1.4. Column dedication by Eumachos and Amias

Description: White marble tabella ansata (W. 0.71 × H. 0.42) cut on fluted column.

Text: Cut on the second drum from the base of the column.

Letters: 0.02-0.03

Date: Early first century A.D. (lettering, context, prosopography)

Findspot: Temple/Church: 7th column from west end of north colonnade

Original Location: Temple/Church findspot.

Last recorded location: Findspot

History of discovery: Noted in 1705 by Picenini (10102, 20) and Sherard (10101, 12); copied by Deering (8, no.33); copied by Bailie; copied by Le Bas; recorded by K&R (no notebook entry); recorded by Gaudin (181); recorded by the NYU expedition.

Bibliography: Published by Bailie, 68; by Waddington, from Le Bas, LBW 590; by Reinach, from Gaudin, 123; by Cormack, from the MAMA records, 437, whence McCabe *PHI Aphrodisias* 108.

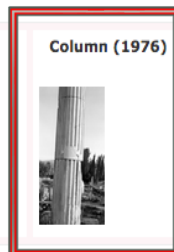
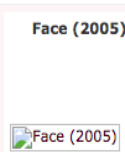
Translation:

Eumachos Diogenes son of Athenagoras the son of Athenagoras the son of Eumachos, (entitled) Friend of Caesar, and Amias Olympias, daughter of Dionysios, by birth of Adrastos, the son of Molon (dedicated) the column for the goddess Aphrodite and the People.

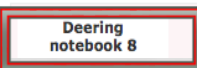

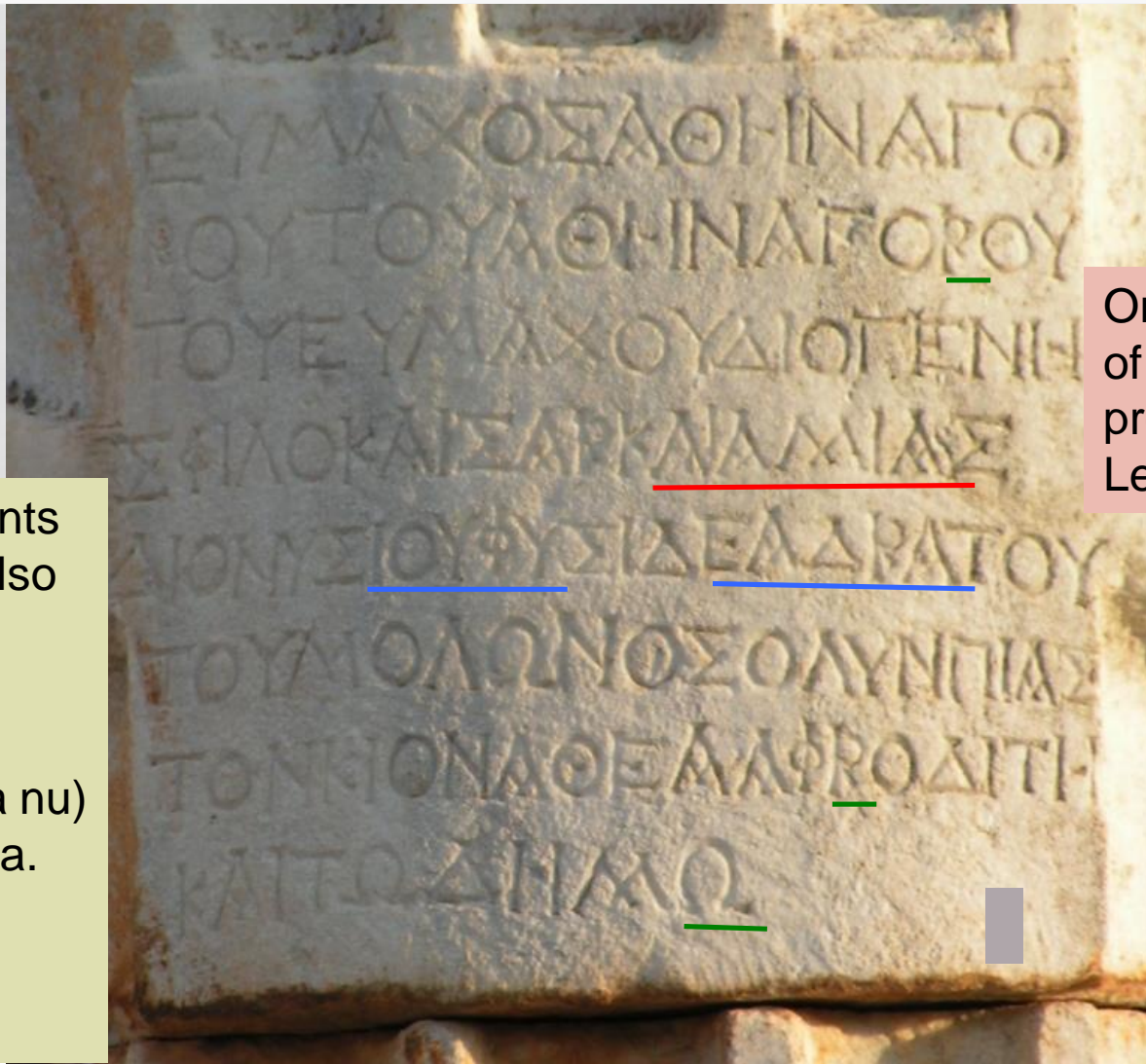

Left indent at bottom

Variations in Letter size are evident

Stylistic elements of letters are also apparent (e.g)
Legged rho,
Angular forms (alpha, lambda nu)
Elliptical omega.
Carving: Deep strokes & Light serifs

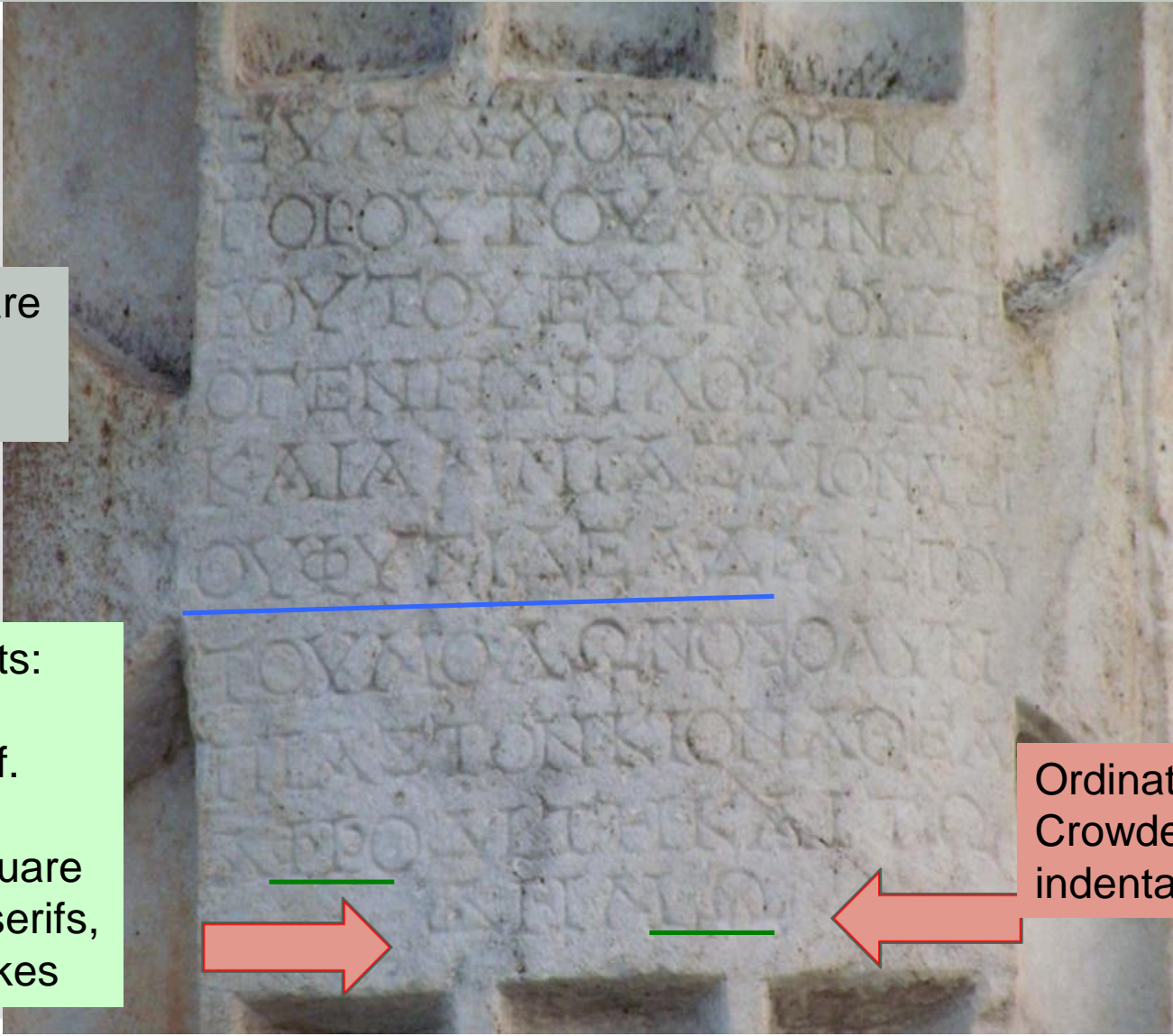

Stylistic similarities: Circular omega

Most regular and angular forms

Carving: Lighter carving of strokes in contrast with deeper heavier
Serifs.

Organisation: beautifully arranged.

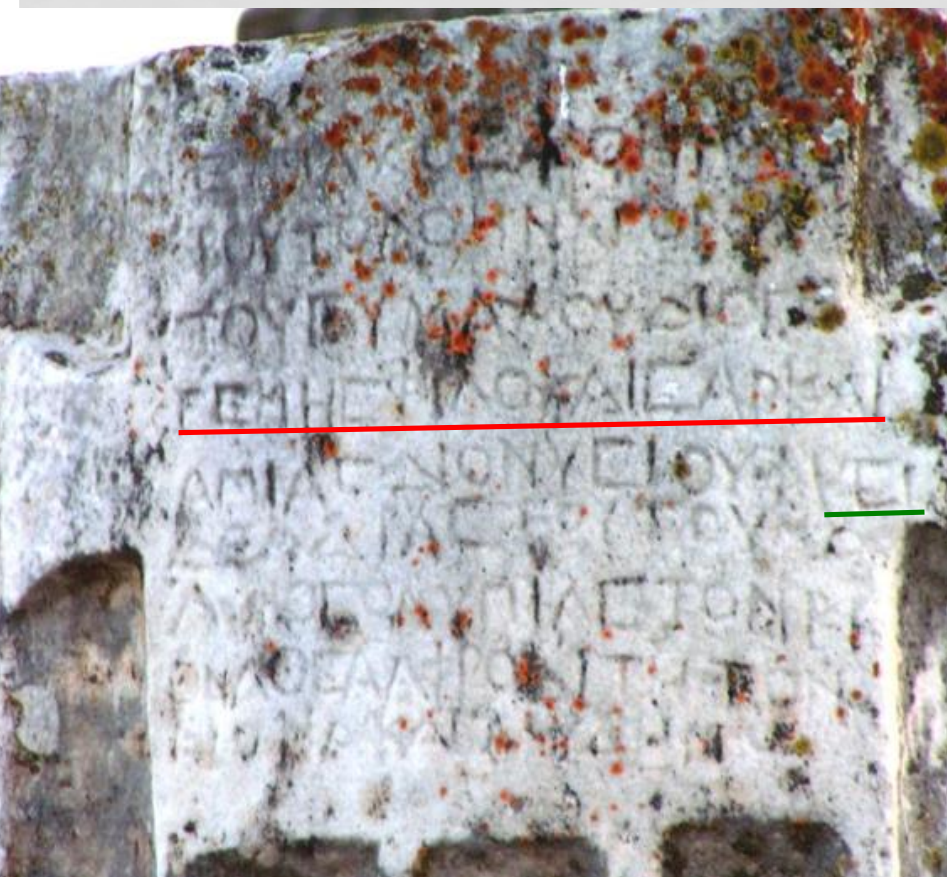

Letterforms: lunate sigma, lunate omega, no serifs. For parallel Lettering see *ALA* 29 & 30.

Ordinatio: Variations in letter size, uneven lines, Text running into the margins

HOW COULD WE IMPROVE OUR USE OF I.APH AS A RESOURCE

- Provide clear definitions of the dating criteria (e.g. context, lettering, prosopography) that are being used.
- Provide a case study to illustrate how the dating criteria are applied, and what difficulties arise in the process.
- Provide a basic chart of letters as well as observations about decorative elements and textual organisation (*ordinatio*) with links to sample inscriptions.
- Weblinks to further contextual information (in this case, archaeological information is available on the NYU website).
