### **Paper Development Workshop**

The editors of the Special Issue of *Journal of Management Education* on ‘Management Education in Africa’ invite prospective authors to participate in a virtual paper development workshop. Our aim for this special issue is to nurture the development of management education in Africa as a field of inquiry by providing a shared forum for dedicated research on the scholarship of management education (teaching and learning). The special issue also aims to advance meaningful and effective management education that is sensitive to the unique cultural, historical, institutional and other contingencies of the local context in which African business schools and universities and their students and faculty are situated. As editors of the SI, we are keen to support prospective authors to develop their ideas, experiences, and projects into submissions that engage, explore, and problematise issues related to management education in Africa. These submissions can take a variety of forms including research articles, theoretical and conceptual articles, essays, and instructional innovations.

Prospective authors who would like to receive feedback on their ideas for the Special Issue on ‘Management Education in Africa’ are invited to participate in the virtual paper development workshop and should submit an application via this online form: <https://forms.gle/Re2g8ZyFGtjTSxd49> .

Projects and papers do not need to be advanced, as our goal is to help prospective authors to further develop their ideas into papers and submissions for the SI. Applications should include an explanation of the initial idea and the stage the paper is at, including what data (if any) has already been collected and analysed. Participation in this workshop is free but the capacity is limited. This means only those whose applications have been accepted and have committed to attending for the duration of the session can attend the workshop.

This workshop will consist of two parts. First, SI Editors will discuss key aspects of call for papers and engage in a Q&A and feedback session. Second, participants will be given the opportunity to work in small groups with an SI Editor to discuss their ideas and receive detailed feedback.

The workshop for the Special Issue is being organized and led by Stellenbosch Business School in South Africa in collaboration with Warwick Business School in the United Kingdom, as part of an ongoing partnership between these institutions.
