WARWICK IN AFRICA ANNUAL REPORT

In 2006 we started off with a simple idea, and it's been our guiding principle ever since. We combine the talents of Warwick students and staff with those of local teachers and learners to help improve education in some of Africa's most challenged schools.

In October this year I had the pleasure of joining 27 of our Lead Teachers at a workshop in Ghana. The excitement and dedication of this group of teachers was palpable. The workshop brought together teachers from many of our partner schools in Ghana, Tanzania and South Africa, and was an opportunity to discuss the principles and practicalities behind the teacher workshops which they now organise, with Warwick in Africa support, in their own localities. This summer over 700 local teachers attended such workshops.

Thanks to the support of the COSARAF Foundation, who prioritise enabling young people to reach their potential, next year we will be able to bring Warwick in Africa to Kenya for the first time. The grant is for four years and will enable a total of 24 Warwick students to help deliver high quality maths and English lessons in Kenyan

classrooms. The funding will also enable us to recruit new Lead Teachers, and through them, to help develop the teaching skills and increase the subject knowledge of at least 600 local teachers.

Of course, none of this would be possible without the hard work and dedication of our student volunteers; their remarkable energy and skills help them to support African teachers in delivering inspirational teaching in our partner schools across Africa. Equally vital to the programme are our supporters, who I thank for providing the essential funding, and our partnerships with the schools, universities and governments, which make our work possible.

We are incredibly grateful to everyone who has made Warwick in Africa the successful, multi-layered programme that it is today. I hope as you read this report, you will be inspired to help us achieve greater ambitions for the programme as we head towards our 15th anniversary. Thank you for your support.
