



- What is security?
- Reframe security as a human as well as state condition...
- "Thus, historically, masculinity combined with militarism defined who was a good nationalist, while the perceived lack of these traits became a source of shame and delegitimation of one's nationalist credentials (Mosse, 1996: 7; Nagel, 1998: 249). A key function of gendered militarism, then, is not only to confer identity, but also to enact exclusionary politics within the nation-state. Thus, citizens who choose not to participate in or, worse, denounce the nation's militarism are feminized and stigmatized. In this way, non-militarized citizens are rendered to the private sphere. (Gani 2021)
