Definitions



Independent students who are Care Leavers

Care leavers are young people who have been in care for at least 13 weeks at any time since the age of 14 and were in care on their 16th birthday (The Children (Leaving Care) Act 2000).

This care may have been provided in many different settings, including:

- Living with foster carers
- Living in a residential children's home
- Being looked after at home under a supervision order
- Living with relatives under a guardianship agreement

Independent students who are Estranged


An 'estranged student' is a young person under the age of 25 who is studying without the support and approval of both of their parents due to a breakdown in their relationship – this might be their birth, step or adoptive parents, and sometimes their wider family members.

Students in this situation are able to apply to Student Finance England (or equivalent student finance bodies in Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland) as 'Independent and Estranged' if:

- They haven't had any contact with both of their parents for 12 months or more
- The relationship with both of their parents has broken down within the last 12 months and they don't expect this to change in the near future

What challenges may students face?





Important:

Students who are independent because they have left care or are estranged also bring a huge amount to the university community. This shouldn't be forgotten and should be celebrated.



Pre-arrival support for applicants/offer holders

e.g. signposting to internal/external services, support with Student Finance

Financial support while on course

Warwick Bursary (£2,000 pa)
Additional Bursary (£1,000 pa)
Care Leaver/Estranged
Student Bursary (£1,000 pa)

Accommodation support

Access to 52 week on-campus accommodation for duration of studies

Support available from the University

Additional consideration for Warwick Taught Masters Scholarship Up to £10,000 scholarship towards PGT study

Access to Warwick Scholars Undergraduate Programme

For students who join the university from a care leaver/estranged background

Other bespoke support while on-course

e.g. single point/team of contact (WP Lifecycle Team), advocacy and signposting support

Learning points and next steps





Learning points so far:

- Independent students who are care leavers or are estranged show a huge amount of resilience and determination and really care about their studies
- No two students' journeys are the same – even if they are both independent because they are a care leaver or are estranged
- The risks to students from these groups can be significant (e.g. homelessness if temporarily withdraw, no family safety net)
- The number of students becoming estranged while on course is growing



Upcoming areas of focus:

- Better information sharing and liaison with student services/ departments to raise awareness and collaborate on support
- WP Committee subgroup for 'priority groups' work
