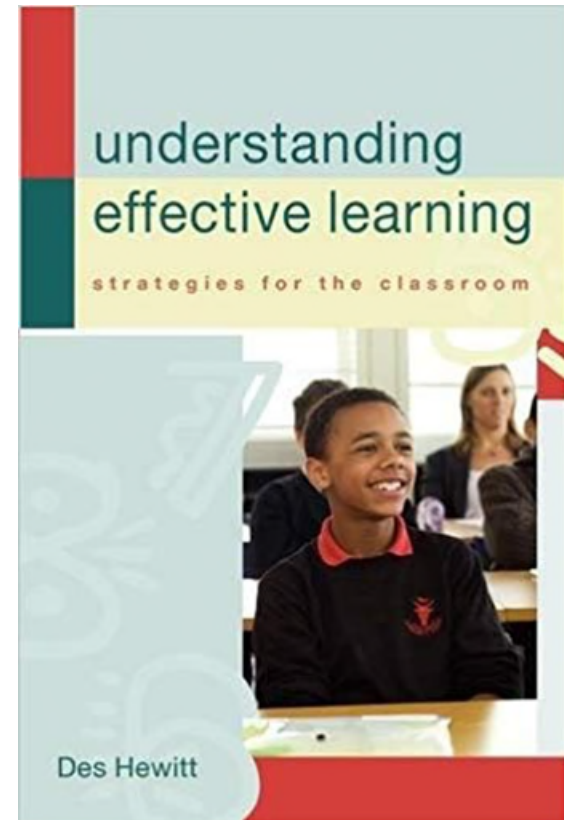
- To better understand teaching and learning of reading in primary and secondary

A investigation in four schools over four years through classroom observation, teacher and pupil interviews

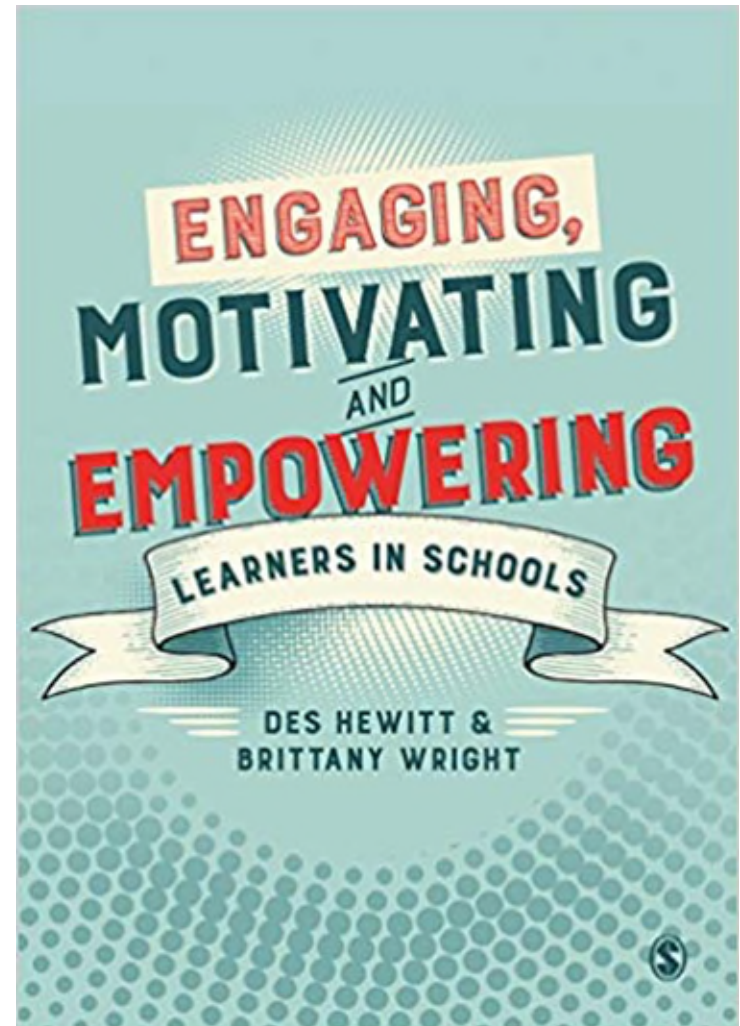

Research teaching and teaching research

- **Cognitive:** helps you learn about learning, teaching and assessment;
- **Social:** connects you with others
- **Affective:** recharges your batteries
- **Moral:** allows you to realise your values
- **Professional:** responsibility to contribute to the wider professional community
- **Pragmatic:** research is not a 'bolt on' to teaching

- ▶ IATL is inviting applications for project support from both students and staff which explore ways of fostering community and reimagining the future of learning at Warwick. Students can also apply for funding for research and performance projects of up to £1500.

What project support can I apply for?

- ▶ You can apply to IATL for up to £10,000. We encourage co-creation between staff and students for all projects. All projects over £1500 must include co-creation, with both students and staff working together on the project, and should engage with [Warwick's Education Strategy](#). The higher the amount applied for, the more directly we expect projects to engage with Warwick's Education Strategy and priorities.
