Studying Philosophy, Politics and Economics (PPE) enables you to develop your own answers to these questions and to consider the world from the viewpoint of philosophers, economists and political scientists.

Bridge the Disciplines

Instead of studying the three subjects independently, our bridge model enables you to explore how the topics interact. You will focus on important real-life issues at the intersection of the disciplines and examine them from a truly interdisciplinary perspective.

Examples of recent topics explored on the course include climate change, migration and refugees, ethical limitations of markets, welfare measurement, national and global governance, and global public goods.

Flexibility to Specialise

You'll have the flexibility to tailor your degree to your own interests by choosing from a range of core and optional modules across six pathways through the degree. Our pathways allow you to choose to study all three subjects in equal proportions, or you may focus on two of the three subjects in more depth.

In addition to core modules carefully designed to provide you with a solid foundation in all three subjects, you will be able to choose from a wealth of optional modules. You will also have the opportunity to take options from at least one other subject area, such as business, law, psychology, sociology, history or modern languages.

A Diverse and Active Community

You will be part of a community of around 175 PPE students in your year group, with approximately 35% of students coming from outside the UK. Studying with peers from all over the world, you'll have the opportunity to work alongside the multiple perspectives of people from different backgrounds, cultures, and experiences.

THE COURSE

YEAR ONE

PPE Foundations

Your PPE programme will introduce you to the foundations of the three disciplines. This will enable you to specialise and hone your skills to best suit your interests and career path.

Your first year comprises foundation modules in each department.

- Introduction to Philosophy
- Introduction to Politics
- Economics 1
- Quantitative Techniques, comprised of:
- 1. Mathematical Techniques A or B
- 2. Statistical Techniques A or B

In the Introduction to Philosophy module, you'll study a wide range of historical and contemporary philosophical topics such as moral philosophy, aesthetics, and logic. In Politics you will study some of the core ideologies in political science, combining theory and political practice.

With Economics you will cover micro and macroeconomics, developing the ability to apply analytical techniques to real world problems. Mathematical and statistical modules are available at either an intermediate or advanced level, enabling you to study these topics at the level best suited to you.

"I deeply appreciated being able to cater my core optional modules to my personal needs and interests during first year. All PPE students have an opportunity to decide the level of Mathematics and Statistics they wish to study. Since I was mostly interested in Economics, I decided to take up the more advanced modules as I knew these would provide me with a strong quantitative foundation to specialise in that subject in subsequent years. Despite its demanding nature, support is readily available to students in the form of advice and feedback hours, and collective study between peers is encouraged through module-specific study groups. Overall, I had a very pleasant experience and am confident that, through these modules, I have greatly improved my data handling as well as statistical modelling skills."

YEAR TWO

Tailor Your Degree

In your second year you'll select a pathway, choosing either to continue on a Tripartite course and study all three disciplines, or to move to a Bipartite course and specialise in two of the subjects. You may also choose to major in Economics, which will allow you to graduate with a BSc rather than a BA.

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YEAR THREE

Integrate Your Studies

In your third year you'll be able to choose the majority of your course from the large range of optional modules offered by the departments, giving you the opportunity to study the subjects that interest you most. Many students also elect to take a dissertation or a research project either in PPE or the field of their choice.

You will also choose at least two from a list of three interdisciplinary modules in Principles of Political Economy, which each combine two of the three disciplines.

These modules are available only to PPE students and are designed as part of our bridge model, providing real life context so that you can integrate your studies in the three disciplines and focus on important topics at the intersection of philosophy, politics, and economics.

OPTIONAL MODULES

Combine Your Passions

Our academics provide research-led teaching, which means that they keep content fresh and up-to-date with current thinking and developments in their subject.

We also add new modules in line with research developments and in response to student feedback. So you'll be choosing from a widespread selection of interesting specialisms and interdisciplinary options.

In Philosophy, you will study with world-leading scholars in both analytic and continental philosophy. Topics in past years have included: Hegel, Nietzsche, Sartre, Film, Aesthetics, Feminism, Time, Terrorism, and Mind.

The Politics and International Studies department has four research clusters, whose world-leading work provides the basis for research-led teaching in comparative politics and democratisation, political theory and public policy, international political economy, and international relations and security.

In Economics, you will have many opportunities to apply the principles of economics to practical study, focussing on areas such as development economics, the EU, behavioural economics, public policy, banking, industrial economics and international trade.

Explore New Subjects

Optional modules are also available from outside the departments. These can come from other areas in the Social Sciences and Humanities. Particularly popular are Warwick Business School, Law, Psychology, Sociology, History, and interdisciplinary modules with the Institute of Advanced Teaching and Learning.

Another option is to study a language. Languages are particularly popular if you intend to apply for a year abroad as part of your studies. We teach a wide variety of languages at Warwick, including Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, Russian and Spanish.

The variety of subjects you can familiarise yourself with is the best aspect of studying PPE. I have taken modules from four different departments in the past three years, and I absolutely enjoyed combining all the knowledge and skills I have acquired.

YOUR LEARNING


Teaching

Most modules are taught using a combination of weekly lectures and seminars. Lectures provide you with information, analysis and argument, on the basis of which you prepare for discussion or problem solving in your seminars.

Seminars are much smaller groups, in which you deepen your learning through interactive group discussion, debates, and exchange of ideas. Tutors will provide you with reading, instructions, notes or tasks, and guide work and discussions. You'll be expected to prepare independently or in groups and share your views and debate the issues and concepts with your classmates.

Class Size

In the majority of your modules, you will learn alongside students on single honours and other joint degrees, exposing you to a wide range of knowledge from your peers. Therefore, some core module lectures may have up to 500 students in them, while optional module lectures may have from 30 up to around 200. Seminars usually have 14 to 18 students.



Contact Hours

Each module has scheduled hours of roughly three hours per week. So, in first year you will receive around 15 hours of contact time per week. This reduces to 12 hours per week in your second and final years. In your third year you may choose to place a stronger emphasis on individual research by taking a dissertation or research project.

Alongside timetabled teaching, you are encouraged to make use of regular feedback sessions and opportunities to speak with module directors and seminar tutors. Departments also offer many extra academic activities, including optional lectures, colloquia, discussion groups and workshops.

Independent Learning

You will be expected to undertake independent study, helping you to develop your critical thinking and research skills. This environment of independent study will equip you with key skills for future careers, fostering self-discipline, initiative and a proactive approach to challenges.

Assessments

You'll be assessed through a mix of exams, tests, essays and other assessments, and you'll get extensive feedback to help you progress. You'll also have formative essays and tests, which are assessments that may not contribute marks to your overall grade. They will, however, provide you with invaluable feedback on what is required from your degree, and guidance on how to develop your style and skills in preparation for your main assessments and exams. Some modules allow you to choose your assessment method, or occasionally try different styles of assessment, such as filmmaking and blogging.

The assessment system is highly flexible. I have been able to choose the assessment methods that suited me best. It gave me a lot of freedom in my organisation. It also allowed me to optimise my results by selecting the best assessment formats for me.

STUDY ABROAD

Broaden Your Horizons

Studying abroad will encourage you to embrace different perspectives, challenge traditional ways of thinking, and provide an opportunity to fully immerse yourself in another culture.

Studying PPE gives you access to a wide range of prestigious universities around the world via the three departments, all with their own long-standing partnerships.

Integrated: Study Abroad within your Three-Year Degree

An integrated year allows you to apply in first year to replace the second year of your degree programme with a year abroad. The marks you earn while overseas will count as the second year of your degree results, and you will take equivalent modules to meet your pathway requirements. In recent years our students have taken part in exchanges in Canada.

Intercalated: Study Abroad Adding a Year to Your Degree

The intercalated option will add one year to your degree programme, with your year abroad taken between your second and final years. The grades obtained don't count directly towards your degree, but if you pass the year then your degree certificate will show "with intercalated year".

You will be invited to apply during the first term of second year to one of your pathway departments. It is a competitive process, but there are a lot of opportunities available. Each year roughly 20% of PPE students from a cohort study abroad.

WORK PLACEMENT

Apply Theory to Practice

Work placements provide an opportunity for you to develop skills, learn from industry professionals, and explore potential future career paths.


You can undertake a full-year or part-year intercalated work placement in the UK or abroad. You could even combine a part-year work placement with a part-year study abroad placement. We also provide support and guidance around identifying and applying for placements.

Our students have undertaken placements with employers from the private, public, and third sectors. This includes Governmental Bodies, Banks, NGOs, Consultancies, Research Institutions, and many more.

Extend Your Interests

You can explore real-world applications of your academic interests through our research assistantship scheme. You will be able to assist faculty members with their own work, providing you with invaluable hands-on experience and insights into their research.

The Warwick Undergraduate Research Scholarship Scheme gives you the opportunity to carry out a summer research project whilst being supervised by an academic member of staff. You will receive living expenses and skills development training.

In addition, PPE students regularly take part and present at both the International Conference for Undergraduate Research (ICUR) and British Conference for Undergraduate Research (BCUR).

STUDY

Our Community

We believe it's important to ensure that PPE students have their own identity and community. You will have your own facilities, with a dedicated PPE Office and common room which acts as a hub for PPE students to gather, debate, and work together. The dedicated PPE academic staff are located here too, and all three departments are nearby. The Social Sciences building is right in the heart of campus next to the Library, Arts Centre, and near to the main lecture theatres.

We also organise social events for you to relax and get to know your peers and tutors outside of the classroom. Recent socials have included a quiz night, summer barbecues, and pizza lunches with the PPE Director. We also hold an annual dinner and welcome PPE alumni back to campus to share their career experiences.

Department Activities

Each department actively engages with students outside of teaching, running seminar series and hosting events for students, or supporting student activities.

The Philosophy department activities include Question Time and Debates, Film Club, and giving students the opportunity to engage with philosophical issues while developing valuable skills.

In Politics and International Studies, the active Research Centres run regular talks and seminars that welcome students to engage with academics on their cutting-edge research activities.

The Economics department hosts Warwick Economics Lectures, with prominent speakers discussing topical issues on themes such as sustainability and climate emergency, artificial intelligence, and the economics of war.

SUPPORTING YOU

Dedicated Staff

You will benefit from a team of committed faculty and administrative staff, ensuring that you have personalised guidance in navigating the interdisciplinary nature of the programme.

The PPE Director, Director of Student Engagement and Progression, and Director of Personal Development are academic staff who have responsibility for the operation and design of the PPE programme. They provide indepth personalised mentorship and support, helping you to navigate the degree in a way that aligns with your unique strengths, interests, and career aspirations.

The PPE Office will be your first port of call for any enquiries, meaning that you have one team who can assist with any area of your degree.

Individual Support

You will be assigned a Personal Tutor, who will be an academic member of staff from one of the three departments. They will be your contact for general academic questions and will be able to support you through any personal difficulties. Your termly meetings will be an opportunity to discuss your progression and review your skills.

Your Wellbeing

The PPE Senior Tutor oversees the Personal Tutor system and is available to students with more complex or ongoing pastoral issues. As well as our programme support, you'll also have access to the provision of the Wellbeing Support Services, which includes the Disability and Counselling teams.

Student Mentors

When you arrive, you will be paired with a PPE student mentor who will help you to navigate the complexities of the interdisciplinary programme. They will be able to share their experiences, answer your questions, and offer practical advice all while welcoming you to the PPE community.


