### Free workshop: explore belonging at Warwick

Belonging is about more than just feeling welcome. It is about building trust and feeling empowered to thrive, and you can discover more about it at the next Professional Services Excellence Network event.

On **Thursday 25 April, from 2-4pm in OC0.04** you can join a workshop on Warwick's Belonging Blueprint: A Student-Staff Collaboration and is your chance to learn more about and get involved with a new project we're running in collaboration with AdvanceHE.

The Belonging Blueprint project is a co-created, student-led initiative that attempts to provide some answers to the simple, yet powerful question: 'How can we ensure everyone at Warwick feels like they truly belong?'

This work is driven by student feedback and staff voices across departments in Warwick, and we want to hear from you too, so come along to this workshop to find out more.

By attending the workshop you will gain:

- A deeper understanding of what it means or could mean to belong at Warwick.
- Understanding of current work and approach to exploring and supporting belonging at Warwick.
- A space to share work and best practice around belonging from departments.
- How to support an atmosphere of belonging within/through your work.

The event will be run by Inca Hide-Wright, a PGT student completing an MASc in Community, Engagement and Belonging at Warwick, as well as two staff representatives from the Chemistry Department - Adam Alcock, Student Engagement and Experience Coordinator, and Dr Tom Ritchie, Assistant Professor and Director of Student Experience.

Throughout the workshop there will be ample space to ask questions about the project, discuss our work so far, share your insights, be a part of shaping the belonging framework at Warwick, and discuss more about what this will mean in practice.

The webinar will take place at 11:00 am - 12:00pm on Friday 22 March. During the webinar,

you'll have the opportunity to learn about the grants being launched directly from the AFSG Executive Committee, as well as hear from two past exploratory grant recipients:

- Dr Richard James (University of Nottingham) will discuss his project, harnessing gambling prevalence microdata to model socio-political and economic factors that contribute to gambling harm.

- Dr Philip Newall (University of Bristol) will present his project, a novel test of a widely-cited consequence of the illusion of control in gambling.

# **Postgraduate Support Research Grants**

Four awards are available, valued at up to £3,300 each.

Purpose: To support PhD students and to those who hold postdoctoral positions to offset the costs of conducting research that directly or indirectly informs efforts to address gambling-related harm.

EOI deadline: 16 April 23:59 BST. Application deadline: 14 May 23:59 BST

### About the AFSG

The AFSG is a group of academic researchers in the UK dedicated to advancing the research needed to effectively prevent, reduce, and address gambling harm. The purpose of the AFSG is to act as a coordinated body to assert the importance of rigorous, independent research to prevent, reduce, and address gambling harm in the UK. To accomplish its aims, the AFSG engages in a number of activities including, but not limited to: responding to or initiating calls for evidence; providing seed grants for promising research; supporting independent gambling conferences; public engagement; and providing support for early-career researchers.

All AFSG activities and grants are funded from <u>regulatory settlements for socially</u> <u>responsible purposes</u>. The Gambling Commission reviews and approves proposals for destinations of regulatory settlements. Funds are administered by Greo. For further information, contact <u>afsg-funding@greo.ca</u>
