2024 Faculty of Science, Engineering and Medicine Thesis prize and the Department of Psychology Impact Prize

- Submissions are now open for psychology entries for the 2024 Faculty of Science, Engineering and Medicine Thesis Prize (£500) and the Department of Psychology Impact Prize (£150).
- The competition is open to any theses which have been awarded in 2023, passed but not yet awarded (awaiting graduation) in 2023, or are passed and subject to only minor corrections in 2023 (i.e. theses

passed and viva undertaken between 1 January and 31 December 2023). This can include PhDs by Published Work.

- Nominations are made by the supervisors, but students are encouraged to self-nominate and talk to supervisor.
- Evidence from the supervisor must be provided in the form of a statement (one page A4 maximum) summarising the reasons why the thesis is outstanding or has created current/is likely to generate future impact. This could include mention of, for example, the quality of experimental or theoretical work reported, highly cited or papers, intellectual contributions, scholarship, breakthroughs made etc.
- Evidence of the quality of the thesis should be provided this can simply be a supporting statement from the external and/or internal thesis examiners.
- Nominations close on 29th March 2024 at 12 noon. Email nominations to Psychology PG Resource Account: psychologyPG@warwick.ac.uk.

The Department of English and Comparative Literary Studies invites you to a talk by Dr Kit Heyam on "Queer Sexual Knowledge in Early Modern England."

Abstract:

If we ask modern queer people about their experience of sex education, one frustration recurs: the difficulty of simply finding out what queer people do with each other. Scholars have recognised this problem as a feature of early modern culture too. As Valerie Traub has cogently asked, 'Can, in fact, people know what they want if they are missing the language by which to know it, think it, speak it?' While Traub poses this question about sex in general, this sentiment is – as the often queer focus of her work suggests – particularly applicable to queer sexual practices in the early modern period. Drawing on early modern legal and linguistic discourse, this paper unpicks the processes by which, for the people of early modern England, precise knowledge of queer sexual practices was often disabled and occluded. Considering sexual knowledge as a literary production, it argues for the importance of genre in shaping how writers negotiated this discursive environment. It asks, too, what ethical responsibilities the scholar of queer history has to their subjects, and how we might write a history of queer sexual knowledge which centres queer experience, agency and resilience.

Kit Heyam is an interdisciplinary scholar whose work focuses on **developing new methodological approaches to transgressive gender and sexuality in historical literature and culture**, both in academic research and in curatorial practice.

Their book *Before We Were Trans: A New History of Gender* (Basic Books UK/Seal Press, 2022) proposes a new approach to global trans history rooted in care, decolonial practice and cognisance of contemporary politics. As such, it represents a significant contribution to trans studies, providing a new methodological approach to contested histories of gender nonconformity in which gender is often culturally specific or inextricable from other experiences such as social role, sexuality and theatrical performance. It draws on both literary and historical sources, and argues that literary methodologies can help us to recognise our affective connection to the past and to shape an ethics of historiographical care for past and contemporary subjects.

The BPS Psychology of Women and Equalities Section invites submissions from undergraduate and postgraduate students who are submitting dissertations this academic year (2023-2024) or who submitted in the last three years for their student prizes. Please share with your networks, colleagues, and especially with your students. Do encourage your students to submit.

The prize scheme aims to recognise excellent feminist student work, from within psychology and the social sciences. We welcome submissions from people who are often under-represented (e.g. black, minoritised ethnicities, LGBTQIA+, disabled people), and from people who are not based in the UK and/or who do not use English as their first language.
