### **Term Dates:**

The academic year is split into two terms.

Term one runs from October to February.

Term two runs from April to August.

There is an exam session at the end of each term, as there are no full year modules.

### **Orientation:**

The Universität des Saarlandes has an International Office. They arrange orientation events before the start of term.

## **Accommodation & Cost of Living:**

Exchange students can apply for rooms in student halls which are run by the "Studentenwerk im Saarland e.V.". There is an online application procedure.

A certain number of rooms in student halls is specifically reserved for ERASMUS students, however a place is not guaranteed. The application process is run by the Welcome Center.

There are lots of private rental choices in the town and the university recommends a budget of €250 to €330 per month for a rented room, or €350 (or more) per month for an apartment.

The Welcome Center provides information and support for international students looking for accommodation.

## **Academic Requirements:**

### **Module Choices:**

During your year you are required to take 60 ECTS worth of courses.

You are required to take the following **compulsory** modules:

### **Optional modules:**

In addition to these courses, you have a wide choice of options. Optional modules can cover any area of law, provided the host university offers the module for exchange students, but must be taught in German. Students are permitted to study non-law modules (including language courses) for up to 15 ECTS worth of courses.

### **Exams:**

Students are required to take written exams for the **compulsory modules** Bürgerliches Vermögensrecht I and Bürgerliches Vermögensrecht II and EITHER Staatsrecht I and Staatsrecht II OR Strafrecht I and Strafrecht II.

If a written exam is not offered for exchange students an oral exam can replace the written exam, but Law School permission is required.

If there is a separate exam for the *Arbeitsgemeinschaft* (seminar) for either of these courses the students may take an additional written or oral exam for the seminar which will generally count towards the mark of that course.

Students may take either written or oral exams for the compulsory module *Einführung in die deutsche Rechtsordnung* and all the optional modules.

### **Module Translation:**

Please not that module translation rules and conversion tables are under review every year and subject to change.

One full module mark:

Average of marks for *Einführung in das deutsche Recht* + marks for *Bürgerliches Vermögensrecht I* (Vorlesung + Arbeitsgemeinschaft) + marks for *Bürgerliches Vermögensrecht II* (Vorlesung + Arbeitsgemeinschaft)

One half module mark:

Average of marks for *Staatsrecht I* (Vorlesung + Arbeitsgemeinschaft) + marks for *Staatsrecht II* (Vorlesung + Arbeitsgemeinschaft) OR Marks for *Strafrecht I* (Vorlesung + Arbeitsgemeinschaft) + Marks for *Strafrecht II* (Vorlesung + Arbeitsgemeinschaft).

One half module mark:

Average of marks for optional modules.
