MSc students – great Academic Skills?

- Been away from study for a while?
- First time studying in the UK?
- Decide late an MSc was for you?
- Currently unsure if an MSc is for you?
- Pre-sessional very different from your undergrad?
 - Pace
 - Maths focus
 - Problem oriented approach

- This is a subject to study actively
- You've got to get messy
- Especially with maths!
- No one came up with a proof by working neatly line to line
- No one gets to understand a proof/derivation by working neatly line to line

- You are trying to understand methods
- And how to answer our questions using these methods
- Best approach is to try the questions
- Wrong attempts are informative
- Learning answers is uninformative
- Start with a blank piece of paper
- Use the questions to guide you through the lecture material and readings

- You are here to try and answer questions
- You are not here to learn old answers

- Exams contain new questions
- More so than U.G.
- You are here to answer questions
- You are not here to produce revision notes

- Do you go to the Seminar
- Yes
- Do you think this is good and productive of you?
- Have you attempted the questions?
 (and got most wrong/incomplete)
- No...
- May as well not bother
- Yes...
- Great, You are studying effectively for MSc Econ/EIFE/BES

- There is no expectation you present correct work in seminars
 - Or in discussions with academics
- The British system is based on trying and getting it wrong
- You need tools not answers

- Re-try with notes
- Attend the seminar with incomplete and wrong answers

Plagiarism offences

- Do the training and read the policy at Academic Integrity
- https://warwick.ac.uk/students/supportservices/academic_integrity

- Penalties range from 0 on the question to 0 on the assessment
 - For first offences; and rise from there
- There is no excuse for this

• We catch people using software, judgement, experience

Plagiarism: Policy and penalties

- An extremely serious offence
- Large penalties
 - Low or Zero marks for the submitted work
 - Breach of University Regulations and disciplinary proceedings
- An attempt to pass off some one else's ideas/effort as your own
 - Self-plagiarism is an offence
 - Must submit new work for credit
- Ignorance is not an excuse

Plagiarism: examples

- Reproducing ideas from another published work without citing the source
- Reproducing words from another published work without quotation marks and a citation of the source
- Copying another student's work and pretending it is yours, with or without their permission
- Including sections from a piece of work that you have submitted previously at any institution
- Downloading part or all of a document or ready-made essay from an internet website and pretending it is your own work
- Contract cheating
- Use of AI outside of the expectations of the assessment. E.g. Chat GPT wrote your essay
 - Tend to generate low marks
 - Investigation by Viva exam is increasingly common esp for the Dissertation module

The UK grading system (MSc)

A U.K. 70 is an outstanding mark

The top mark overall is usually around 82/83.
Sometimes less

A U.K. 60 is equivalent to a Chinese or U.S. 80 Pass = 50; Merit = 60; Distinction = 70.

Academic Writing

• A big topic for some, comfortable for others

- Asynchronous material already available EC959 Moodle
 - Developing questions and titles, as well as writing up your findings
 - Live sessions depending on demand and timetable constraints
- Everyone should contribute to writing in the Metrics project

Academic writing

- Read journal articles and look at how they work
 - Abstract
 - Introduction (literature review)
 - Methods/Techniques/Model
 - Results
 - Discussion
 - Conclusion is basically the abstract
- Don't try to write like professors in text books
- Keep your style simple. Convey information. Don't make normative judgements (about the importance of your work or results)

Referencing

- Pick a referencing style
- Stick to it
- It is essential the reader can find the article (source) based on your reference
- Citations are in-line: Author (DATE)
- Footnotes are minimal if they exist
- All citations in the Bibliography. Nothing else is in the bibliography
- Use software : endonote, bibtex etc.

Research and the dissertation

- You will forget everything I say now by the time you need it
- It's good to be thinking of areas, questions now
- Lectures should inspire some questions. You will have others
- Optional modules are a very productive place to find questions
- There is an EC959 methods course: more on specialist applied metrics
- Dissertation discussions/ briefings EIFE
- From an article of interest
 - Track the bibliography backwards
 - Track the citations forwards in EconLit/IDEAs/GoogleScholar
