# OUR COURSES

## BA POLITICS

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS: **AAA/IB:38**

Understand and critically engage with the political world. Explore the theoretical and empirical approaches to political ideas, problems and issues. Confront the politics of our everyday lives.

Political Theory and Comparative Politics provide the core of this programme, then you can choose options across the full range of modules. You'll tackle questions relating to the nature and distribution of power, the advantages and disadvantages of different political systems and the role of ideology in determining political outcomes. You'll critique how politics works in a number of different nations and question the appropriate level to analyse politics from the individual to the global system. You'll consider how the work of political theorists can help explain the ways in which politicians intervene in questions of economy, law-making, conflict and the regulation of our daily lives. You'll apply these ideas to everyday political problems such as immigration, poverty, war and climate change.

## BA POLITICS AND INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS: **AAA/IB:38**

This course combines the study of Politics with the global and multidisciplinary perspective of International Studies. You'll critically engage with theoretical and empirical approaches to political ideas, problems and issues locally, nationally and globally. With an added emphasis on the international dimensions of politics.

While political theory provides the core of the degree, you can tailor your course to focus on your main interests within International Studies. You'll engage with core questions in political theory and how they apply to situations across the globe. You'll confront how power is distributed internationally and evaluate the different ways in which societies organise their political systems. You'll question the ideological roots of world problems and interrogate the ways in which economic imperatives affect foreign policy. Your studies will investigate how theoretical assumptions underpin political decisions and explore the concrete issues that are faced by individuals, governments and organisations around the world.



**BA POLITICS AND SOCIOLOGY**

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS: **AAB/IB:36**

This course explores theoretical and empirical approaches to political and social ideas and issues, and the impact of these on our everyday lives. An interdisciplinary approach encourages you to consider the world from different political and sociological perspectives. It will enable you to think critically about contemporary society in the UK and beyond. This joint honours degree is split 50:50 between politics and sociology with the option of a 75:25 focus in the final year in either discipline.

Although regarded as distinct disciplines, politics and sociology have much in common: both sociologists and political scientists are concerned with power, contestation and how communities organise themselves. You will explore sub-fields such as gender and sexuality, race and difference, international relations, international political economy, sociology of media and culture, and international development. Political and social theory provides the core of the degree but you can choose options across the full range of PAIS and sociology modules. As the years progress, you will specialise your degree with an increasing proportion of optional modules.

**BA POLITICS, INTERNATIONAL STUDIES AND MODERN LANGUAGES**

**Entry requirements:** AAB/ IB:36

We offer a suite of degrees that combine the study of Politics and International Studies with the study of Modern Languages and Cultures. They give equal emphasis to developing advanced language skills, understanding the cultures and societies where that language is spoken and gaining a strong grounding in the discipline of Politics and International Studies. Each degree is four years, featuring a year of study abroad or a work placement in a country where your chosen language is spoken. This joint honours degree is split 50:50 between Politics and Modern Languages with the option of a 75:25 focus in the final year in either discipline. To study the French degree, you will need to have studied French at A-level or equivalent. You can study our German, Hispanic and Italian degrees if you have a background in a modern language.

**BA IN POLITICS, INTERNATIONAL STUDIES AND FRENCH**

Core training in politics is combined with the global perspective provided by international studies modules, and by a focus on the French language and francophone society. Political theory, international studies and French language modules provide the core of the degree. Independent and collaborative study in these areas will develop your abilities in investigative and evaluative research, presentation and critical analysis, and build strong written and oral French communication skills. The degree features a compulsory year abroad either studying or working in a French-speaking country. You can choose to be abroad in year two or three.

**BA IN POLITICS, INTERNATIONAL STUDIES AND GERMAN**

This degree enables you to explore approaches to political ideas and critically engage with political issues both nationally and globally. You will also develop an in-depth understanding of the German language, and of society and culture in Germany and Austria and their relationship to the rest of Europe and the world. You'll spend your second or third year studying or on work placement in Germany or Austria.

**BA IN POLITICS, INTERNATIONAL STUDIES AND HISPANIC STUDIES**

If you are interested in both the political world and in Hispanic language and culture, this course considers the approaches to national and global political issues and political theory alongside international studies, and Spanish language study. You'll emerge with strong written and oral Spanish communication skills, as well as sought-after investigative, evaluative and presentation skills, gained through independent and collaborative study. There is a compulsory year abroad in a Spanish speaking country in year two or three.

A combination of focused theoretical and empirical study of the political world with an intensive engagement in Italian language and culture. Your first year of study lays the critical and linguistic foundations for your exploration of politics and the Italian language. Building on this by spending your second or third year studying or working in Italy. Themes you develop in your first year modules will carry through to modules in the final two years such as the Politics of Globalisation, Italy Out of Italy: Italian Migrations Abroad, and Europe: Politics and Ideas.

## **BA POLITICS, INTERNATIONAL STUDIES WITH CHINESE**

### **Entry requirements: AAB/ IB:36**

With a 75:25 split between Politics and International Studies, and Chinese, this degree gives you the opportunity to acquire Chinese language skills while gaining a strong understanding of politics and international studies.

You will engage critically with the political world, from national and global perspectives, exploring the theoretical and empirical approaches to political ideas. You will also study in China during your third year. You'll be able to draw on our specialist expertise in the politics of East Asia and will become part of a vibrant community of international staff and students. Our graduates leave with the ability to understand complex theoretical positions and apply them to political problems and issues from the local to the global level. You'll also become confident in debating with others, researching individually and completing presentations.

Political theory and international relations theory will provide the core of your studies in year one with progressively more optional choices throughout the years of the degree. Introductory ideas you study in year one World Politics can be built upon in more specialised modules in year two, such as International Security and the final year US Foreign Policy. Across the first two years, you will take core modules in Chinese Language at a level appropriate to your existing knowledge, before studying at a partner university in China during your third year. This will be an invaluable opportunity to learn about Chinese culture, politics and society and to deepen your language skills.

# YEAR ABROAD

## EXPAND YOUR HORIZONS. BROADEN YOUR MIND. SEE THE WORLD DIFFERENTLY.

You will have the opportunity to study or work abroad as part of your degree. We are part of a global network of exchange partners and have long-standing agreements with universities in countries around the world. We offer you two options for study abroad: integrated or intercalated.

### INTEGRATED - STUDY ABROAD INCLUDED WITHIN YOUR THREE YEAR DEGREE

Most university degrees that incorporate study abroad will add a year to your standard three year programme - but on three of our core programmes you can apply to integrate study abroad into your three year degree. An integrated year allows you to replace all of year two of your programme with a year abroad. Students on BA Politics, BA Politics and International Studies and BA Politics and Sociology are eligible to apply for the North America Exchange.

### INTERCALATED - YEAR ABROAD ADDING A YEAR TO YOUR DEGREE

This option will add one year to your degree programme. You can either study at one of our partner universities or set up an approved work placement. The intercalated exchanges are available to students on the BA in Politics, BA Politics and International Studies and BA Politics and Sociology. Students on our BA Politics,

International Studies and Modern Languages degrees will spend a compulsory year of study or work in a country where their chosen language is spoken. Students on the BA Politics and International Studies with Chinese will spend a compulsory year of study in China.

Here is a list of current partners available to our students. This list is illustrative of the types of options that will be available in future years.

- **USA** - University of California
- **Canada** - University of Waterloo, Ontario; University of British Columbia, Vancouver; Queen's University, Ontario; McMaster University, Ontario.
- **Europe** - We have extensive partners in France, Spain, Italy, Germany, Austria, Norway, Denmark and Sweden. You can choose from among the finest universities in Europe in cities such as Paris, Madrid, Vienna, Berlin, Florence and Barcelona. Students also have the option of setting up a work placement in a European country with the approval of the department.
- **Japan** - Waseda University in Tokyo; Hokkaido University in the north of the country.
- **Australia** - As part of Warwick's alliance with Monash University, you can apply to spend an intercalated year studying in Melbourne. Half of the academic year can be spent at the Monash campus in Malaysia.
- **Hong Kong** - University of Hong Kong, Chinese University of Hong Kong, City University Hong Kong, Hong Kong University of Science and Technology.
- **Singapore** - National University of Singapore (NUS); Nanyang Technological University (NTU).



'Spending a year at UCLA has impacted my university experience in a very profound way, and deciding to apply to study abroad is a choice I will never regret. As well as academic development, living in a foreign country has allowed me to mature and develop personally. Getting involved with activities outside of classes such as a dancing society, political events, and some time to enjoy the city for myself (sightseeing and cinema trips amongst other things) has helped me settle in and make the most out of my experience. Having an American roommate has been the fastest way for me to adapt to American customs and have a close friend to talk to at all times when I needed to confide in someone or just have a chat. At first I was anxious about sharing such a personal space but it turned out to be a fundamental part of the college experience.

In terms of academics I am able to choose from an extremely wide selection of classes that are taught by a diverse range of professors with different backgrounds and interests. This has allowed me to explore my particular interests in greater detail, which I have reaped the benefits of greatly. The classes I have taken have encompassed and drawn on a plethora of disciplines; my classes last term ranged from political theories of empowerment to gender politics in the Middle East. My experience has been unpredictable, exhilarating, rewarding, and I'm sure I will appreciate it even more when I return to the UK.

Without this experience it would have been difficult to truly understand US politics and the American way of life, and I truly recommend studying abroad for anyone who may be considering it. ## LEARNING AND ASSESSMENT STYLES

### LECTURES AND SEMINARS

For each of your modules you'll have at least one lecture per week, which is then normally followed by a seminar later in the week or the following week.

Lectures are there to introduce you to a particular topic, including an overview of the key aspects and theories and give you a starting point to then prepare for discussion in your seminars. You'll be expected to delve further into the topic and expand your knowledge, using your overview as a base for further reading in books and journals.

Your seminars will be much smaller, and you'll engage with fellow students in discussion, debate or pre-set tasks which draw on the further research you have undertaken. You'll be expected to share your views about the topic and debate the issues. These weekly seminars are compulsory and you'll have your own seminar group and seminar tutor for the length of the module.

### DIGITAL RESOURCES AND SUPPORT

The teaching and learning on your PAIS programme is supported through a range of on-line platforms. Your module guides and reading lists, undergraduate handbook, essay writing guides, module feedback, and a host of other supporting materials are all held on-line. You'll have opportunities to develop your digital skills while researching and writing essays and other assignments that will be

valuable transferable skills for your life beyond graduation.

### FEEDBACK

Feedback on your submitted assessments are an important way in which you will be able to check your essay plans, monitor your progress, get ideas on how to improve your work and clarify points you are unsure about. Research training, personal and professional development are all embedded into your degree programme. Through modules, extra seminars, skills workshops, careers presentations, 1:1 advice sessions and guest speakers, you will be able to sharpen the skills that employers and further study programmes are looking for.

### ASSESSMENTS

Our modules are normally assessed through a mixture of exams and essays, and you'll get extensive feedback to help you progress. You will have what are known as 'formative assessments' which are assessments that do not contribute marks to your final overall grade. Formative assessments will accustom you to what is required from your degree and the style of assessment. The feedback will provide you with suggestions and ideas, and help you prepare for the 'summative assessments' that determine your marks for each module. Summative assessments involve a combination of end of year exams and coursework that will make up your final grades.

## SUPPORT

### PERSONAL TUTOR

Your personal tutor will be a first point of contact for you, offering you guidance and support for general academic questions and any academic or personal difficulties you might have. They support your academic development throughout your course and you will have meetings throughout the year, so they should get to know you well. This means they have a complete picture of your strengths, experiences and skills, and will provide references for you during and beyond your time as a student.

### MODULE DIRECTORS

They will be in charge of your module content, set seminar topic areas and deliver the main lectures of your module. They can provide specific advice about the subject matter of individual modules along with advice in terms of specific essays and assignments.

### SEMINAR TUTORS

For each module, your seminar tutor, who may also be the module director, will mark your regularly submitted essays for the module and provide feedback to you on these to help you develop further. They'll also keep your personal tutor informed of your progress and be available for individual discussions and any questions you have about your module.

### DIRECTOR OF STUDENT EXPERIENCE AND PROGRESSION (DSEP)

They can offer you additional tailored support, building on support offered by your personal tutor. This might be advice on study skills, including: Essay writing or exams; which modules might suit you best; or guidance on internships, careers and postgraduate study.

### YOUR ACADEMIC LIBRARIAN AND LIBRARY HELPDESK

The library helpdesk is available to help you with day-to-day searches, borrowing and reserving items. You'll also have a specialist Academic Support Librarian to give you targeted support in your subject area. Your Academic Support Librarian will help you to develop information and research skills during your course and can offer you training in literature searching, finding and using information, referencing and avoiding plagiarism and reference management tools.

### SKILLS SESSIONS AND PROGRAMMES

These sessions are built into your core modules in the first year, so you will learn about essay writing, exam technique, critical thinking and researching independently. We also offer sessions for second and third years. And there's the possibility to take part in the 'Undergraduate Skills Programme and Academic Writing Programme', which is offered by the university. This helps you to perfect a range of skills and develop yourself further.

# BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

University isn't just about studying. You'll have access to a large range of activities and opportunities organised by us and the wider PAIS community. Weekly events bring together our undergraduate students, postgraduate students, post-docs and staff members.

- **Research seminars** featuring speakers from other universities or practitioners in politics, such as former UK Cabinet Minister, Justine Greening MP.
- **The PAIS Film Club** shows contemporary and classic feature films and documentaries on political issues, with discussions and debates after the film. These discussions often include members of the department, and sometimes the directors of the films themselves.
- **The 'Big PAIS Social'** at the end of the academic year in the Copper Rooms nightclub on campus. Previous socials have featured members of our academic staff DJ-ing.
- **Undergraduate Research Assistant** positions available to apply for, which enables finalists to work alongside academics on research projects.
- **Internship opportunities** with organisations and think tanks for which students can apply, and we also have an online list of links to a range of internship opportunities related to politics and international studies previously held by our students.
- **Student Ambassador** positions available. Being an ambassador gives you the chance to represent our department at university open days, offer holder open days and school events. And you also get paid for your time.

You can apply to take part in the Undergraduate Research Support Scheme (URSS). If you are successful, you'll get a bursary and skills development training to carry out your research project, supervised by an academic member of staff, as an addition to your degree.

We also offer a number of Student Research Assistantships each year that enable final year students to work across the department with academic and administrative members of staff to support research, teaching and the student experience. This is a great opportunity to add to your CV and gain an insight into how an academic department operates. The opportunities for you here are wide and varied. We encourage you to make the most out of your time at Warwick and we will support you in doing just that. All of our opportunities contribute to our graduates being highly employable and confident.

'After taking Government and Politics at A-Level I knew that politics was for me, but the added bonus of International Studies was what drew me to Warwick - along with the esteemed reputation of the PAIS department. Going along to an Offer Holder Open Day was when I realised Warwick was for me, as I found the staff and students to be incredibly friendly and welcoming, and I enjoyed the campus feel. The range of module options available and the vast array of study abroad options meant that my time at Warwick was truly international. I loved the second year International Development module, and that I was able to follow this up with Gender, Development and Governance modules during my year abroad in Sweden - taught in a different way, but building on the ideas fostered at Warwick. The PAIS department's commitment to offering study abroad placements at some of the best universities in the world resulted in the best year of my life, and I came back to Warwick with an extra year's worth of knowledge and experiences to apply to my final exams and essays. The extracurricular activities at Warwick were exceptional. In the summer of my first year I travelled to India through a Warwick partnership

with an education NGO, teaching English in four education centres near Delhi, and in my third year I received funding on a URSS project to do six weeks of research in Palestine. My time in Palestine really helped me make the most of my Middle East Regional Relations module in my final year. I am currently studying for an MSc in Women, Peace and Security at The London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE). In the summer between graduation and my Master's I worked for ten weeks at Birmingham City Council's Wellbeing Service in the Data Department, learning about how the Council works to alleviate health and social inequalities by providing free exercise classes around Birmingham.

When I arrived at Warwick I'd never lived abroad and had only travelled alone once; by the time I'd left, I'd lived in India for two months, travelled around Europe, and lived in Sweden for almost a year. My confidence in myself has grown through these experiences and through everything Warwick and PAIS gave me, and I'll always be grateful for the skills and knowledge that I have gained.'
