Modules

Your Psychology degree at Warwick covers all core areas required for professional accreditation, while allowing flexibility to explore your interests and take modules beyond the department.

In your first year, you'll build strong foundations through core modules such as Brain & Behaviour, Neuropsychology and Psychopathology, Psychology in Context, and Research and Statistical Methods. These introduce key theories, biological and cognitive processes, and essential research skills, alongside support in developing academic confidence.

In the second year, modules explore psychology in greater depth and reflect contemporary research. Options may include Language and Cognition, Developmental Psychology, Psychobiology, Social Psychology, and Individual Differences. You'll also complete group research work and can choose an optional module from another department.

Your final year centres on an independent research project and a wide range of optional modules. Choices may include Clinical and Counselling Psychology, Sleep and Health, Psychology and the Law, Negotiation and Influence, Theory and Research on Emotion, Animal Behaviour, and Psychology Across Cultures. This flexibility allows you to tailor your degree to your career ambitions or academic interests.

You'll also get opportunities to make a research impact. Every year, you undertake a research project, develop your research skills, and during the summer, you can apply to our Undergraduate Research Support Scheme.
