<u>University of Toronto-Warwick University Global Health and Human Rights Training Program</u> <u>Call for Applications</u>

We call for applications to a new interdisciplinary international training program on global health and human rights for graduate students at the University of Toronto's Dalla Lana School of Public Health (DLSPH), University of Toronto Faculty of Law, and Warwick University Faculty of Law. The program's objectives are to provide fellows with academic and practical experience in global health and human rights. Successful applicants will receive a one-year fellowship to complete coursework, complete a three-week exchange practicum with one of our core faculty members (Professor Lisa Forman, DLSPH, Professor Trudo Lemmens, UofT Law/DLSPH, or Professor Sharifah Sekalala, Warwick University) or with a civil society partner (Afya Nahaki in Kampala, Uganda or the Kenya Legal and Ethical Issues Network on HIV and AIDS (KELIN) in Nairobi, Kenya), and participate in an annual colloquium.

Eligibility: Master's and PhD students at DLSPH; JD, LLM, and SJD students at UofT Faculty of Law; and LLB, LLM, and PhD students at Warwick University are eligible to apply. Six fellows will be selected each year.

Fellowship requirements:

- (1) <u>Coursework</u>: Complete 1 relevant course at the University of Toronto DLSPH or the Faculty of La; or at the Warwick University Faculty of Law. Courses include human rights and global health courses at the University of Toronto or Warwick University including: *CHL5704*: *The Right to Health in International Law* at the DLSPH taught by Forman; and *LAW267H1F*: *Health Law and Bioethics* at the Faculty of Law taught by Lemmens, and any health, human rights, global health law or intellectual property related courses at Warwick University Faculty of Law School.
- (2) <u>Practica</u>: Fellows will complete either (a) A three-week research exchange practicum at Warwick University (for UofT students) or at UofT law or public health (for Warwick University); or (b) a three-week civil society practicum at <u>Afya Nahaki</u> in Kampala, Uganda or the <u>Kenya Legal and Ethical Issues</u> <u>Network on HIV and AIDS (KELIN)</u> in Nairobi, Kenya to assist in legal cases or legal and public health research.
- (3) <u>Annual fellow workshop</u>: Fellowships will culminate in an annual 1-day fellow workshop where fellows will engage with a leading global health and human rights keynote speaker and present their research findings and training insights.

<u>Criteria for selection</u>: Fellows will be selected based on: (1) the relevance of their existing research and experience to the program focus on global health and human rights, (2) their interest in pursuing academic and professional careers in this domain, (3) stage appropriate indicators of academic excellence (e.g., honours and awards, publications, conferences etc.), and (4) diversity, inclusion, and equity.

<u>Application process</u>: Please submit a letter of motivation (maximum 2 pages), resume, and grades by 20 June 2023 to <u>lisa.forman@utoronto.ca</u>. In your letter of motivation, please outline your interest and suitability for this program, and indicate your preference for a research exchange or civil society practicum. Successful applicants will be informed by late July 2023.
