Application process

Note: Applications **will not** be accepted unless the form is complete and all supporting documentation is provided.

Application deadline:

Tuesday 15 October 2019 for study starting in Semester 1, 2020

Campuses

You can apply to enrol in units taught at Clayton, Caulfield or both (Australian campuses with a shuttle bus that operates between them) but when it comes time to do your timetable, you should allow an hour to finish a class at one campus and get to your next class at the other campus. The City campus is for Postgraduate Law students only and the Parkville campus for Pharmacy students only. If you find a unit taught at the Peninsula campus (just outside Melbourne) you must take all your units at this campus, due to the distance from the other the campuses. If you want to do units at the Malaysia campus, then your whole semester must be studied there. Units taught at any other location (Alfred Hospital, Gippsland, Prato in Italy, Singapore, Suzhou in China, South Africa) are unavailable.

English Language Requirements

You must be able to demonstrate you meet the minimum [English language requirements](#) at the time of application to Monash Abroad. Note that English language proficiency test reports must not be older than two (2) years prior to the teaching start date for Semester 1, 2020 on 2 March, 2020. If your test report will be out of date please book a new test date as soon as possible and note this in your application including the date you anticipate receiving your results. An unconditional offer cannot be made to you without proof of your English language proficiency.

What to study

Monash offers you the option to enrol across all 10 of its faculties. See [study options](#) to start researching the unit offerings at Monash.

Using the Handbook's [browse units tool](#) you can filter units by level, campus, faculty, teaching period, or to select units without prerequisites. You (*with the exception of Undergraduate Faculty of Law*) must select units with a code number prefix of 1, 2 or 3 only. This corresponds to 1st, 2nd and 3rd year e.g. MGC1010 is a 1st year unit. Only undergraduate Faculty of Law students will select units with a code number prefix of '4'. Units with a code number prefix of '5' are postgraduate units and are available only to students enrolled in a postgraduate degree at their home institution. Non-Law units with a code number prefix of '4' are honours level and are not available to Exchange and Study Abroad students.

You will need to take account of the points made on the [academic considerations web page](#) when selecting units at Monash University, as they relate specifically to units taught in that faculty. Other things to note are:





- You should select 'on-campus' units but are permitted to do 1 of your 4 units per semester online or as distance education;
- You cannot study both undergraduate and postgraduate units simultaneously. Undergraduate students can only choose undergraduate units, and postgraduate students can study either all postgraduate units or all undergraduate units;
- Select the units offered at "First Semester". Undergraduate students and non-Postgraduate Law students *may not* select units taught in any other teaching period e.g. Summer A, Summer B, winter, Terms 1-4, Trimesters A-C. Postgraduate Law students may only select units taught March-June at this [link](#); and
- If you are hoping to come for two semesters, units for your second semester (Semester 2, 2020 - July to November) will be considered by the relevant faculty from May 2020, upon further instruction from Monash Abroad.

Creating your study plan

You are required to select a minimum of 6-8 units and list these in section 4 of your application form.

Synopsis

This unit develops analytical tools for understanding macroeconomic fundamentals. It provides students with a unified framework that can be used to analyse macroeconomic issues such as employment, productivity, growth, inflation, business cycles, and macroeconomic policies. If you select a unit that has pre-requisite requirements you will need to provide full syllabus information (official, downloaded from your home institution website or scanned from a hard copy document) for the unit(s) that you completed at your home institution which you think meets the pre-requisite. Our faculty colleagues will then determine if they think you have met the eligibility for the unit.

Documentation

Ensure you include ALL supporting documentation with your application including:

1. An up-to-date official academic transcript for all post-secondary study. Online and unofficial transcripts will not be accepted.
2. A copy of your passport information page; if your passport has expired, send it anyway while you apply for a new one but we will need a copy of the information page of the new one before we can issue your acceptance document. If you have an Australian or New Zealand passport please include this to waive the visa and OSHC requirements.
3. Proof of English language proficiency, if applicable, if you don't believe it is not applicable, please state why not.
4. Full official syllabi and/or portfolio (if applicable) as noted in the [academic considerations web page](#)

NOTE: **incomplete applications will NOT be accepted**. If something is missing from your application please note that in the application and explain when it will be sent.

Next steps

After Monash Abroad receives your complete application and all supporting documentation you will receive an acknowledgment email. When the application has been assessed, a second email will be sent with your Monash University ID number and next steps in the admission process. Your study plan will be sent to the relevant faculty(ies) for approval of the units you have selected. Once at least 3 units have been approved, Monash Abroad will email you with an offer of a place, which includes the International Student Course Agreement (ISCA).

Once you accept the offer by completing the acceptance form, paying for your Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC), where relevant, and returning the form with evidence of having OSHC to Monash Abroad, you will be issued with a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE), the document you need to apply for your student visa.

Monash Abroad orientation and enrolment

Monash Abroad hosts a free, compulsory orientation for all Exchange and Study Abroad students each semester. You will enrol in-person during Monash Abroad orientation week. You cannot enrol online or by proxy.

It is important that you request permission from Monash Abroad to arrive late if you are unable to arrive by the Monash Abroad orientation date. Late arrival will be subject to strict faculty approval. If you arrive late without permission in writing from Monash Abroad, you will not be allowed to enrol and therefore, your program will be voided.

Housing

Monash Abroad will email you with instructions about accommodation options and how to apply online for on-campus accommodation in the Exchange or Study Abroad application acknowledgement.

On-campus accommodation

You should *not* apply directly to Monash Residential Services (MRS) as there is a separate process and allocation of rooms on-campus for Exchange and Study Abroad students.

Off-campus accommodation

If you choose to live off-campus, you can receive assistance/advice on searching for rental properties, setting up a share house, things to look out for before you sign a contract, an idea of comparable rental costs, how to budget, and how to get the essentials like internet, gas and electricity connected.

Visa

When you have received your CoE you apply for a [student visa \(subclass 500\), Non-Award Sector](#). It is important, and your responsibility, to understand fully your obligations and responsibilities when applying for a student visa. *You are advised not to book non-refundable travel until your visa has been issued.*

Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

OSHC is insurance to assist you as an international student in Australia meet the costs of medical and hospital care that you may need while here. OSHC will also pay limited benefits for pharmaceuticals and ambulance services. It is a condition of student visas that visa-length OSHC be purchased and maintained for the duration of that visa. Failure to purchase OSHC will result in you being non-compliant with your student visa requirements. You will be required to purchase OSHC when accepting your offer for Exchange or Study Abroad. More information will be provided with your offer.

Travel insurance

We strongly encourage you to take out comprehensive travel insurance before you leave for Australia as your OSHC will provide only basic medical and hospital cover whilst here and does not cover any travel related claims. OSHC does not cover you while travelling to or from Australia, your personal belongings or if you have an emergency and need to return home urgently. When making this purchase, it is important to understand fully the terms and conditions of your travel insurance and what it covers.

Living costs

Employment

Holders of Australian student visas can work part-time for up to 40 hours per fortnight, paid or unpaid, during the semester and full-time after exams have concluded. The visa work regulations place no restrictions on the type or nature of work that you engage in and can be on or off-campus. Most students find part-time work in the service and hospitality industries.
