We have a great range of submissions so are expecting a productive, supportive and enjoyable two days in the Midlands. Please find below some additional information on the workshop:

**Papers:** All the papers are shared on Dropbox (only for participants). It is expected that participants will have read the other papers on their panels, and hoped that they will read all the conference papers to move our debates forward from a grounded point of engagement.

**Presentation:** As announced before, you will <u>not</u> give a presentation of your paper during the sessions. Rather, the paper will be introduced by a discussant (10min) followed by a response of the author (10min) and Q&A with the rest of the group (10min). Thus, you will be the discussant of someone else's paper. **Please consult the conference programme to see whose paper you will have to present.** 

If you do a PowerPoint presentation (you do not have to):

- We encourage you to share it with the author in advance
- Please bring the presentation on a flash drive or memory stick, the rooms will have computers.

**Pitching:** To kickstart the workshop, we have a 90min session where everyone has the chance to pitch their paper to all participants within 2min; the challenge is to keep it short, highlight the most important points and make it interesting. We think that this will give people an overview of who's who, encourage more interaction and provide a guide for which panels to attend.

In addition, our keynote speaker Yuval Millo will attend the pitching session and afterwards identify and address some meta-questions and cross-paper topics to spark conversation and encourage discussions about possible collaborations.

## **Getting here:**

By train: The best stations to go to are either Coventry or Learnington Spa, and you will then need to get a bus to the campus.

- From Coventry: 12x Bus from the Train Station and get off at the final stop, called Interchange Stop UW2 (Google <u>details here</u>). The bus is about every 15 minutes and takes about 20-25 minutes from the station. Busses 11/11U also goes to the University of Warwick but take a detour (35-40min). The bus is cash only so make sure you have £4 for a daysaver ticket!
- From Leamington Spa: Take a U1, U2 (~30 minutes) or 11 (~40 minutes).
- By coach: The most convenient destination is Coventry's Pool Meadow Bus Station
  which is served by National Express and Megabus. Once you have arrived, take the 12x
  from the Bus station and get off at the final stop, see above: From Coventry (it's the
  same bus but a previous bus stop)

On Campus: To navigate the campus here is the <u>handy campus interactive map</u>. The conference will take place in the Social Science Buildings in the *PAIS Common Room, S1.50, S2.77*, and *E2.02*. The keynotes will be held in the Zeeman Building in room *MS.05*. The breakaway session will take place in the Wolfson Research Exchange, in the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor of the library.
