# Sowing the seeds of success

## By supporting IntoUniversity, you enable talented young people to achieve amazing things in their school journeys and beyond.

IntoUniversity is a nationwide charity that drives social mobility. Aimed at local primary and secondary-school students, its activities help to raise aspirations among pupils and encourage progression to higher education.

A current Year 6 pupil, who joined the programme in February 2025 and has taken part in several activities, from the after-school SATs club to school trips to university campuses, shares their IntoUniversity experience.

"University is a big topic, but here it's just a fun way to think about whether I'm going to go. IntoUniversity has really helped me have new experiences. When we went to Thinktank Birmingham Science Museum, I had never even been on a train before."

Building on the successful work across the West Midlands, the University of Warwick has invested in a new Birmingham IntoUniversity Centre, which opened in November 2024. Alongside the existing Coventry Centre, which celebrated its 5th anniversary last year thanks to your generous donations, it broadens the programme's reach to more young people across the region. In the West Midlands and Warwickshire, the progression rate into higher education is just 32%, compared to 44% nationally, making this intervention essential.

The centres provide after-school academic support and mentoring with University of Warwick students (who are very often scholarship students themselves), as well as work experience opportunities, to help learners explore their interests and goals. These life-changing opportunities boost confidence, ambition, and future success, with students on the programme twice as likely to progress to higher education compared to the local average.

Professor Stuart Croft, Vice-Chancellor and President at the University of Warwick, discusses the impact of the partnership.

"At Warwick, we are deeply committed to supporting social mobility and ensuring that talent – not background – determines a young person's future. Our partnership with IntoUniversity is also a vital part of us playing a role in regional leadership and contributing to inclusive economic growth through upskilling young people and creating a pipeline of talent for the future workforce."

# Transforming lives

## The Warwick Scholars Programme

**The importance of supporting students from primary school through to postgraduate education and beyond can never be underestimated. Your support helps break down barriers, promotes social mobility, and builds a fairer society.**

The Warwick Scholars Programme is an award-winning initiative that helps talented students from under-represented backgrounds access higher education – often continuing support from programmes like IntoUniversity. Keeley, a second-year Politics, Philosophy and Law student, shares its impact on her life.

“Before coming to Warwick, I didn’t think I could afford university, but the Warwick Scholars Programme gave me the stability I needed. A supportive environment is all someone needs to believe in themselves – creating a community that allows young people, like me, to thrive and feel part of something bigger.”



This year, we worked with 374 students, many of whom came through our access programmes and some of whom qualified due to their experience of care, family estrangement, or refugee status. Each received a bursary, enhanced access to career guidance, and tailored personal development programmes, helping them to make the most of their time at university.

We’re always exploring new ways to enrich the Warwick Scholars experience, making sure every student can access the incredible opportunities our campus has to offer. Recognising the importance of wellbeing in academic success, in addition to enabling access, your support has provided free Warwick Sport memberships to all Warwick Scholars over the past two years. Philanthropy also enabled four Warwick Scholars to participate in a funded study trip to North America, opening doors to international learning experiences.

We also launched ‘Thrive’, a personal development programme that supports Warwick Scholars to build core skills and self-awareness. Participants reported a 50% increase in confidence, a 41% boost in resilience, and a 61% rise in agency, alongside a stronger sense of belonging.

Thanks to you, students like Keeley are achieving extraordinary success. As we aim to grow our undergraduate Warwick Scholars community to more than 500 students next year, we’re deeply grateful for your generosity in helping us unlock the potential of bright young minds.

# Celebrating our donor community

Gerry studied Mathematics at Warwick from 1977 to 1985, completing his undergraduate and postgraduate degrees. He has been donating to Warwick for 28 years and has chosen to remember the University in his Will. Gabriela is studying for a degree in English Literature and Creative Writing and is currently serving as Games Editor at *The Boar*, Warwick’s student newspaper.

**Gabriela: I’d love to hear how Warwick has impacted you.**

**Gerry:** Warwick shaped the rest of my life. I loved my time at university. I’m looking forward to coming back for the reunion in November and seeing the changes to campus.

**Gabriela: What first inspired you to give to Warwick?**

**Gerry:** Warwick gave me a great start in life, so it felt natural to help others have the same experience. There are many smart and motivated people who want to study, but financial barriers hold them back. Anything that helps remove those barriers is great.

**Gabriela: Warwick turns 60 this year – what changes have you noticed?**

**Gerry:** It’s about ten times the size! It’s gained a medical school, broadened its subjects, and expanded outreach into the Midlands. 60 years is not long, and yet Warwick consistently ranks among the UK’s top universities. That’s an incredible achievement in a short space of time.

**Gabriela: You’re leaving a gift to Warwick in your Will. What motivated you to support in that way?**

**Gerry:** You can’t take it with you – so, if you have spare funds that aren’t needed to support family, Warwick seems like a great place to leave them. It’s a nice way to be remembered.

**Gabriela: What message would you share with fellow alumni considering giving to Warwick?**

**Gerry:** Do it! It’s easy to set up, and the impact is huge. Think back to your own happy times at Warwick – giving helps others have the same opportunity. Helping people get to university is truly life-changing.

Thanks to your support, over the past two years, £98,000 has also been awarded to more than 60 applicants to the Lord Rootes Fund, which offers grants of up to £3,000 for student-led ventures. One such project – Let's End Period Poverty Ghana – provides menstrual health education and reusable sanitary products to schoolgirls in rural communities and has already reached more than 1,000 girls through workshops and partnerships with local teachers, non-governmental organisations, and health workers.

# Cultivating real-world impact with student-led projects



Every year, your donations support programmes that make a lasting impact, meeting the ever-changing needs of Warwick students and the wider community.

Powered by alumni support, the Warwick Innovation Fund gives our students the opportunity to turn their ideas into action. It also demonstrates to our student community the power that philanthropy plays in shaping their experience.

The fund empowers students to bring their ideas to life through financial support under the guidance of the Students' Union (SU). Students propose projects that they believe will tackle some of today's biggest challenges.

These proposals are then carefully reviewed for their sustainability, viability, and impact before funding is awarded. Through leading these projects, students develop essential transferable skills, such as teamwork, leadership, and project management.

One standout initiative this year is the Memory Lane Café, a support group for local residents living with dementia. Led by Warwick Medical School in collaboration with dedicated student volunteers, the café offers a welcoming space, filled with weekly activities such as arts and crafts and music therapy.

# Building research capability to support future careers

## The Undergraduate Research Support Scheme (URSS) inspires students to conduct self-directed research projects during the summer.

Thanks to your generosity, participants can apply for a bursary of up to £1,500 to support project-related expenses – allowing them to explore ambitious research ideas and develop transferable skills through real-world experiences.

Mentored by leading academics, students build connections, elevate their CVs, and gain experiences that enhance degree performance – with participants twice as likely to get a first-class degree compared to the University average.

One alumna who benefitted profoundly from the URSS during her time at Warwick is Natasha Latiff (LLB Law, 2009), now a human rights lawyer championing the rights of women and marginalised communities around the world.



With URSS funding, Natasha travelled to Afghanistan to research the gender dynamics of land management and community structures during a period of widespread displacement, land acquisition, and violence. Her work focused on how gender played a critical role in land rights and family law, and how these perspectives needed to be integrated into laws and policies affecting women's rights.

"I had the unique opportunity to consult with marginalised communities, judges, lawyers, academics, government officials, and UN experts. This experience gave my research a real-world depth that would have been impossible without the support of the scheme."

For Natasha, the project laid the foundations for her future career.

"It taught me that effective human rights work isn't just about theoretical knowledge – it requires deep listening, cultural sensitivity, and the courage to tackle complex problems. The URSS gave me the confidence to step into the role of a legal expert before I had even graduated."

15 years on, Natasha continues to advocate for women's rights around the world, and she credits the URSS and her time at Warwick with shaping her mission.

"Warwick was truly transformative for me. To this day, I teach, educate, and build the capacities of others because I was a beneficiary of an outstanding educational experience. To everyone who donates to schemes like the URSS – thank you. Your generosity is changing lives and shaping the next generation of researchers, advocates and global leaders."

# Creating career-ready graduates

**Supported by generous donations from Warwick alumni and friends, the Work Experience Bursary makes work experience opportunities accessible to all students – maximising their career prospects and enhancing their employability after graduation.**

As Kimberley Harris, Internships, Placements, and Work Experience Manager, explains: "Employers expect graduates to be 'work ready', making work experience vital for their post-graduation success. It bridges the gap between career aspirations and future opportunities, setting students up for both personal and professional growth."

Access to work experience opportunities provides students with real-world examples to strengthen job applications, and also helps them to make key decisions about their professional futures.

Students can apply for awards of £50 per day, for up to 10 days per year, across multiple work experience opportunities, with a £500 annual limit. These funds can be used for a range of expenses and allow students to focus on their career aspirations.

Thanks to your support, Warwick students have undertaken placements across a variety of sectors, including manufacturing, engineering, finance, fashion, education, and healthcare.

Your help supports students to overcome financial obstacles and provides access to invaluable opportunities that empower students from all backgrounds to achieve their goals at Warwick and beyond.

# Developing work-ready, global citizens

## Warwick is expanding horizons through GEO100 – a new global education programme offering every student access to international learning experiences.

By building global skills and cultural awareness, GEO100 prepares students to thrive in a connected world. Existing flagship volunteering opportunities like TeamWork and Warwick in Africa (WiA) will play key roles in the new programme.

Now in its sixth year, TeamWork offers online international experiences that connect students with global organisations and universities. Through real-world collaboration, it builds key professional skills, boosting confidence, CVs and employability, and shaping globally minded graduates.

Yexi Zhou, an MSc e-Business Management student, participated in TeamWork in Spring 2025 and shares how the experience impacted her growth.



“What I enjoyed most was putting classroom learning into practice. TeamWork gave me the chance to engage with a business challenge – not as a passive learner, but as someone actively contributing ideas. We were encouraged to think independently and explore solutions. It boosted my self-confidence and gave me a clearer direction for my future career.”

Following the programme, Yexi was invited to work for Elite, producing marketing content and developing their social media strategy – a testament to the trust and skills built during her TeamWork placement.

# Engaging students in education across Africa

## Africa is experiencing a dynamic wave of economic and social transformation – and higher education is playing a pivotal role.

Thanks to your continued philanthropic support, we are forging collaborations rooted in equality and shared purpose. Our transformative alliances are equipping a new generation of visionary future leaders with the knowledge, networks, and tools to drive sustainable change, building brighter futures for communities and the continent.

## The Warwick Africa Hub

Founded in 2022, the Warwick Africa Hub cultivates research that transcends traditional academic boundaries while pioneering educational initiatives. As part of the University's 60th anniversary celebrations, this year's distinguished Africa lecture, 'The Butterfly Effect: Transforming Africa by Unleashing the Power of Brilliant Young African Women Scientists', was delivered by Tom Ilube CBE, Chair of the African Gifted Foundation and founder of the African Science Academy (ASA). The lecture highlighted the extraordinary talent of young African women scientists and technologists from 20 countries and their transformative impact.

## The Ashinaga UK Foundation

The Ashinaga UK Foundation empowers exceptional students from across Sub-Saharan Africa by granting access to world-class higher education. This transformative alliance equips young leaders with the tools to shape their communities and drive sustainable development. Thanks to the support of the Ashinaga Scholarship, Merveille Musau (LLB Law, 2025) gained access to opportunities that shaped her future.

Merveille's academic journey culminated in presenting her Undergraduate Research Support Scheme (URSS) project at the British Conference of Undergraduate Research (BCUR). Her research, titled 'Masculinity in Customary Law and the Constitutional Rights of Women in South Africa', explored the complex intersections of gender, coloniality, and law across South Africa's pre-colonial, colonial, apartheid, and democratic eras.

## Warwick in Africa (WiA)

The WiA programme develops our students as global citizens, while transforming education and opportunities for learners in our partner schools abroad. During six-week teaching placements in Ghana and South Africa, our student volunteers work alongside local teachers, support thousands of learners, and help improve teaching practices. This year, we're sending 28 dedicated students to Ghana and South Africa, where they'll contribute to classroom teaching, lead after-school clubs, and support school improvement projects.

With your support, WiA is also expanding into research-led placements through the URSS, enabling students to explore classroom practice, community engagement, and sustainable development.

WiA is one of the many ways we are empowering our students to become globally aware and responsible citizens. Our ambition is for every student to have access to a global educational opportunity.

Looking ahead, Warwick's partnership with Africa will play a vital role in fulfilling the ambitious vision for the University's new global educational programme, GEO100.

Unique to Warwick, the programme will offer immersive development experiences that enable students to travel further and gain the global perspective needed in today's interconnected world.

# Inspiring Change Makers at Warwick Business School

**This year is the tenth anniversary of Warwick Business School's (WBS) Foundation Year, which enables students from widening participation backgrounds, to access an undergraduate degree in our internationally renowned School.**

The Foundation Year is a critical bridge for students who, through no fault of their own, may not have had the same opportunity to demonstrate their capability in school. Foundation Year students participate in small group learning, gaining academic skills in writing, critical thinking, leadership, and teamwork, while strengthening their mathematics and statistics skills. The small class sizes ensure students build confidence and develop a strong community to facilitate the transition to degree-level study. Many of our Foundation Year students go on to mentor others, creating a ripple effect of support.

**91%**

of Warwick Business School Foundation Year students progress to their first year of undergraduate study.

Since its launch, more than £1.8 million has been raised to fund bursaries for Foundation Year and widening participation students. These are essential, as many come from financially less advantaged backgrounds, hold refugee status, or are estranged from their parents. Overall, 40% of Foundation Year students come from the UK's most deprived areas – compared to just 9% of direct-entry students – demonstrating the programme's impactful role in expanding access.

Currently, 20 Foundation Year places are offered each year, with 91% of participants progressing directly onto undergraduate study. While Foundation Year students enter with 44% lower marks compared to direct-entry students, they make remarkable progress in closing this gap.
