

RESOLUTION PASSED AT ABERYSTWYTHAN, NR. PONTYPOOL.  
Aug. 31<sup>ST</sup> 4 J6.

This mass meeting of Pontypool workers sends warmest greetings to the workers and peasants of the Soviet Union and their leader Stalin.

It expresses its full approval of all the measures taken by the Soviet Government to safeguard the Workers Fatherland from the counter-revolutionary and fascist attacks launched by the Trotsky, Zinoviev Himmler gang.

It places on record its emphatic condemnation of the policy being carried out by The Daily Herald in its daily attacks on the Soviet Union, and demands that the Daily Herald should be compelled to give full proof, stating names, sources of information, and those who have written up these stories, in regard to confessions being extorted by force, about terror reigning in the Soviet Colony in London, about Madame Ozersky being taken on board a Soviet Steamer by representatives of the O.G.P.U.

Failing this being forthcoming this meeting demands a Special Commission be appointed by the Labour Movement to inquire into the whole conduct of the Daily Herald with a view of removing all anti working class elements from this paper.

The present policy of the Daily Herald is worse than anything the Daily Mail has ever attempted. It brings discredit upon the whole Labour Movement.

{ We demand an end to a so called Labour paper playing the game of Trotsky and Hitler, and call for a complete boycott of this heirloom of Horatio Bottomley.
