

Independent students who are Estranged

The information on this page is for young people who are thinking of applying to Warwick as an Undergraduate student for 2025 entry and are **independent because they are estranged from both of their parents**. If you are planning to apply elsewhere, we would encourage you to contact your university choices to see what support is available to you.


1. 'Estranged' definition

An 'estranged student' is a young person under the age of 25 who is studying without the support and approval of <u>both</u> of their parents due to a breakdown in their relationship – this might be their birth, step or adoptive parents, and sometimes their wider family members.

If you have also spent 3 or more months in care, please see our <u>information for 'Care Experienced'</u> <u>students</u>. Or, if you are independent because you have spent 13+ weeks in care since the age of 14 and were in care on your 16th birthday, please see our information for <u>Independent Students who are Care</u> <u>Leavers</u>.

2. Applying to University

Students apply to university through the UCAS application form. This form includes your personal details, personal circumstances (this is where you can tell your university choices that you are estranged), educational history, predicted grades (where applicable), your course choices, your personal statement and your reference.



Evidence

The universities you apply to may ask you to provide evidence of your estrangement status so that appropriate support can be arranged for you. At Warwick, we advise students to provide evidence in their UCAS reference (i.e. your referee confirming your circumstances in their written reference). If the university requires more information from you, we will contact you directly.

3. Applying for Student Finance

You can apply to Student Finance England (or the equivalent awarding body in Wales, Scotland or Northern Ireland) for financial support with your tuition fees and living costs.

Tuition Fee Loans: These loans are paid directly to your university. **Maintenance Loans:** These loans are usually means-tested (based on household income) and are paid to you.

To apply for financial support as an Estranged Student, you will need to complete an online application form and apply as an **'Independent Student'**. You can do this if:

- You haven't had any contact with both of your parents for 12 months or more; or
- Your relationship with both of your parents has broken down within the last 12 months and you don't expect this to change in the near future

If you are living with friends, in supported accommodation or you're living with grandparents or other family members, you may be considered as 'Independent' through estrangement. Should Student Finance approve your application, your 'household income' will usually be assessed as £0 and you will usually be awarded the maximum maintenance loan for at least the first year of your course. Depending on your circumstances, you can sometimes be granted 'Estranged Student Status' for the duration of your course.

- If you do not have evidence of your estrangement, you should call Student Finance England and ask to speak to an Estrangement Caseworker. You can also contact this service at <u>estranged@slc.co.uk</u>.

4. Support from Warwick for Estranged Students

Students who are independent because they are estranged are able to access a wide range of support from Warwick. *Please note that some of this support is provisional on you being assessed as Independent by Student Finance because you are an Estranged Student (see Section 3 above)*:

Application Stage	 Financial support for travel to Open Days/Offer Holder Open Days – please contact lifecycleteam@warwick.ac.uk for more information A <u>Contextual Offer</u> for successful applicants
Undergraduate Study	 Financial support: A Warwick Bursary of up to £2,500 per year, a Widening Participation Bursary of £1,500 per year for Independent Students who are Estranged and a Warwick Scholars Bursary of up to £2,000 per year. Accommodation: Eligibility for 52-week on-campus accommodation for the duration of your studies (if desired). This accommodation package includes a 40/44-week campus room plus summer accommodation over the vacation period. There is more information about Warwick's accommodation online here. Please note that students are required to move rooms as part of the University's 52-week campus accommodation package. Students will usually move once at the start of the summer break and then at the end of the summer break. However, please note that some students may need to stay in an alternative, temporary room in early September during the University's shut down period, before moving into their term time room. You can find out more about this, and more information about 52-week accommodation costs, in our 52-Week Campus Accommodation FAQs. Warwick Scholars: Eligibility for the Warwick Scholars Undergraduate Programme. This programme provides students with access to bespoke

	 activities, along with academic, personal and professional development opportunities. WP Lifecycle Team: Additional support from the WP Lifecycle Team. We offer 1-1 check-ins and signposting support, for example, while you're on course.
Postgraduate Study	• Warwick Taught Masters Scholarship (WTMSS): Priority eligibility for the WTMSS scholarship scheme.

Estranged Students also have access to a range of support services open to all students across the University, including:

- A <u>Personal Tutor</u> who you can reach out to for additional support while you study at Warwick (we would encourage you to share information about your circumstances with your Personal Tutor so that appropriate support can be offered during your studies; this is particularly important if you are asked to provide evidence of estrangement later in your course)
