	<ul> <li>Wellbeing Strategy</li> <li>The Senate received a report (061-S110320) and verbal update from the Chair and the Academic Registrar, which included the following key details:</li> <li>The Wellbeing Strategy had been developed, with valuable input and support from the Students' Union, in the light of heightened concern for staff and student mental health and wellbeing in the HE sector. This, in the context of mental health disclosures amongst students increasing five-fold in the last ten years, and reports that academics had higher levels of stress and burnout than the general population. The Strategy development also closely aligned to the direction of travel expounded by the Student Minds mental health charter developments.</li> <li>The OfS was also now taking an active role in this area and seeking to champion sector developments in the interests of students who were more likely to withdraw from their studies, underperform, and were less likely to secure higher level employment or study at post-graduate level.</li> <li>Staff who also experienced poor mental health were likely to lack motivation, underperform and have regular or long absences from work.</li> <li>The introduction of a university wide wellbeing strategy would set and manage expectations, instil confidence and provide a more coordinated and holistic framework. The implementation plan signified a deliberate approach to embed strategic consideration in the academic governance structures and thereby the wider academic community.</li> <li>In a response to a query from AC, that the suggested link between actions relating to PGR students and the PGT Strategy be amended.</li> <li>In response to a query from JW, that an equality impact assessment would be undertaken as part of the development of the strategy's implementation plan.</li> </ul>

## 061 Chair's Business

The Senate received a report (061-S110320) and verbal update from the Chair and the Academic Registrar, which included the following key details:

## a) Industrial Action

The University was prepared to support an appropriate sector-wide agreement and was working extremely hard to secure such a settlement, noting that recent negotiations had come very close to an agreement upon which members of the UCU and the employers as a whole could be consulted but, for various reasons on both sides, that agreement could not be reached.

UCU had announced that it would re-ballot its members to continue industrial action for a further six months beyond 29 April 2020.

# b) COVID-19

The University had undertaken two broad strands of activity in relation to responding to COVID-19:

- o A standing Major Incident Team was responding to incidents as and when they emerged
- An overarching Business Continuity Group chaired by the Academic Registrar, which had eight sub-groups, was modelling scenarios whereby the University would be required, either through government intervention or its own under-capacity, to reduce or cease various functions in the near future.

Accordingly, the consideration of pragmatic measures to ensure effective decision making would be necessary in order to secure the integrity of academic standards and the student learning experience.

### c) Exemptions to Standardised Submission Deadline

The harmonised deadline for student assessment submissions in Regulation 36.3.1 of 12 noon (mid-day) (Senate minute 113-S030719 refers), would be revisited by the AQSC to determine whether there should be standing exemptions for particular methods of assessment and the criteria which would be applied.

**DECISION 2:** The Senate **approved**, with immediate effect, the request that delegated authority be granted to the AQSC on behalf of the Senate to consider and approve exemption requests to the standardised submission deadline, pending further proposals from the AQSC, as set out in section 4 of the Chair's Business report (061-S110320).

### 062 **Disciplinary Process and Values Implementation Plan Update**

The Registrar and Director of Student Wellbeing and Resolution presented a report (062-S110320) updating the Senate on progress since October 2019 towards implementation of the Independent External Review, as well as progress made on affirming and communicating the University's values and principles. Key details and discussion were as follows:

- Work was continuing to align various University policies in this area and a steering group had been created to oversee this activity
- The 'report and support' system was working well
- All students were required to complete a Moodle module on the University's values and misconduct as part of the enrolment process.
