The Senate was assured that all the policies would be reviewed after six months to reflect any changes needed due to operational constraints and that a report on the outcomes of the review would be brought to the January 2021 meeting of the Senate.

Members highlighted the importance of maintaining an accurate amendment history and version control records for the Policies as a result of any changes, following discussion at the Senate and subsequently.

It was noted that a statement regarding Equality Impact Assessment would be added to all the policies, as previously discussed.

The Senate was also informed that communications to staff and students regarding the policies would be made as part of the significant communications schedule that was underway for the overarching Information Security Change Programme.

The Chair thanked colleagues for their contribution to the work to update the policies since the last meeting.

- 2. The revised Regulation 31 with immediate effect.

b) Revisions to Regulation 27 On-Campus Residential Accommodation and Regulation 23 Student Disciplinary Offences

The Director of Student Discipline and Resolution presented a report (106b-S010720, Restricted) setting out the updates made to Regulation 27, the Regulation 27 Procedural Information and Sanctions Handbook and Regulation 23 following discussion at the last meeting of the Senate. These updates sought to ensure that it was explicit in the Regulations relating to student behaviour that, as a University community, there would be zero tolerance to racism, and that racism in any form would be dealt with as a serious offence.

In relation to the proposed revision to Regulation 23, the Senate was assured that although the revision proposed that the Director of Student Discipline and Resolution would be responsible for considering allegations for investigation if needed during the interim periods between the bi-weekly meetings of the Student Discipline Review Panel, all allegations and cases would continue to be discussed by the Panel.

The Senate agreed that annual reports on Student Conduct per se would usefully be received as an ongoing follow up to the Disciplinary Process and Values Implementation Plan updates (item 112 refers).

It was also agreed that a review of University policy and process be undertaken in relation to student drug use and possession and how these issues were handled across the institution.

- 2. The minor revision to Regulation 23 Student Disciplinary Offences.

ACTIONS:

	The Chair reported that the summer examinations season had concluded, marking a significant achievement in moving assessments online to the Alternative Examination Portal (AEP) what had originally been a timetable involving 1200 exams, 65000 sittings, 16000 students and 11 venues.				
	Thanks were extended to all those who had contributed to the successful development and roll-out of the AEP at short notice. The effort of professional services and academic staff, as well as the engagement from Warwick students had resulted in a positive first experience of assessment online. Feedback via a short online student experience survey was being sought and to date over 1500 responses had been received.

	The Chair provided an update on the recent government announcement of a research stabilisation fund, to be scaled by the size of an institutions' non-publicly funded and institution-funded research. The Senate noted that uncertainty remained around the complexity of the definitions and conditions of funding.

108	Financial Update – Summer 2020				
	The Senate received a presentation on the forecast outturn for 2019-20 and a one-year budget for 2020-21. The Group Finance Director highlighted as follows:

- The key income risks for the 2020-21 financial year included a 50% assumed reduction of International (OS) and EU students, a drop in research income and a significant reduction in other operating income.

The Provost shared a high-level summary of the latest view on student numbers for September 2020 and highlighted as follows:

- Current forecasts and modelling were based on full time students through the standard UCAS route (not including Degree Apprentices or 2+2).
- Planning assumed that Home (H) student targets would be met, with 50% reductions of OS and EU students.
- Targets had been adjusted for Student Number Controls, which applied to H/EU students and included all Conditional Insurance accepts and Conditional Firm accepts prior to the June announcement. Although this allowed for additional headroom, campus capacity would need to be taken into account as a restricting factor.
- Postgraduate research (PGR) forecasts were more complex, with a large number of outstanding decisions and scholarship provision being a stronger driver.
- Forecasts were based on current applications/acceptances and adjusted historical conversion ratios. Two scenarios were presented indicating a moderate and high impact of an anticipated reduction in student numbers.
- The effect of the lowest point currently in the demographic dip was being felt on the 2020-21 intake, particularly at UG level. With flexibility at Confirmation and Clearing around "middles", the potential existed to achieve better results than those suggested by the moderate forecast. However, concern remained around the precarious nature of EU and OS forecasts.
- For PGT, while there had been some increase in demand, the introduction of a deadline for acceptances to maintain engagement and encourage decision making, had resulted in earlier decisions and increased acceptances for OS.
- Current acceptance rates and the moderate impact would result in a favourable position compared to the planning assumptions, while the high impact would result in a less favourable position compared to assumptions. It was anticipated that the introduction of alumni scholarships would also mitigate against higher reductions in student numbers.

The Group Finance Director went on to highlight the following matters as follows:

- While the University's financial challenge was significant, Warwick's resilience and ability to act quickly in recent weeks to identify savings was very positive. A full planning update would take place in the Autumn and there would be a financial plan update at the October 2020 meeting of the Senate.

It was highlighted that ideally IT spend would not be decreased and members were assured that the network replacement project was currently retained within the plan.

The Senate noted that the latest version of the financial plan would be presented to the Extended Leaders' Forum on 6 July and to the Council at its meeting on 8 July, with wider communications planned after that date.

The Vice-Chancellor expressed thanks on behalf of the Senate to all those across the University working to achieve savings.

	 The majority of ADC activities focussed on working with academic staff and promoting and modelling evidence-based approach to teaching and learning. The proposal sought to convert ADC from a Professional Services Group (PSG) department, currently located within Organisation Development in Human Resources, into an Academic Resourcing Committee (ARC) autonomous department. 			
	 This would provide a similar status and improved alignment with the Warwick International Higher Education Academy (WIHEA) and the Institute for Advanced Teaching and Learning (IATL) and an even stronger affiliation of the work of ADC with the Education Strategy and academic departments. 			
	• The PVC (Education) would chair the ADC Advisory Group and interlocking governance would ensure more effective strategic and operational alignment between ADC, WIHEA and IATL.			
	 Initial consultation with all ADC staff had taken place, with support for the proposal. Consultation with colleagues would be ongoing throughout the process and supported by HR. 			
	 Subject to Senate approval, the recommendation would go forward to the Council at its next meeting on 8 July 2020, and the department would be established with effect from 1 August 2020. 			
	The diversity and synergies of the identities and functions of the three units (ADC, WIHEA and IATL) were discussed, and the Senate noted that there were no current plans for consolidation given the distinctive support each unit provided to the academic community. The proposed interlocking governance structures would allow for better alignment of the work of the three units under the Education Strategy, also allowing this important work to be presented more effectively.
