
Strategy Cycle 2018 - 2023

Supporting Interdisciplinary Teaching at Warwick

IATL champions interdisciplinary teaching across Warwick, supporting staff from all Faculties to develop interdisciplinary practice within their own department and within IATL.

IATL Module Convenor Community of Practice

- 40+ IATL module convenors across the university over the past 5 years, with 20+ convenors this year;
- Two Teaching and Learning Convenor Meetings per term sharing best practice;
- Embedding interdisciplinary teaching and learning skills and knowledge back into home departments.

Early Career Teaching Fellows

- 10+ Early Career Teaching Fellows, developing their understanding of interdisciplinary pedagogy and contributing to IATL modules;
- 100% are currently employed in academic posts.

Postgraduate Award in Interdisciplinary Pedagogy

- 29 people have undertaken the course, representing 19 departments;
- To achieve the Award, colleagues must evidence their practice implementing Interdisciplinary Pedagogy in a teaching and learning context in their home department;

Student Research

IATL recognises students as key contributors to the research culture and conversation at Warwick. We offer opportunities to students to create their own original research and to share their findings through our International Conference of Undergraduate Research (ICUR) and Reinvention: an International Journal of Undergraduate Research. We also support students to join national and international research conversations through the British Conference of Undergraduate Research (BCUR) and the World Congress on Undergraduate Research (WorldCUR) and hosted both events alongside each other at Warwick in 2023. These opportunities are open to students from all disciplines and from all backgrounds, creating active, exciting and diverse research conversations.





Project Support

Since IATL's inception in 2010, we have awarded project funding to staff and students. We provide funding and practical support to promote innovation at all levels, including strategic projects that support Warwick's Education Strategy and priorities. Our scheme emphasises student/staff co-creation and sharing learning with the university community. Anyone at Warwick can apply, including students at all levels, and every year we receive applications from across the three Faculties.

IATL Project Highlights

• School Tasking

We funded the pilot of this outreach project that brings law into primary schools. The project now runs nationwide, and Warwick recently awarded an Honorary Doctorate to comedian Alex Horne to recognise his contributions to Widening Participation.

- Policy and Practice for Disabled Students
 This project, co-created with disabled students, provided content for the University's new Code of Practice for Disabled students, which summarises policies and guidance to support disabled students in their academic learning experience.
- Student as Researcher

We supported the Library to pilot this programme to support undergraduates in developing research skills throughout their course. The project still informs how the Library works with students, enhancing their undergraduate experience at Warwick.

Humanitarian Engineering

The development of the Warwick-based MSc in Humanitarian Engineering was incubated and supported by IATL. We initially supported it as a strategic funded project and then co-developed and hosted the programme when it was launched in 2018/19. The programme offers interdisciplinary education and training to address complex societal challenges.

• Maskulinities Project

This initiative brings together the Community Values Education Programme, Report and Support, and Warwick Students' Union to tackle issues of sexism and sexual misconduct within the student community. Piloted with IATL's support, the project has just won an Excellence in Gender Equality Award.

• ITLR Co-Creation Officers

This project supported the Co-Creation Officer project within the 2023 Institutional Teaching and Learning Review, in partnership with Education Policy and Quality. EPQ worked with us to develop co-creation, using IATL's practice as a template. The two student ITLR Co-Creation Officers were integral to developing and disseminating ITLR student roles, resources, and support.

IATL Contribution to TEF Gold 2023



Warwick was recently awarded Gold in all categories of the government's latest Teaching Excellence Framework (TEF) rankings.

This result recognises the innovation, collaboration and determination of our teachers, and the University's commitment to putting student learning and success at the heart of what we do.

IATL plays a key role in this, supporting innovative, inclusive, and co-created education.



IATL champions inclusive and co-created education, through the engagement of several student co-creation officers in the department. (Referenced in points 2 and 23).



IATL is a leader in interdisciplinary education beyond boundaries, with 450 students taking 15 IATL modules in 2023/24, bringing together excellence from across 29 departments. (Referenced in points 5 and 24).



Our signature Student Devised Assessments support an inclusive and transparent assessment culture, building knowledge, skills, and behaviours for students. (Referenced in points19 and 20).



We champion international student research, with our flagship programmes ICUR and Reinvention engaging students and institutions across the globe. 3000 students from 22 institutions have presented at ICUR and Reinvention has published 222 high-quality student research papers across five continents. (Referenced in points 27 and 33).



IATL stands as a champion, both within the University and globally, of Warwick's 2018-2024 Education Strategy, supporting students to learn beyond boundaries. We are a sector leader in interdisciplinarity and student research, and foster an inclusive, empowering, and caring environment in which students and staff thrive.

IATL and TEF Gold 2023 Case Studies

Despite being a small department, IATL played a key role in supporting the University develop innovative, inclusive, and co-created education practices that proved to be instrumental in the University achieving its TEF Gold ambitions. Indeed, many of the case studies featured on the TEF Gold webpages started out as IATL projects.

The case study on inclusive education stemmed from an IATL funded project where Leigh Mencarini analysed student feedback to create a charter of recommendations to improve the student experience of mature students. Leigh now works in the Dean of Students supporting strategic activity around inclusion and student success.

Leigh Mencarini discusses her experiences of studying later in life and shares her work on expanding support available for mature and Widening Participation students during her time as a History of Art student and now in her career within Higher Education.

The case study on co-creation features Nikita Asnani who studied the IATL Design Thinking module as an Undergraduate and was one of our Student Voice representatives. She then became a student on the MSc in Humanitarian Engineering (developed from an IATL funded project) before going on to play a key role as a student ambassador for the ITLR (using co-creation principles developed within IATL).

Nikita Asnani played a key role as student ambassador in the Institutional Teaching and Learning Review (ITLR). Nikita discusses the key role of student co-creator in the institution wide initiative, how the role has helped to shape her and the learning she has taken from this work.

The Excellence in Academic Practice case study features Bo Kelestyn who started her academic teaching career with IATL as a co-convenor on the Design Thinking and Entrepreneurship modules. She also worked with members of the IATL team in developing the Warwick Secret Challenge methodology.

Dr Bo Kelestyn shares her journey from student through to academic at the University of Warwick. Bo shares her creation of the secret challenge methodology and her work with Jess Humphreys on 'Designing Together', both of which have had impact and utilisation internally and now reach beyond Warwick.

The Campus and Study Spaces features case studies that developed from IATL funded projects and/or modules. Robert O'Toole is a co-convenor on IATL's Design Thinking module and has worked with IATL for many years on innovative teaching technologies including VR. IATL has also worked with the AV team for many years to use sophisticated conference technology to support our virtual undergraduate research conference.

Dr Rob O'Toole talks us through the exciting new teaching and learning spaces available in the Faculty of Arts Building, taking us to the Mobile Design Studio and the Digital Arts and Humanities Lab. Rob discusses the innovation these educational spaces open up and the work taking place with our students here.

The Student Research case studies feature students who have worked either as editors on IATL's Reinvention Journal or who have been Student Directors at ICUR. There is also a case study featuring a student who worked on IATL's Support the Supporter project, which has the aim of supporting staff who support students undertaking student research.

Elle discusses her time as Editor of Reinvention, Warwick's journal of undergraduate research, during her final year, the opportunities she took up and advice for future undergraduates.

The Innovation and Enterprise case studies feature a student who studied on IATL's Public Engagement module and then went on to become a Student Director with the Warwick Institute of Engagement (WIE).
