

The Nick Butter Conference



In November, we were delighted to host an inspirational talk from record-breaking runner Nick Butter. Nick is the first person to have run a marathon in every single country and he had quite a story to tell.

This was one of our first in-person school events since the Covid-19 pandemic and we were very excited to welcome Year 7 students from six local schools - and their teachers - onto campus. The event was part of our wide-ranging programme of activities designed to break down perceived barriers, challenge myths about university, and encourage young people to aim high. Most importantly,

we wanted the eighty Year 7 students in the audience feel motivated and inspired to achieve their dreams - no matter what they are.

Nick's talk certainly didn't disappoint. He stunned us all with tales, including a close encounter with a cheetah in the bush and the problem of having your running shoes eaten by pigs - twice!

He then turned to his more serious message about aiming high, believing in your ability to overcome obstacles, and always looking for the positive in people and places. Nick also looked back on his chance conversation with a fellow runner - and new friend - during a desert endurance race which inspired his decision to run the world. He spoke about his motivation to take on the 674-day challenge and encouraged us all to have a similar positive attitude towards our own goals.

All of the students and staff from Lyng Hall School, Ormiston SWB Academy, President Kennedy School, Stoke Park School, Westwood Academy and Whitley Academy expressed their thanks to Nick for the talk and left with huge smiles on their faces (along with a couple of selfies with the record-breaking runner)! One member of staff commented: "What a great inspiration Nick is - not just in his sporting achievements but having struggled himself academically and physically before achieving success." The Year 7s shared a lot of feedback with us at the end, including these brilliant reflections:

"I think it was very inspiring that one person faced all those challenges but carried on"

"When you are in the middle of doing something don't give up"

We're very grateful to Nick for sharing his story with us and to all of the teachers and young people who attended. It was a fantastic event, and we can't wait to welcome more schools onto campus over the rest of the year.

We were delighted to be able to invite our entire Warwick Scholars community (both our sixth form access programme students and our current undergraduate students) onto campus for the first ever whole programme social event this December!

So far this term, our Warwick Scholars access programme students have had information and guidance about personal statements, student finance, choosing the right course and what student life is like at Warwick, as well as a few opportunities to catch up with each other virtually. Since then, they've been working hard on their UCAS applications and getting to grips with the demands of year 13.

So, it was fantastic for them to be able to meet their undergraduate mentors in person, and finally get to join their fellow Warwick Scholars face-to-face. The aim of the event was for the mentors and the students to get to know each

other a bit better and to discuss what they wanted to achieve through their mentoring. We talked about how important it is to be an active participant in a mentoring relationship and to be open to challenge, because that's how we can improve.

We were then pleased to welcome a large group of our undergraduate Warwick Scholars to join the event - in addition to those who are mentors - and they proved to be fantastic role models for our access students, having successfully transitioned to Warwick from one of our access routes in the past few years. It was fantastic to see students of all ages networking and making new friends.

One of the main aims of Warwick Scholars has always been to create a community of students who may have faced similar educational, social, or financial barriers to higher education, and this event was a real showcase of how that community is growing and thriving.

Pathways Launches

We have successfully recruited our new cohorts of year 12 students onto each of the Pathways programmes here at Warwick. Over the last 3 weeks, we have delivered launch events and welcomed all of the students onto the programmes. In total we had just over 100 students attend one of the launch events, in addition to a separate launch event for parent and carers.

Each launch event involved an introduction to the programme, a virtual campus tour, student finance talk and a talk from a pathways alumni. In addition, we also had a welcome talk from an industry professional within the sector at each launch including DLA Piper, Natwest & National Grid. The launch event also gave the students the opportunity to meet the staff and student mentors who will be working on the programme, as well as getting to know their peers on the programme more through icebreakers and a welcome wall.

For the parent & carer launch, we also included information about the UCAS process and how to support their student throughout the 2 year Pathways programme.

We were really pleased with the engagement and participation of all the students and can't wait to get to know them more and support them over the next two years!

The WCN Roman Coventry and Warwickshire Project

The WCN Roman Coventry and Warwickshire Project is an ambitious project which aims to bring Coventry and Warwickshire's Roman past to every school and schoolchild in Coventry. Inspired by Coventry City of Culture 2021, our aim is to make our local Coventry schools the most culturally enriched in the country, offering equal opportunities to all pupils irrespective of background or ability. We currently have over 40 Coventry schools signed up for the project, so if you would like your school to be involved, do get in touch by emailing Dr Paul Grigsby at paul.grigsby@warwick.ac.uk The project is being designed and led by Dr Paul Grigsby of the Classics Dept. here at the University of Warwick, where his role is to run the Warwick Classics Network alongside Prof. Michael Scott.

Here at the University of Warwick we want to take the opportunity afforded by Coventry City of Culture 2021 to help tackle inequalities in the city through cultural programming and engagement. Our aim is to use Coventry's heritage assets - such as the Herbert Art Gallery and Museum and Lunt Roman Fort - to help bring a wider range of subjects to the schools of Coventry, providing enrichment and cultural capital centred on Coventry's unique ancient Roman past - the very beginnings of Coventry's history and cultural diversity.

As part of the project, we have developed a complete 13 part suite of Teacher Resources to help with the teaching of Rome and Romans at KS2 and KS3 and to introduce Roman Coventry as part of enrichment sessions or extracurricular clubs warwick.ac.uk/fac/arts/classics/

warwickclassicsnetwork/romancoventry/resources/complete/. We have also created an online A-Z of Roman Coventry, something we hope local pupils can continue to help us develop further. Our resources also cover aspects of diversity in Roman Britain. We are especially excited for pupils to engage creatively with this project, with prizes on offer for winning schools. warwick.ac.uk/fac/arts/classics/warwickclassicsnetwork/romancoventry/creativecoventry/

Creations based on our project from Blue Coat School are presently on display at Lunt Roman Fort. We are also developing a set of travelling artefact collections with local museums such as the Herbert Gallery and Warwickshire Museum, and are developing virtual resources of local artefacts with the help of Warwick Manufacturing Group. youtu.be/GTyu5w6bOXM
