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**How did you find job hunting?**

I found it quite difficult, but I think it largely depends on what subject you studied and what sorts of jobs you are interested. I think also in the UK, it is very competitive, I got my current job at University College Dublin after I have applied for 6 jobs of teaching Chinese in universities and the other 5 are in the UK. But I guess if you are happy to do something else not that relevant to your PhD, then it could be easier.

**How (if at all!) did your PhD help you in getting a job?**

I think it's very useful because it gave me a good degree and skills we needed for jobs. Also, there were a lot of opportunities to develop my other skills by studying for my PhD at Warwick.

**How (if at all!) does your PhD help you in your current/most recent work?**

I think especially the habit of justifying everything before I do it helps me a lot in my work. I got this habit by doing my PhD. Not sure if it works all the time, but most of the time, it does help me to think through before I make decisions at work.

**What combination are you using of specific technical skills, and more general skills you may have developed?**

I guess maybe the ability of searching for resources and planning my own work.

**What employment-related advice do you have for current PhDs?**

Perhaps make the best of it, keep your mind open, meet with other people as much as you can while you are studying hard, and don't miss any opportunities that could help you look for jobs in the future.

**Any other observations from your experience?**

Studying for a PhD might be difficult sometimes, especially when you are at the writing up stage, but you will find yourself learn a lot from this journey afterwards.
