- If everyone is to blame, then no one is.

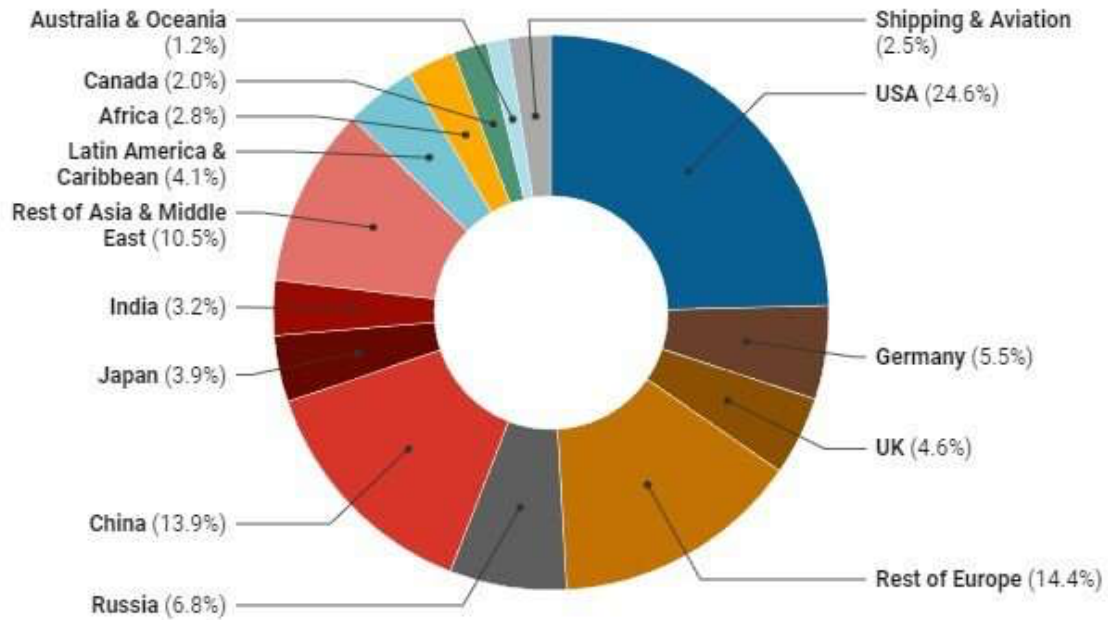
