	 (a) General updates There will be four SLEEC meetings instead of five in 2023/24 The Teaching Excellence Framework (TEF) has awarded the University the triple gold standard for overall teaching excellence, student experience and outcomes. Noted the excellent work that has taken place, especially in the context of such a challenging number of years. Thanked members for completing the Academic Governance review survey recently circulated by the Academic Governance Review project team. The survey findings will be shared with the Senate Working Group overseeing the Review and outcomes reported back to Senate Sub-Committees. 				
	(b) Education Strategy priorities update				
	Professor Lorenzo Frigerio provided a verbal overview of Education Strategy priorities and the key points were as follows:				
	 To build on the achievements of the TEF Gold award and looking to focus on the excellence achieved with blended learning. Presenting the Access and Participation Plan by Summer 2024 and looking at the outcomes of the Institutional Teaching and Learning Review (ITLR) to capitalise on lessons learnt. Refresh of Education and Student Experience strategy; to present to Council in July 2024. 				
	(c) Lecture capture update				
	Professor Lorenzo Frigerio provided a verbal update on Lecture capture developments and the key points were as follows:				
	 Aiming to grow the Lecture capture offer across the University and enhance the guidance provided to help students engage with lecture content. Looking to further explore Intellectual Property rights issues associated with delivering of teaching materials. 				

• Looking to investigate potential technological enablers in the medium to long-term to improve systems and the potential to link Timetabling with Lecture capture system.

(d) Students' Union updates

Holly Roffe provided a verbal update on the Students' Union (SU) Education and Vice President Education priorities for 2023/24 and Vaishnavi Ravi provided a verbal update on the Vice President for Postgraduates priorities for 2023/24, and the key points were as follows:

- Collective priorities include mirroring the University's approach to the cost-of-living crisis; student welfare, including quality of accommodation, mental health, and wellbeing services; sustainability of commercial services; availability of consistent and accessible student support; building national and regional links with other SUs and sharing best practice.
- Specific VP Education priorities include addressing the impact of the cost-of-living crisis on international students; understanding hidden course costs; improving accessibility, including championing the Disabled Students Code of Practice, ensuring co-creation is happening and that disabled voices are being heard; enhancing communication and earlier release of timetables; improving communication between the SU and departments and SSLCs; improving exam timetable release so to ensure student success; increasing use of lecture capture, building on the work already undertaken; improving student choice, ensuring student voice is heard when changes are being considered; restarting the decolonising curriculum work, collaborating with the Library on the work they are doing.
- Phil Smith has recently been appointed as Chief Executive Officer of the SU and is currently overseeing the SU Governance Regeneration Project, including a focussed review of SU Officer functions and how students engage with the SU.
- The Student Activities team have merged with Student Membership Services.

Themes which SLEEC members raised for exploration 2023/24

- Explore further the disparity between International and Home student experience, the Student Experience team has recently made available materials to support international students experience which is also available to staff. Work is ongoing to better understand and develop work to improve international student experience.
- Discussion about how to further support students to progress from first year of study and improve their overall experience including looking at the results of the latest Student Surveys. For 2023/24 the Student Experience Division have a specific project looking at transition between year 1 and 2.
- Discussions focussed on various cost of living issues affecting students including the provision of food and warm study spaces on campus.

	 High-level analysis of the survey results for the National Student Survey (NSS), the Postgraduate Taught Experience Survey (PTES) and Student Feedback Term 3 Student Survey for the 2022-23 academic year were presented, highlighting areas of excellence, and indicating initial areas of concern. The change in NSS methodology for 2023 and the implications on interpreting the results were outlined. Discussion focused on the need to delve deeper into demographic splits; the link between assessment and feedback with belonging and if it is linked to the dip in satisfaction in assessment and feedback. The Student Insight Team are recruiting a student panel of around 500 students from across the University, representing various demographics, to explore the findings further and investigate the ways to contribute using interactive methods to enhance engagement. 							
	Free text comments will be analysed to identify any further themes or informative areas.

	 Timescales for progress in implementing the PGT strategy has been impacted by the Artificial Intelligence and Academic Integrity project, but delivering on the strategy is still on track. Improvement and enhancement of activities are based around three main areas, 'Application' (including expectations management, funding issues and complexities); 'Enrolment' (including a diffuse recruitment schedule); and 'Attendance' (including expectations management and feedback). These areas have been scoped and discussions taken place with relevant key stakeholders to further socialise the strategy. Key priorities for PGT and PGR students include addressing student isolation by holding tailored events during holiday periods and other quieter periods during the academic year, addressing cost-of-living
