Our Warwick Undergraduate Global Excellence Scholarship (WUGES) programme funding the best and brightest international students to study at Warwick so that there is no barrier to talent being part of our community - welcomed applications from

134 countries.

Our stories

Sam Pordale was born in Afghanistan and in 2021 was forced to leave his home country to travel to the UK as an asylum seeker. With the help of the British Red Cross, he was put in touch with University of Warwick researchers, and was



subsequently offered a Sanctuary scholarship to study Politics and International Studies. With the support of the University, alongside his studies, he has become a Universities of Sanctuary Strategy Group member, advised the West Midlands Combined Authority on faith partnerships and homelessness; worked with numerous refugee organisations and is collaborating with University staff on research projects linked to increasing access to Higher Education for refugees and asylum seekers. In 2024, he was recognised as one of The Big Issue's 100 Changemakers of 2024. As Sam put it, "Once I got to university, everything was opened up for me - it was amazing how it all happened in less than a year."



In 2024, the Warwick Institute of Engagement, together with staff and students from across the University, partnered with 62 schools across our local region to design an Olympic torch in honour of the Paris Olympics, with the winning design then built by Warwick Manufacturing Group. In July 2024, 750 school children were welcomed onto campus to join the final stages of our Olympic torch's 'Flame of Friendship' procession, alongside University staff and students, to celebrate the bonds that unite our global community on campus, across our region, and across the globe.



We will champion, in conjunction with the articulation of an outstanding academic success offer, the evolution of an exceptional International Student Welcome, Experience and Transition programme at all levels to maximise students' experiences whilst at Warwick, as well as their future prospects.

Humanitarian Engineering MSc (School of Engineering): This new course brings together students and professionals from diverse backgrounds (e.g. law, science, education, engineering, humanities, medicine) to tackle actual societal challenges in a manner very similar to the global teams assembled by today's leading workgroups. The emphasis is upon investigating complex humanitarian issues from a wide range of disciplinary perspectives in order to develop balanced, intelligent and synergistic solutions. Over 150 students (more than half of whom are female) from 40 countries have so far taken the programme. Staff are also associated with the ENHANCE initiative, a €1M European project on reforming humanitarian engineering education, impacting 6,000 learners annually in Indonesia, Vietnam, and Bangladesh.





Our Department and Institute for Global Sustainable Development between them offer courses at UG, Master's and PhD level, alongside an academic research hub, to address the impact of development, the possibilities for a sustainable life and the complex moral and ethical debates around globalisation in order to facilitate the transition toward a more sustainable, prosperous, healthy, and equitable world for all.

The Venice Term: The Venice Term at Warwick is a unique initiative that gives undergraduate and postgraduate students in History and History of Art the opportunity to spend a full university term living and studying in Venice. Our Warwick Venice Centre provides the ideal venue for the autumn Venice Term, which for many decades has been a unique feature of Warwick among UK universities, attracting scores of students to enrol in the History and History of Art Departments.

Our stories

The University's Undergraduate Research Support Scheme pays for students to work, for a 6-10 week period, on a research project overseen by a University staff supervisor. Projects can have a national or international focus and students are supported to travel abroad to conduct their research where necessary. 70% of students in 2019-2022 undertaking a URSS project went on to gain a 1st-class degree (compared her 35% of the overall student body).

Cathy Xia's URSS project on Youth Employment in Ghana took her to work with researchers at the Institute of Statistical Social and Economic Research at the University of Ghana, and from there she then went on to present to research findings at the British Conference of Undergraduate Research (BCUR) and the International Conference of Undergraduate Research (ICUR).

"What I'd like to share with fellow students is this: don't be afraid to embark on academic research. My journey to Ghana may have started with bare feet, but I returned with a mind enriched with knowledge and a heart full of stories. It's an adventure I'll treasure forever."

Cathy Xia, UG student, Economics The International Conference of Undergraduate Research (ICUR) was created back in 2013 as a collaboration between Warwick and Monash University and now is run by the University's Institute for Advanced Teaching and Learning (IATL). It gives undergraduates the opportunity to present online their own research projects to a global audience of students. Since 2013, over 3000 students have participated and 99% of students surveyed said that ICUR added value to their university experience.

In 2024, over 350 students, from 15 global institutions, came together online to present their research projects to one another, anchored by key 'hub' partner institutions like NTU, Singapore and Stellenbosch University, South Africa.

Student Papers (WM-ESP) gather the best Undergraduate and Masters dissertations by Economics students from Monash University (Australia), and publish them as the WM-ESP series. This bi-annual series provides a unique digital showcase of research undertaken by students on a varied range of topics, contributing to the research environment in both departments.

The Warwick Monash Economics

Students in Warwick's Politics and International Studies department collaborate with students at Monash University's Melbourne and Malaysia campuses by working in teams to create digital essays exploring the politics and economies of environmental crisis. Using the I-PEEL approach, each essay starts from the perspective of an everyday object or practice, and is published as part of a web blog, giving students experience of international collaboration and publication as well as global recognition.

Our stories

The Warwick - Shanghai Jiao Tong University (SJTU) Global Challenge, created through support from the British Council and the Warwick-SJTU Joint Seed Fund, each year brings together Warwick and SJTU students in a virtual learning environment to discuss and engage on a key global challenge theme, leading to research presentations by all students. Across 40 hours of virtual classroom time, guided by academics in both institutions, the Global Challenge builds students' skills and experience in intercultural communication, interdisciplinary collaboration, virtual group work, managing projects across multiple time zones and presentation.

Warwick's Intercultural Training Programme, contributing to students' Warwick Award, equips students to better understand, communicate, and build effective relationships with those from different cultural backgrounds, through a range of face-to-face and digital on-campus sessions, experiences and workshops.

Students participating demonstrated a 23% increase in intercultural understanding, 25% increase in leadership skills, 19% increase in networking skills, 18% increase in initiative, 13% increase in self-confidence and a 10% increase in feeling prepared for their career.

There are 30 Connected Learning Communities (CLC's) spread across the 10 European partner institutions of **EUTOPIA.** These CLC's link learners across the institutions in a variety of learning environments, focused around specific themes, as diverse as 'Multilingualism and Diversity' to 'Global Health', 'Legal History', 'Al' and 'the Silk Roads.' Warwick students and staff currently participate in 24 of the CLCs and lead 6 of them.

The Monash Warwick Alliance supported collaborators in the Medical Schools at both institutions to create the 'DoNTQUIT' 'Developing Novel Tools for Quality Improvement Training' programme to support Health profession students to learn more about quality improvement in Healthcare.

44 participants from 4 different global institutions took part.



Our stories

Prof. Ivo Vlaev (Warwick Business School), backed by a Warwick **Business School Impact Fund** award, worked in collaboration with academics at the Chiang Mai University in Thailand, to prove how current green policies in Thailand were failing to protect the landscape as well as they could because the policies did not take into account that indigenous communities have long-standing traditions and sustainable practices for protecting the land. Based on the analysis of satellite images from Thailand and case studies from other Southeast Asian countries, the research demonstrated that policymakers can achieve improvements in forest health by working collaboratively with indigenous communities: involving communities results, for instance, in the reduction of forest fires and air pollution.

"Policymakers need to recognise the value strong communities play in healthy environments. It's not just about giving indigenous people a fair share of the economy, it is about implementing green policies that are actually effective."

Dr Ivo Vlaev, Warwick Business School In 2022-23, Warwick won UUKi funding to collaborate with Kharkiv **National University of Radio** Electronics (NURE) across AI, the analysis of digital images and additive manufacture. The project has sparked a wide range of intended future collaborations between Warwick, NURE and a range of European partners.

Our Anti-Microbial Resistance (AMR) project team, a joint team of Warwick and Monash University (Australia) researchers, was funded through the long-standing Monash Warwick Alliance to work together to push back the frontiers of our understanding of this global problem. Following the advances made, funded by the Monash Warwick Alliance, the joint team has gone on, to date in 2024, to win over £10 million in external grant funding, as well as significant philanthropic funding. The AMR project team now collaborate with Warwick researchers across Chemistry, the School of Life Sciences and the Institute of Development Studies, and internationally with numerous global partners, including as part of a large Japan-UK project working with research and policy institutes in both countries to develop new antibiotics.

"Across the Monash Warwick alliance project team we have high-end expertise in all five "urgent threat" microbial pathogens identified by the CDC in their 2019 Antimicrobial Resistance Report. This is rare if not unique internationally and includes not only bacteria but also the less well-known but highly deadly fungi."

We will work with our Research Spotlight teams, STEM and Social Sciences Connect Programmes, our Research Culture and Innovations teams, as well as with Faculties, to identify University research strengths and emerging priorities, which overlap with those of our international institutional partners to support faster development of international research collaborations and impact.

We will connect with key internal stakeholders, and our global partners, to improve the University's knowledge of, access to, and success with, global research funding opportunities.

We will work with key internal stakeholders to broaden the range of international organisations, charities, cultural, innovation and industrial partners with whom we collaborate.

We will work to further develop toolkits and other support mechanisms for researchers to assist with compliance with regulatory frameworks associated with international collaborative research.

We will facilitate the use of our Warwick **Venice Centre by all Departments across** the University for international research activities and collaborations.



In 2024, Experts from The

University of Warwick's WMG Centre for Imaging, Metrology and Additive Technology (CiMAT) have collaborated with historians at one of our global partner Universities, Ca' Foscari University of Venice, to scan and analyse artefacts from ancient Roman and pre-Roman Venice, before bringing the collection to life using 3D printing and VR technology. The goal? To revolutionise how people could experience historical items. The inscriptions on some of the artefacts were difficult to read, as they were extremely worn due to their age. WMG engineers used cutting-edge portable imaging technology to scan the items in incredibly high definition, helping historians from Ca' Foscari to read and examine the damaged or fragmented items more easily. The result will be a virtual museum open to

Our Latest Achievements in 2024:

We launched the University's own Horizon **Europe Seed Fund to** support our researchers to deepen their international collaborations and develop their Horizon Europe grant applications.

The University's **International Partnership** Fund (IPF), supported the development of 43 new collaborations between our researchers and those in 39 different universities. institutions and ministries across 19 countries. creating a pipeline of future international collaborative major funding applications.

The International Research Culture Conference, hosted by our National Centre for Research Culture, welcomed participants from 24 countries, to discuss and share best practice on improving research culture, and pave the way for global collaborations and projects.

The University of Warwick set up the Warwick Innovation District, to be chaired by former Cabinet Minister Greg Clark, to oversee the development of our regional Innovation campuses and create the right environments for collaboration across a range of global institutions, businesses and organisations to tackle real-world challenges.





ongoing commitment to creating connections across cultures and across the **globe.** Working with students, researchers and practitioners in all disciplines across 36 global institutions including universities, museums, cultural institutions and businesses, the programme, overseen from our Warwick Venice Centre, has been leading on a range of research topics including the rediscovery, restoration and public display of 14th-century records of Venetian travellers in India; the development of an Al Marco Polo educational tool; and the high-resolution scanning and interdisciplinary study of textiles, ceramics and lacquerware to aid our understanding of goods that travelled across the Silk Roads.

Our Stories

Our impact working together with some of our partners in the Warwick Global Network

Warwick and Monash University (Australia)

- The Monash Warwick Alliance, now in its second decade, penetrates every layer of the Universities' fabric.
- The Alliance has funded over 100 joint research and education projects, including education projects like ICUR and TeaMWork, which are now key digital education opportunities available across each institution and to a wide network of global partners.
- The Alliance has led to over **1500 co-published** research articles.
- The Alliance has supported the early development of research projects, which, between 2018-2024, have gone on to win over £20 million in external funding for major joint research collaborations between the two Universities.



- During the Alliance's lifetime, over 1000 students have benefitted from physical mobility experiences between the two Universities, and each year, over 1000 students from institutions around the world take part in Alliance generated education programmes.
- A strategy refresh was launched in 2024 to include new funding streams for research, education and professional services collaboration, as well as the creation of the **Monash Warwick Alliance Associates Programme**, to help foster an ongoing community of collaboration, best practice and engagement in the decades to come.



Our Warwick Africa Hub

In 2022, the University set up the Warwick Africa Hub with the intention to develop equitable and mutually-beneficial partnerships with African Universities. Alongside the development of an annual **Distinguished Africa Lecture**, as well as the establishment of Visiting **PhD and Early Career Fellow** programmes for students and staff at Universities across Africa, Warwick has developed effective partnerships with Stellenbosch University in South Africa and the University of Ghana. Students can spend time at each institution and Stellenbosch participates in a number of Warwick's digital Global Education and Opportunity programmes like ICUR, TeaMWork and URSS.



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A range of academic exchanges and distinguished lectures have also taken place between leading researchers, particularly focused on the role of women in South Africa's liberation struggle. The lead researcher of Stellenbosch's Centre of the Afterlife of Violence and the Reparative Quest, Prof. Pumla Gobodo-Madikizela, who has been closely involved in these exchanges, is the 2024 winner of the Templeton Prize.



In addition, Warwick is also a participant in the 'Clusters of Research Excellence' programme run jointly by the Guild of European Research-Intensive Universities and the Africa Research Universities Alliance.

The Africa - Europe Clusters of Research Excellence bring together some of the best researchers from both continents, all committed to addressing global challenges through interdisciplinary research.

Warwick is proud to be co-leading, with the University of Ghana, the research cluster for Multimorbidity and to be a co-partner in three clusters; Artificial Intelligence, Data Science, and Theoretical and Computational Thinking; Sustainable Food Systems; and, most recently, **Building Capacities for Interdisciplinary Peace** Research. Warwick is, through these clusters, also part of the recent Guild- ARUA collaboration with Mastercard to support 1,000 PhD holders annually in 7 cohorts over a ten-year period, with a target of 70% female enrolment.






Our EUTOPIA European University Alliance

Since 2019, Warwick has been a partner in the EUTOPIA European **University Alliance**. Since then 39 Warwick researchers, across all 3 Faculties, have been supported to complete their PhD studies through the **EUTOPIA Co-tutelle** programme

Laura Vansina, Postgraduate (Research), Politics & International Studies, Vrije Universiteit Brussel (VUB)/ University of Warwick found "the Co-tutelle program allowed her to combine the best of both worlds, discovering the Anglosaxon and continental traditions of academia, as well as broadening her network with peers from all around the globe."

Eva-Rosa Ferrand Verdejo, Postgraduate (Research) Film & **Television Studies, CY Cergy Paris** University and University of Warwick, found that "not only did the programme offer the possibility of belonging to two different 'fields' (Hispanic studies in France and Film and TV studies in the UK), but it offered access to the resources of two different universities."

Lara Barzon, Theatre and Performance Studies, University of Ljubljana and University of Warwick: "Without a doubt, having the Eutopia co-tutelle is not only a scholarship but also means being part of a community that expands beyond the two universities that serve as my home. For example, I have been invited to take part in exclusive training to improve the impact of my research at TU Dresden; and present at events such as Eutopia Week. I therefore feel part of a network that not only offers me great opportunities during my PhD, but also gives me a sense of confidence in thinking about international opportunities for my future career."



Over 20 postdoctoral fellows have been supported to develop their careers through the **EUTOPIA Science and Innovation** Fellowship (SIF) programme, which allows them to develop networks and collaborations across multiple EUTOPIA institutions. In 2023, Dr Hannes Houck (EUTOPIA SIF Fellow in Chemistry) went on to win a £1.6m Royal Society **University Research Fellowship** to further his research in reusable

plastic by starting a whole new research group at Warwick.

Since 2019,

Since 2019, alongside the **Connected Learning Communities** created across EUTOPIA to support our international educational offering, we have also been developing and funding Connected **Research Communities** across the alliance. Dr Mark Greenhalgh in Chemistry won funding through EUTOPIA to set up a Connected Research Community between Warwick and colleagues at VUB University in Brussels, to deliver next generation catalysis technology. From the collaborative work with EUTOPIA colleagues, Dr Mark Greenhalgh has now won an EPSRC Early Career Researcher International collaboration grant to continue his work with VUB over next 15 months.

Warwick and Shanghai Jiao Tong University (SJTU) (China)

An annual joint research seed fund was launched with SJTU in 2019 and has since funded 45 collaborative research projects between the two **Universities.** Projects funded span across a wide variety of disciplines, including biomass conversion, catalyst materials in clean energy applications, Chinese British writers and the practice of world literature and English language teacher training in rural China.




In 2023 Warwick Manufacturing Group (WMG) won seed funding to work with researchers at SJTU to conduct a new fundamental study on high pressure die-casting process. The project enabled the researchers to establish a firm research connection and realise knowledge exchange in the aluminium casting processes and joining methods for cast aluminium. The project also resulted in four co-authored publications in Q1 (top 25%) journals.

As the Warwick lead, **Dr Dezhi Li**, commented: "these numbers of high-quality publications wouldn't be achievable without collaboration with research groups whose expertise are complementary to ours"

A recent collaboration between Dr Jianhua Yang, WMG, Warwick and Professor Geoffrey Rhodes, SJTU, aimed to support the museum and tourism industry in selecting which new technologies would best provide immersive experiences for their visitors.

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Dr Jianhua Yang said: "The SJTU-Warwick seed fund has enabled us to establish a strong collaboration between our project groups through virtual meetings, physical visits to each other's campuses, co-authoring research articles, and jointly applying for external research grants. An essential aspect of the research is to collect data and evaluate experiences internationally and we have been able to conduct this in English and Chinese, across social media and institutions within China, the UK, and the USA. The use of multiple languages and international institutions has given us a robust dataset and the identification of important cultural, national, or other distinctions in practice. We have been able to leverage each other's strengths and drive innovative research in the field."



In 2024, 10 joint research seed fund awards have been made across all three Faculties; the two Universities have collaborated in the delivery of the Marco Polo International Programme; delivered the annual Warwick-SJTU Global Challenge digital education programme; and Warwick and SJTU will be launching their first joint PhD programme.

Our Stories

The International Partnerships Fund (IPF):

Our IPF supports Warwick researchers to create collaborations with new partners wherever they maybe in the world, leading to dynamic outcomes and impacts over time. In 2022-2024, the IPF supported 56 different projects, with a variety of significant impacts:

Dr Fabrizio Alberti

(School of Life Sciences, Warwick) was supported through the IPF to develop a collaboration with colleagues at Universiti Kebangsaan,

Malaysia, focused on creation of a biological control agent to fight papaya dieback disease. The initial IPF funding led not only to published research, but to the winning of a BBSRC International Partnering Award to continue the project.

"The IPF was instrumental for my group to establish a new partnership with collaborators based in Malaysia. We are currently working on additional grant applications to translate our findings into commercial solutions based on biocontrol agents to fight plant disease."

Prof. Yvette Hutchinson

(Theatre and Performance Studies, Warwick) won an IPF award to work with colleagues at University of KwaZulu-Natal in South Africa and charities and social organisations in Kenya to focus on how disabled dance was involved in the construction of citizenship in Africa. This led to the establishment of the transnational African Dance Disability Network with over 55 global members comprising a variety of different sorts of organisations; a successful AHRC Research grant application to continue the research; the network's first international colloquium in Durban; and the inclusion of this project in an AHRC International **Network for Disability-Inclusive** Global Development (as the only humanities project in the network).



Medical School) secured an IPF to develop a new collaboration with colleagues at Institut National de la Santé et de la Recherche Médicale in Paris around methodologies for clinical trials related to paediatric medicine. The outcome was a successful **HORIZON** Europe grant worth over half a million euros, and resulting collaborations with 14 other international institutions, organisations and partners.
