### DATA TRANSPARANCY STATEMENT

The University of Warwick and University Hospitals Birmingham NHS Foundation Trust are the sponsors for this study based in the United Kingdom. We will be using information from your medical records in order to undertake this study and the University of Warwick will act as the data controller for this study. This means that we are responsible for looking after your information and using it properly. The University of Warwick will keep study data for a minimum of 10 years after the study has finished.

Your rights to access, change or move your information are limited, as we need to manage your information in specific ways in order for the research to be reliable and accurate. If you withdraw from the study prior to data analysis, we will remove the information about you that we have already obtained. If you withdraw from the study after data analysis we may not be able to remove the information about you. To safeguard your rights, we will use the minimum personally-identifiable information possible.

Your hospital will collect information about you for this research study from your medical records. This information will include your ethnic origin and health information, which is regarded as a special category information. We will use this information to evaluate the use and implementation of the ReSPECT form.

The hospital will keep your name, NHS number, date of birth and contact details confidential and will not pass this information to the University of Warwick. The hospital will use this information as needed, to make sure that relevant information about the study is recorded for your care, and to oversee the quality of the study. Certain individuals from the University of Warwick and regulatory organisations may look at your medical and research records to check the accuracy of the research study. The University of Warwick will only receive information without any identifying information. The people who analyse the information will not be able to identify you and will not be able to find out your name, NHS number, date of birth or contact details.

Your hospital will keep identifiable information about you from this study for a minimum of 10 years after the study has finished.

When you agree to take part in a research study, the information about your health and care may be provided to researchers running other research studies in this organisation and in other organisations. These organisations may be universities, NHS organisations or



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companies involved in health and care research in this country or abroad. Your information will only be used by organisations and researchers to conduct research in accordance with the UK Policy Framework for Health and Social Care Research.

This information will not identify you and will not be combined with other information in a way that could identify you. The information will only be used for the purpose of health and care research, and cannot be used to contact you or to affect your care. It will not be used to make decisions about future services available to you, such as insurance.
