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Coronavirus waste reaches the ocean floor

World Ocean's Day took place earlier this week and many people from across the world took the time to sign a petition for world leaders to protect 30% of our blue planet by 2030.

Conservationists have warned that the coronavirus pandemic could spark a surge in ocean pollution – adding to a glut of plastic waste that already threatens marine life – after finding disposable masks floating like jellyfish and waterlogged latex gloves scattered across seabeds.



When dealing with PPE waste please refer first to the official Public Heath England advice that is available via this <u>link</u>.

- PPE should be put in a plastic waste bag and tied when full.
- This plastic bag should then be placed in a second bin bag and tied.
- It should then be stored in a safe and secure place for 72 hours.

A **Plastic Planet** has worked with Reelbrands and Transcend Packaging to develop plastic-free visors to protect frontline workers and medical staff in the ongoing battle to combat the coronavirus pandemic.

The *new visors* are certified to circular economy standards and are made from FSC paper board and PEFC cellulose from wood pulp. The visor is home compostable.
