Feedback on Roberts' funded events that have taken place:

The Useable Past in Seventeenth Century England, 23 October 2010 – Organised by Matthew Neufeld

This one-day Colloquium brought together established and emerging scholars from early-modern historical and literary studies. The focus of the papers and the discussions was on the variety of 'useable pasts' seventeenth-century women and men employed in a range of social, cultural and political contexts. These include the theatrical stage, national politics, the family and the natural environment. The Colloquium shed new light on both the prescriptive power of the past and ways the past could challenge power in a traditional society.

Speakers and topics:

- Ronald Hutton (Bristol), Ancient Britain and the Early Modern English
- Lucy Munro (Keele), 'Whylome as antique stories tellen us': Archaism and the Uses of the Past in the Early Modern History Play
- Philip Baker (Centre for Metropolitan History), London's Liberties in Chains Discovered: The Civic Context of the Leveller Campaign
- Jan Broadway (Queen Mary), Symbolic and self-consciously antiquarian: The Elizabethan and Early Stuart Gentry's Use of the Past
- Fiona Youngman (Reading), Children of Baal: Anglican family narratives of Civil War trauma
- Nicola Whyte (Exeter), Meanings of antiquity in the post- medieval landscape

Judith Brown, School of Life Sciences Free and Open Source Software for Geospatial (FOSS4G) Conference - September 6th-9th 2010, Barcelona

"FOSS4G 2010 started with two half-day workshops on software tools for developers of geographical information systems, one on the geospatial database PostGIS and the other on OpenLayers, a browser-based software library for building and viewing layered maps. Both workshops were very informative and excellently run by experts who had played a key role in the design and development of the software.

The remaining 2½ days of the conference consisted of a series of talks and tutorials, some by developers of the software tools, who updated delegates on the latest features and imparted useful tips and tricks, and others by users of geospatial software, who described their own projects. Overall, the conference provided a great opportunity to meet and learn from the key players in the FOSS4G world and to get a good overview of the range and scope of software tools available."

- **WMG Researcher Forum** – Dr Vanessa Goodship - 'a year of co-ordinated and informal internal and open events aimed at pump priming researcher development and research networks for WMG staff'

The first meeting took place on 21 October 2010.

WMG Researcher Forum –The WMG Researcher Forum is a social lunchtime network to enable WMG researchers to fully embrace all the development opportunities around them whilst they are employed on contracts at WMG. Dependant on career aspirations, this could simply mean having development information or advice on hand with which to make career choices. For others it is necessary to engage in researcher to researcher academic training to build up essential skills such as paper writing and proposal writing. Researchers do not work in isolation, they are building on the work of past researchers and creating both the knowledge and the ideas for current and future researchers. They help both themselves and each other to eventually realise these scientific aspirations. The Forum embraces this sharing of skills and best practice within its own diverse research community and the University cohort at large. Idea creation and information gathering are both central to research. Exchanging details of capability and research areas with other researchers throughout Warwick in informal, fun and friendly atmospheres encourages creative thinking, new links, best practice, new networks and networking skills. For this reason the Forum will be inviting all members of the contract research community at the university, at any stage of their careers, to share what they know with us, in open sessions at WMG right through this academic year. Advanced researcher postdoctoral certificate in transferable skills in science

Being a postdoctoral researcher is an exciting time in your career. But it is also a disconcerting time, as from this point on pretty much everyone's career is different, so you have to work a lot of it out for yourself. At Warwick we have therefore launched the Advanced Researcher stream of the Postgraduate Certificate/Award in Transferable Skills to help you in that process. It is composed of two core modules which between them include most of the basic skills you need while a post doctoral researcher and in your subsequent science career. You complement these modules with one (for the Postgraduate Award) or 4 (for the Postgraduate Certificate) optional modules.

The aim of this accredited programme is to provide you with a tool to help you manage your career (and your supervisor) and to help you to develop a network of colleagues. You will largely work with a mentor who may or may not be your supervisor. 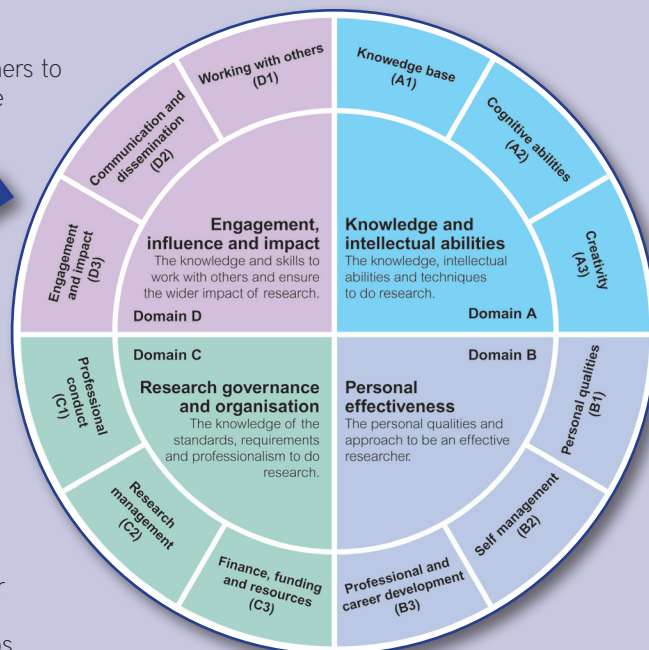
