ABOUT THE RESEARCH

Since 2021, the School of Law at the University of Warwick have been researching the nature of local police engagement with different communities through arts and culture and what it can achieve. What opportunities and challenges are there in using creative initiatives to bring police and communities together in shared spaces? And how might the empathy and emotional connection generated through this kind of work change the way that the police understand and carry out their role?

We found that there are many challenges with these creative initiatives, for example some people don't want to take part in any activities with the police; and some police officers question whether they really have the time to be doing these projects. At the same time, however, we have found that these arts interventions can be a powerful catalyst in helping communities and police officers to find ways of expressing their experiences and perspectives to one another, of working together collaboratively, and to challenge stereotypes of one another.

We wanted to bring this research to a wider audience, and to bring young people and police officers into a shared space to explore these issues through different creative methods. That's what today is about: a brand-new play, written by Amahra Spence, which draws on our research findings; an exhibition from Kay Rufai; and creative scribing from Nifty Fox to capture your thoughts and responses throughout the day.
