BSc Economics

This rigorous and flexible degree will develop your skills in microeconomics, macroeconomics, and econometrics. You will learn to analyse and simplify complex economic issues - both theoretically and empirically - while gaining a deep understanding of global and local economic trends, institutions, and policy frameworks. From day one, you'll be immersed in a research-led learning environment, encouraged to engage with cutting-edge economic research and develop your own research questions. The programme's flexible structure allows you to tailor your studies through a wide range of optional modules, both within the Department of Economics and across other disciplines such as Law, Mathematics, Computer Science, Business and Languages.

BSc Economics and Management

Our BSc Economics and Management degree is designed to bring two disciplines together to enable you to develop a solid understanding of fundamental concepts of micro and macroeconomic analysis, business strategy and organisational leadership and provide you with a strong foundation in basic data analysis techniques and concepts of statistical analysis. The course will enable you to develop as a critically reflective thinker, able to perform economic policy analysis and to integrate broader economic issues into general management thinking. Together Economics and Management provide a comprehensive insight into the economic principles and managerial strategies essential for navigating and succeeding within the broader economic landscape.

BSc/BA Economics, Politics and International Studies

Our Economics, Politics and International Studies programme crosses subject boundaries, combining economics and political analysis. It enables you to contextualise economic theory and practice within national and global political structures and behaviour. It also gives a rounded perspective of how governments, companies and individuals function in the 21st century, with up-to-date analysis and debate of key events.

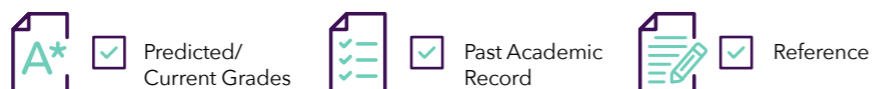

Test of Mathematics for University Admissions (TMUA)

Applications to our Economics degrees are primarily assessed based on an applicant's predicted/current grades and past academic record.

We understand that applicants may also choose to sit the **Test of Mathematics for University Admission (TMUA)**. While not a requirement for any of our degree courses, if available, TMUA scores may be considered when determining which applicants receive an offer.

For Economics (L100) and Economics and Management (LN12), applicants who achieve the highest TMUA scores may be eligible for a reduced offer of AAA, including Mathematics.

For Economics Politics and International Studies (LLD2), applicants who achieve the highest TMUA scores may be eligible for a reduced offer of AAA, including A*/Grade 8 in GCSE Maths.

The exact TMUA score required for a reduced offer will be determined after all results have been received and will not be published.

APPLICANTS WHO DO NOT SIT TMUA WILL BE GIVEN FULL CONSIDERATION.

Please note that TMUA is **not** used in the assessment of applicants who are eligible for a Contextual Offer

Fees & Funding

Study Abroad

Studying abroad offers you the opportunity to experience an alternative university system, improve your language skills and gain an understanding of another country that can only be obtained by living and studying in it.

How to apply

In the first term of your second year you will be invited to an information session that will outline details of the application process. This is usually split into two stages:

STAGE 1

Submit an application to the Department of Economics

STAGE 2

Once approved, apply directly to the institution that you hope to study with, with support from the Department and the Student Mobility Office.

Eligibility

To be considered for a placement through the Department of Economics, you should*

- ▶ Achieve 65% or above across your first and second years of study.
- ▶ Complete a short personal statement of why you want the opportunity to study abroad.
- ▶ Hold a level 5 in the language which is taught in the institution to which you are applying to.

Please note

- ▶ It is not possible to apply for the Study Abroad Year via UCAS
- ▶ Those studying Economics and Management are not eligible to apply for Study Abroad

*Each application is judged on an individual basis. We will also take into account the view of your Personal Tutor in terms of your suitability to undertake a year abroad; your general attendance and your performance in your first year. Thus, you are advised to discuss your desire to study abroad with your Personal Tutor as soon as possible. Eligibility requirements may change by year of application. Study abroad opportunities are often over-subscribed and therefore cannot be guaranteed.

Work Placement Year

If you choose Economics & Management, you will have the option to undertake a work placement during your third year, giving you the opportunity to apply your skills and knowledge in a real work setting before returning to Warwick for your final year of studies. Examples of placements undertaken by students in the past include Accenture, BMW, Deloitte, EY, HSBC, L'Oreal, Microsoft, Samsung, Toyota and Vodafone.

When you embark on your placement, you will receive support from your Year Away Director (based in WBS), ensuring a structured and supportive environment throughout your time away.

If you are successful in gaining a work placement, your degree will become a four-year programme and, if you pass the Year Away in Context module, the title of your course changes to add the suffix 'with Placement Year' to the existing title (e.g. 'BSc Economics and Management with Placement Year').

Voluntary Year Out

The Voluntary Year Out Scheme is designed to enable you to put into practice the skills learned as part of your course and to develop broad-based transferable skills which will stand you in good stead when looking to enter the workplace after graduation. If you plan to take a Voluntary Year Out (VYO), you are expected to self-source your own placement opportunity but our Senior Careers Consultant offers a range of support services including 1:1 Careers Guidance Appointments, mock interviews and Economics bi-weekly Bulletins containing VYO opportunities to best support you through this opportunity.

Organisations which typically offer Economics-related placement years include the UK Government Economic Service, Fathom Consulting and Oxford Economics. Students have also experienced placements at institutions such as Deloitte, Bank of England and Red Bull Racing!

Wanting to go abroad?

If you are a Student Visa Holder it may be possible to do a work placement in your home country - just check in with the Warwick's Student Visa Advice Service in order to explore this option.

If you are a UK student wanting to do a VYO abroad, you would need to make your own arrangements for applying for a relevant visa to work abroad.

Transformative Learning

We offer an advanced, internationally focused education in economics that is intellectually demanding and professionally relevant, applying economic modelling to both traditional and typical spheres of analysis, including voting theory, international trade, fintech and the economics of public policy.

Our teaching is research-led which means you'll be learning from some of the most prominent academic economists in the UK. Throughout the degree, you will have many opportunities to apply the principles of economics to practical study, making your learning highly relevant to real-world issues.

Class Size

Some of the core modules may have 200-600 students in them, whereas your weekly or fortnightly support and feedback classes will have around 17-25 students.

Contact Hours

In your first year, you will receive approximately three hours of contact time per day, so making it, on average, 15 hours per week. This reduces to 12 hours per week in your second year and 10 hours per week in your final year.

Independent Learning

You will also be expected to undertake independent study, to help you develop your own research and learning and become an independent, active learner.

Assessments

You will usually have more formative assessments in first year than in your second and final year. The typical module in your first and second year are based 20-30% on coursework and 70-80% on the final examination, but assessment weights and methods do still vary, particularly for final year modules.

Research Opportunities

We aim to engage in innovative research which extends the frontiers of the discipline, contributing to a deeper understanding of how modern economies function and how they can adapt to future challenges.

No matter which programme you choose, you'll design and conduct your own research projects during your course, and you'll get to tailor projects to your developing interests.

Cross Faculty Research Scheme

The Cross Faculty Research Scheme offers students the opportunity to take part in an interdisciplinary group research project with students from across different subjects from the Social Science faculty.

Undergraduate Research Support Scheme (URSS)

URSS gives you the chance to apply to carry out a summer research project whilst being supervised by an academic member of staff. The scheme provides living expenses (up to £1,000) and skills development training.

Research in Applied Economics and Research Methods in Economics

Our distinctive final-year undergraduate research project, your dissertation, is your chance to study a topic that interests you. By the end of the project, you'll understand how economists approach questions, in particular, how to construct hypotheses and use data to discriminate between alternate explanations for events or patterns. You will also have gained experience in using statistical and/or mathematical modelling software, conducting individual research and presenting your findings in a range of different formats.

The Research Methods in Economics module provides an opportunity to deepen and consolidate previous knowledge by applying many concepts within economics to consider research into a topic of your choice. Through this module you are offered an opportunity to learn how economists do research, by carrying out either a critical evaluation of the literature in a chosen area, or by a replication of an empirical study. You will be expected to use a combination of economics analysis and statistical techniques.

Frequently Asked Questions

Which subjects are the best?

We do not specify a subject mix, but we particularly value applicants who can demonstrate a strong breadth of study and academic interest through a combination of GCSEs and A level subjects.

Are Further Maths or Economics essential subjects?

Further Maths and Economics are not essential, although they are fine subject choices for a student considering Economics at degree level. We treat Further Maths as any other strong A Level subject: it has no special status. On average, 30% of students have taken Further Maths at A Level (or equivalent) and 80% have taken Economics A Level (or equivalent), however, this can vary from year to year.

Do you consider the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ)?

The most important thing is to meet our grade offer (A levels and GCSEs). An EPQ would not replace either of these, and it wouldn't change the level of offer we would ask for. It is fine in terms of overall profile, demonstrating your interest in economics. Whilst we want well-rounded applicants, we realise opportunities offered by schools vary significantly and we would not want to disadvantage applicants whose schools do not offer the EPQ.

Will I get an offer if I am predicted to make the grades?

Due to the high volume of applications we receive, unfortunately, each year we have to turn down applicants who are predicted to meet or exceed our minimum grades. A successful application should be strong in all areas including: predicted/current grades, past academic record and academic reference.

What is TMUA?

The Test of Mathematics for University Admissions (TMUA) tests your mathematical thinking and reasoning skills. We understand that applicants may choose to sit the TMUA. While not a requirement for any of our degree courses, if available, TMUA scores may be considered when determining which applicants receive an offer.

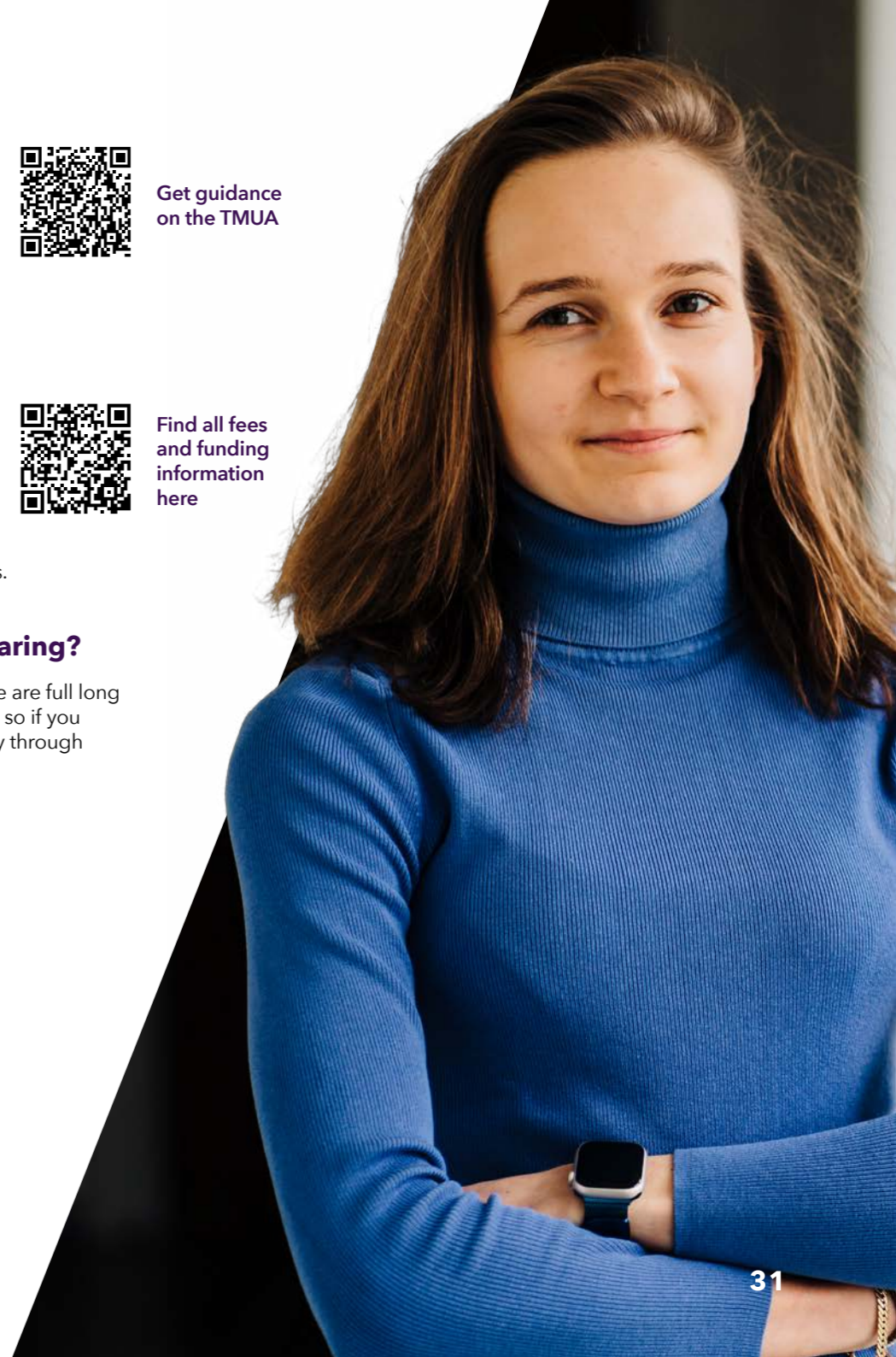
We rarely use Clearing and typically we are full long before the Adjustment process begins so if you want to come to Warwick, please apply through UCAS by the January deadline.

Will a fourth A Level advantage me?

We will only consider your best three A Levels (including essential subject requirements). If you wish to drop an A Level after applying, you will need to let the Undergraduate Admissions Team know by contacting them at ugadmissions@warwick.ac.uk.



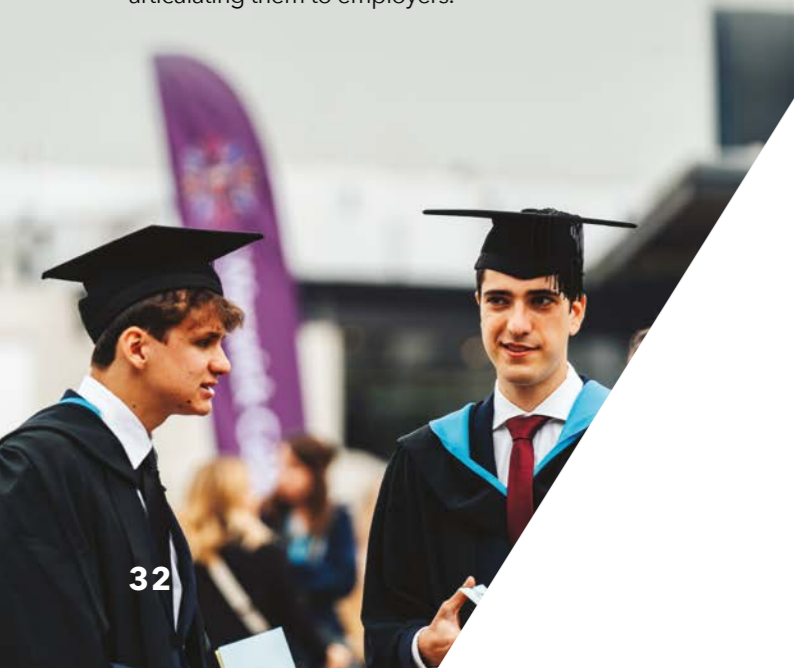

Dedicated Support

Our Student Opportunity careers team can assist you to devise and implement your long-term career plans. They run a packed programme of employer-led skills sessions and presentations and host careers fairs and events attended by a wide range of employers. The Department also organises in-person and online careers seminars with alumni and external speakers from a range of careers after completing a degree in Economics. You can book career guidance appointments with our Senior Careers Consultant all year round and get support with making applications and completing video interviews.

E-Mentoring Programme

Our E-mentoring scheme allows you to connect with our alumni to gain insights and connections that can help make your career dreams a reality. Your mentor will share advice and personal experiences, and you'll gain a new perspective on the possibilities open to you after graduation.

Personal Development Module (PDM)

Our compulsory first-year module will help you address areas for development identified by employers and our students. There's a focus on developing both academic and employability skills and on broadening your education in Economics. With compulsory elements such as the Economic Briefings Project and optional elements such as IT training courses and careers events, you can develop the skills relevant to you. At the end of the module, you are required to undertake a self-reflection activity to support you to reflect on your experience and promote your abilities to potential employers.

Warwick Internship Scheme For Economists (WISE)

Our Warwick Internship Scheme for Economics will allow you to add to your CV and gain an insight into how an academic department operates. You will have the opportunity to apply to work as a paid intern for the Department and gain valuable skills for employment such as research skills, communications skills, report writing, event organisation and project management.

You will work with colleagues to support research, teaching and broader departmental activities. Last year, 31 students completed a total of 2340 hours as part of WISE and working in a variety of roles supporting academic research, teaching and administration.

Supporting you

We have put in place a dedicated support network to help you with any concerns – academic or pastoral.

This support comes in a variety of ways, aimed at strengthening different aspects of your academic studies, including support with module content and preparation for assessments.

Undergraduate Office

The Undergraduate Office team within the Department of Economics will be your first port of call for any enquiries.

Personal, Senior and Year Tutors

You will be assigned a Personal Tutor to whom you can talk to about any matter, academic or pastoral. Your Year Tutor oversees the personal tutoring system for a specific year group.

The Senior Tutor has responsibility for the operation and design of the economics academic and pastoral care system.

Advice and Feedback Hours

Faculty members hold Advice and Feedback hours every week during term time. This is a chance to have a one-to-one conversation about any academic queries you have.

Student Support and Progression Officers

Our Student Wellbeing and Progression Officers hold regular drop-in sessions where you can talk about anything that is troubling you.

Director of Student Engagement and Progression

The Director of Student Engagement and Progression has responsibility for the operation and design of student engagement such as the student event programme, as well as analysing student progression data.

Advisor to LGBTQIA+ Students

Our advisor to LGBTQIA+ students is there to ensure LGBTQIA+ students have the appropriate support to achieve their full potential.

Advisor to International Students

The Advisor to International Students provides additional support to overseas students to help them adjust to studying in the UK.

Advisor to Female Students

Our Advisor to Female Students provides a source of additional support to ensure that our female students receive appropriate support to achieve their potential.

Advisor for Students with Disabilities

Our Disability Advisors are here to ensure access to our programmes is equitable to all of our students and they are on hand to provide you with the support and advice you need.

Report and Support Advisor

The Report and Support Advisor offers support to students who experience bullying or harassment of any kind. Our community is an environment where prejudice and socially unacceptable behaviour are never tolerated.

Academic Careers Coordinator and Departmental Senior Careers Consultant

Our Academic Careers Coordinator is based within the department and supports students in the transition from university into the job market or onto further study, along with identifying ways in which students can enhance their employability skills. The Departmental Careers Consultant is a qualified careers professional and available to support students in exploring career ideas through 1:1 appointments.

Student-Staff Liaison Committee (SSLC)

The SSLC offers students the opportunity to engage with staff, and to have real influence on major Department initiatives in teaching, learning and the wider student experience.

Undergraduate Mentoring Scheme

When you arrive at Warwick you will be allocated a second and/or third-year mentor who will help you settle into life at Warwick by providing advice, guidance and friendship.

Maths and Stats Drop-ins

We run weekly sessions during term time if you need to ask questions or get help on any aspect of Maths/Stats within your economics modules.

Revision Sessions

In advance of the tests on core modules, we will provide students with approximately an hour of revision sessions.

RAE Helpdesk

For students taking EC331, Research in Applied Economics, there is a Helpdesk where you can speak to a member of staff and gain support and advice about technical and software aspects of your research.



Transition Resources

Prior to arrival and during the start of first year, we provide a wide range of helpful resources to students to ensure a smooth transition to university. This includes recommended reading, mathematics and economics resources and academic writing classes. We also run a transition event specifically designed for students from Widening Participation backgrounds.

Library Support

Bespoke Library Support is on offer to all students studying economics at Warwick.
