle", she stated, referring to the unsuccessful revolt of the Africans to obtain their freedom. She pointed out that during the recent war, Central Africa had become an increasingly important land, in a strategical sense.
- She harshly castigated the backward social conditions of colonization and interpreted colonization as "taking over by force and keeping by force" by the Colonial Powers, stating the minority rule the majority to their own profit and pleasure. She stated that colonization methods do not make sense as people everywhere are fighting for their common freedom. The fight for freedom seems to be a universal fight and the oppressed peoples will continue fighting until they achieve their freedom and colonization will be completely eradicated.
- 7. In reply to a question she stated French Equatorial Africa was the most prosperous economically. She stated she was glad to belong to the numerically superior "black" race, in case of trouble, stating the white race had ably taught the Arabs how to methodically exploit and regiment the black races.




