INTRODUCTION

Social mobility is a significant issue in the UK, and it's a bigger problem here than in any other developed country in the west. For the first time since the Second World War, younger generations are starting their careers with lower incomes than their parents, and the Social Mobility Commission say that "the rungs on the social mobility ladder are growing further apart" (*State of the Nation 2016: Social Mobility in Great Britain*).

The pinnacle of many professions continues to be dominated by a small section of the population – 74% of judges, 71% of barristers and 51% of journalists went to schools that educate only 7% of the population; a fact that I know many of you are acutely aware of and are keen to address. Even though more students from disadvantaged backgrounds are going to university than ever before, only 30% of those on graduate schemes at the country's top employers went to a non-selective state school.

Warwick is acutely aware of this challenge, and it is why our scholarship programmes are so important to us. Because of you, and your generous support, we have been able to support close to 200 students with a philanthropically funded scholarship over the

past year. You've provided more cash bursaries than ever before, and have also helped us to introduce a series of additional bursaries to support scholars who are undertaking internships, vacation schemes, charity work or international student exchanges. It's all down to you.

We were also able to deliver a series of tailored events and workshops to support the scholars' career progression. The highlight of the year was the Professional Development Day, held in our new teaching and learning building The Oculus, which saw alumni return to talk about topics such as leadership, resilience, entrepreneurship and personal branding. We also returned to The Shard for our annual networking event, taking almost 70 current scholars to London to meet with the benefactors who make these programmes possible. All of these events help scholars to develop the skill sets that will help them reach their career aspirations.

In this report you will read the impact of this work from the scholars themselves; how your support has helped them to develop, and get the most out of their time at Warwick. Above all else, the scholarship programmes provide opportunities and experiences that will stay with them throughout their lives and careers.

Everyone here at Warwick is thankful and proud that our community is coming together to help the next generation of students. From the bottom of our hearts, thank you.

People often say that their university years were some of the best years of their life. I'm already grateful for the memories that the scholarship has created.

Networking with professionals at the scholar event in the Shard made me realise how big a factor knowing the right people plays in life. I'm the first person in my family to go to university and have few relatives in professional fields. I've been optimistic, thinking that I was on a level playing field, that hard work gets you anywhere; and whilst I still believe in hard work, I've realised that it isn't an even playing field. If your dad's a doctor, you'll get medical work experience more easily and will appear a better candidate on UCAS for Medicine. Social mobility is a real issue and from some perspectives, is only getting worse. That's why support like yours is invaluable.

I found the Personal and Professional Development Day invaluable. It helped me identify strengths and weaknesses for the interview and assessment centre stages of many applications. It cleared some of the myths about the skills employers look for in a candidate, and how best to display them.

I was one of the lucky few to be given the extra Warwick Scholars Vacation Scheme award. I volunteered in Marrakesh, Morocco, for two weeks teaching English at secondary school level, working with young offenders, and at an orphanage.

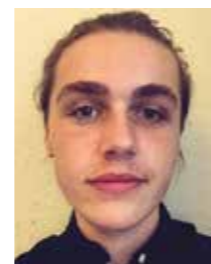

"I can't believe how fast the year has gone by! I'm writing to you from San Francisco, USA, where I'm on an eight-week internship with the Federal Public Defender's Office of Northern California. It was a very competitive process to get here. I'm lucky to be working with a highly-renowned National Mitigation Specialist, doing research and writing memorandums to prepare for death sentence appeals in Arizona."

The work done by these lawyers is phenomenal. I used to think that the death penalty was only given to the worst of the worst kind of murderers, but it isn't as black and white as it seems. Innocent people have been sentenced to death without due process, only for the truth to surface years later, and there are still people today on death row from the 1970s whose lives are in limbo. I cannot express how this experience has changed my perceptions. Many criminal 'monsters' are found to have suffered great mental illness or have abusive backgrounds.

I feel I've become a stronger, more confident person, with a greater appreciation for my life and opportunities. On that note, your scholarship financial assistance has helped me tremendously this year, especially paying for this (unpaid) internship. You've also helped me to buy the necessary stationery, work supplies and books for my course; a very expensive activity considering the size and price of Law books! And I've enjoyed events like the Shard networking evening, where it was great to meet donors in person and get an insight into their lives. The theatre trip to *Lord of the Flies* was great because I spent time with other scholars; we all feel a sort of solidarity.

WSP expands our horizons by exposing us to things we may never have seen before. The scholarship definitely helped me financially; from bills, to medication, to books, and helped me work fewer hours at my job. That's not the only reason it was amazing though. Coming from a working-class background, I lacked confidence, and had no idea how to increase it. The programme gave us opportunities to network, learn and build our confidence. It exposed me to new experiences, like trips to the theatre and the Shard, luxuries my family couldn't always afford. It taught me to be more transparent and open.

I used to be very timid and reclusive; I never spoke about my problems but I've grown into a different person. This year I organised an event to raise awareness of mental illness through creative ways, 'Mental Health: Night of Talents and Testimonies'. People spoke, sang, and told their personal stories. Afterwards attendees said they felt more comfortable speaking



about their own experiences, or approaching their friends who seemed to be suffering.

I would like to thank all current and future donors; without them, many students would be walking a different path not suited for them. Thank you, I'm truly grateful for it all.

So I’m the first in my generation to go to university, and it drives me to give back to my parents for the sacrifices they have made. I’ve one year left of study. I keep pushing myself to be the best I can be, and have been able to reduce my part-time work hours thanks to your support. I worked as an intern at a boutique bank over the summer, and your funding helped me meet the costs of buying a suit, and daily food and travel through London. The Welcome Reception was particularly memorable as I met a peer who inspired me to chase my dreams.

My plans are uncertain, not because I don’t know what I want to do, but because I’ve got too much!
