1. Medical Education Research Community (MERC)

MERC is hosting a seminar by Professor Karen Mattick from the University of Exeter on **Thursday 9 January** from **12.30pm - 2.00pm** in the **Medical School Building room A150**. Professor Mattick will be talking about her experiences of education research and how to formulate a good education research question. 2. Qualitative and Mixed Methods Interest Group (QMIG)

Qualitative research in clinical trials: Experiences of benefits and frictions from studies on antimicrobial resistance in Southeast Asia

Dr Marco Haenssger, Associate Professor in Global Sustainable Development

This talk will recall experiences of infusing clinical trials with qualitative research and social sciences research. We will focus on the process of doing interdisciplinary and mixed-method research at the interface of the medical and social sciences, highlight some of the insights gained from qualitative work within a clinical trial, and discuss alternative designs and research processes to generate knowledge. The examples will be drawn from research on antibiotic use and drug resistance in Thailand, Myanmar, and Lao PDR, specifically on point-of-care biomarker testing and treatment-seeking behaviour.

This network focuses on the development of advanced propulsion, energy management and system control for smart - efficient transport and energy systems, underpinning collaboration opportunities between researchers, academics, engineers and students across the University of Warwick. Following that, a series of bi-monthly lunch events and a workshop will be organised with the participation of both internal and external speakers to share professional experience, latest research findings and successful stories in solving real-world problems.

Researcher Development Sessions from the Library

The Library offers a number of interactive and practical workshops to support research active staff throughout the Scholarly Communications cycle. These sessions are open to all researchers at the University, both PGRs and Research Active Staff, and are suitable for all disciplines (unless otherwise indicated).

The sessions divide into two main strands: **Communicate Your Research and Research Data Management**

The **Communicate Your Research** series begins with a general overview 'Planning Your Publication Strategy' followed by more focused workshops on a variety of publication venues (journals, books, conferences and conference proceedings and informal publishing). There are also sessions on understanding the increasingly complex landscape of Open Access publishing and (new for this year) evaluating your research impact, which offers a brief introduction to bibliometrics and altmetrics and how they can be used to measure engagement with your research.

The **Research Data Management** series begins with a workshop exploring the basic principles of managing your research data ('The Essentials'), complemented by follow-up sessions looking at data management planning and RDM tools. In the planning session, you will look at example data management plans and start to put together a DMP for your own research project. The tools workshop looks at choosing and evaluating a range of tools to support you throughout the research data lifecycle, including data collection and analysis and the creation of data documentation.

New this year we are offering a number of sessions 'On Demand', which will be added to the programme schedule if there is enough interest from the research community. Our Open Research session builds on the principles of Open Access and Open Data to consider how openness can be applied to research more generally. The Publishing Trap (part of the Communicate Your Research series) takes a game-based approach to academic career planning and looks at the potential effects that finance, intellectual property rights and Open Access might have on the dissemination and impact of your research.

Our Copyright and Your Thesis session is designed to encourage postgraduate research students to consider the implications of copyright law for their own research, both in terms of ownership of their work and reusing the work of others. However, it may also be useful to research supervisors who would like to improve their own understanding of the copyright requirements for dissertations and theses.

In addition to our workshop programme, the Library is also able to offer 1-2-1 consultations in all of these areas, along with other aspects of scholarly communications and the research lifecycle.
